Lawrence, whom Huxley admired greatly, Rampion is a fierce critic of modern society. For years Spandrell has devoted himself to vice and deliberate wickedness. Nevertheless, Blair and others spoke highly of his excellent command of language. According to the introduction to the latest edition of his science fiction novel Brave New World , the experience he had there of "an ordered universe in a world of planless incoherence" was an important source for the novel. In the s he was also a contributor to Vanity Fair and British Vogue magazines. Later, in Crome Yellow he caricatured the Garsington lifestyle. Jobs were very scarce, but in John Middleton Murry was reorganising the Athenaeum and invited Huxley to join the staff. He accepted immediately, and quickly married the Belgian refugee Maria Nys, also at Garsington. In Brave New World, set in a dystopian London, Huxley portrays a society operating on the principles of mass production and Pavlovian conditioning. Huxley was strongly influenced by F. Matthias Alexander and included him as a character in Eyeless in Gaza. Starting from this period, Huxley began to write and edit non-fiction works on pacifist issues, including Ends and Means, An Encyclopedia of Pacifism, and Pacifism and Philosophy, and was an active member of the Peace Pledge Union. He lived in the U. The book contains tracts on war, religion, nationalism and ethics. Heard introduced Huxley to Vedanta Upanishad-centered philosophy, meditation, and vegetarianism through the principle of ahimsa. In, Huxley befriended Jiddu Krishnamurti, whose teachings he greatly admired. Huxley and Krishnamurti entered into an enduring exchange sometimes edging on debate over many years, with Krishnamurti representing the more rarefied, detached, ivory-tower perspective and Huxley, with his pragmatic concerns, the more socially and historically informed position. Not long after, Huxley wrote his book on widely held spiritual values and ideas, The Perennial Philosophy, which discussed the teachings of renowned mystics of the world. Huxley became a close friend of Remsen Bird, president of Occidental College. He spent much time at the college, which is in the Eagle Rock neighbourhood of Los Angeles. Huxley received screen credit for Pride and Prejudice and was paid for his work on a number of other films, including Jane Eyre The script was not used, however.
