

Chapter 1 : Burning Man – The Official K Chronicles and (Th)ink Website

That reminds me - the first burning man was lit by Dave Warren, the proprietor of The Giant Camera at the Cliff House and founding member of the San Francisco Suicide Club.

Harvey has described his inspiration for burning these effigies as a spontaneous act of "radical self-expression". When Grauberg stopped organizing it, Harvey "picked up the torch," and ran with it. In , the effigy grew to 15 feet 4. Harvey has stated that he had not seen the cult film *The Wicker Man* until many years after and that it did not inspire the action. He asked John Law, who also had experience on the dry lake and was a defining founder of Cacophony Society , to take on central organizing functions. Meanwhile, the beach burn was interrupted by the park police for not having a permit. After striking a deal to raise the Man but not to burn it, event organizers disassembled the effigy and returned it to the vacant lot where it had been built. Shortly thereafter, the legs and torso of the Man were chain-sawed and the pieces removed when the lot was unexpectedly leased as a parking lot. Drawing on experience in the sign business and with light sculpture, John Law prepared custom neon tubes for the Man in so it could be seen as a beacon at night. In its first years, the community grew by word of mouth alone, all were considered participants by virtue of surviving in the desolate surreal trackless plain of the Black Rock Desert. Participants built art and participated in self-directed performances. Hence, the two events saw lots of cross-pollination of ideas and participants. Before the event opened to the public in , a worker named Michael Furey was killed in a motorcycle crash [22] while riding from Gerlach, Nevada , to the Burning Man camp in the Black Rock Desert. Harvey insisted that the death had not occurred at Burning Man, since the gates were not yet open. Another couple was run over in their tent by an art car driving to "rave camp," which was at that time distant from the main camp. After the event, co-founder and partner John Law broke with Burning Man and publicly said the event should not continue. By , the event had grown to 8, attendees and unrestricted driving on the open playa was becoming a major safety hazard. Fly Ranch, with the smaller adjoining Hualapai dry lake-bed, just west of the Black Rock desert, was chosen. Will Roger Peterson and Flynn Mauthe created the Department of Public Works DPW to build the "city" grid layout a requirement so that emergency vehicles could be directed to an "address" designed by Rod Garrett, an architect. Rod continued as the city designer until his death, in , at the age of . The event has remained there since. As the population of Black Rock City grew, further rules were established in relation to its survival. Some critics of the event cite the addition of these rules as impinging on the original freedoms, altering the experience unacceptably, while others find the increased level of activity more than balances out the changes. While a reputable member of the DPW claims this was the result of a dare to run thru the flames, his death was ruled a suicide. At one point it looked like all of the board members were going to hire lawyers. Marian Goodell, board member and head of communications, addressed concerns about the lack of transparency with this statement: Although unmentioned in the initial announcement, the Terms and Conditions for ticket buyers were changed to reflect an alteration in the structure of the business. Under the new terms it was made known that a new LLC was created, Decommodification LLC, which in the new non-profit business structure, owns all of the intellectual property associated with the Burning Man brand, including ownership over logos and trademarks, and will be responsible for enforcement thereof. After questions were raised by the community about this new LLC within the comment section on the original non-profit announcement Larry Harvey confirmed that he and the other founders were the sole owners of this new LLC. Abner Mality Many encounters with the unknown are frightening and disturbing, but very few are physically dangerous. And fewer still result in death. A poor farmer named Joao Prestes Filho was blasted by an energy from a mysterious source More reliable accounts said that his flesh did not "melt", but it was obvious that he was hideously burned by a power that no one to this day has been able to identify. The grisly tale took place in early March of , during the Carnival season in Brazil. Joao Prestes Filho was a farmer and a family man living in the remote village of Aracariguama, located in mountainous terrain miles outside of the large city of Sao Paulo. About people lived in the village, which was without electricity at that time. Many of the citizens were enjoying themselves at the Carnival, but Joao was not one of them. He disliked the noise and drunkenness and preferred to go fishing by himself. He returned in the evening to an empty home just outside of the village. His wife and children were attending the Carnival and Joao was preparing to fix his own supper when he saw something strange outside his window. Joao said a brilliantly glowing object like a "fiery torch" entered through the window into the room. A bolt from the "torch" struck him and Joao immediately felt like his upper body was on fire. He said later that he could actually feel his short beard burning and the skin on his body crisping. It was unclear if the "torch" disappeared after blasting Joao. The man was so traumatized and in such dreadful condition that details were unknown. What is known is that Joao wrapped a blanket around his upper body and staggered into the night, heading almost two miles into Aracariguama. For years, he was described as literally "melting" or "falling apart" by the time people got to him, with flesh literally falling off parts of his body. Later interviews with his relatives that took place years after the incident contradicted that, saying only that he was terribly burned. But by any measure, his physical condition was appalling. He remained conscious most of the time even as his body rapidly succumbed to the tremendous burning. His nephew Luis recalled years later that he was not allowed to see Joao in the hospital due to his appearance, However, another witness named Vergilio Alves recalled seeing Joao on his deathbed. Alves said Joao was able to speak, although he had trouble using his tongue. He was very weak, but did not appear to be in extreme pain. The burning affected only his upper body. Hands and face seemed to have the worst of it According to Alves, later reports of Joao melting or falling apart were inaccurate. Filho related the story of his encounter with the "boitata" to Alves and also the local sheriff before passing into unconsciousness and finally death. The cause of death for Joao Prestes Filho was listed as "cardiac collapse as a result of generalized 1st and 2nd degree burns". In later years, the respected Brazillian UFO authority Fernando Grossman said that the burns were not typical of a normal fire and instead "resembled the indirect effects of a nuclear explosion as ocured with certain victims of Hiroshima and Nagasaki". In other words, the burns were radioactive in nature. The window had been broken and chairs overturned, but there was no residue of a fire. Any typical method of burning, like an accident with fuel, can easily be discounted because of the lack of any evidence of actual fire. Fernando Grossman and others thought that some form of radiation may have caused the burns. But we must keep in mind that conditions were very primitive in rural Brazil back in Much of the speculation about what happened to him came years after the actual event. We will look at some theories about what happened in a little bit. In fact, Filho himself encountered these lights before the incident where he was burned. The entire location around the village, especially the abandoned gold mine of Morro Velho, was plagued by weird occurences and sightings of strange creatures. The mysterious lights were called "boitatas" by the natives, who believed they were malevolent spirits that would pursue people out late at night. These boitatas could move extremely fast and gave off tremendous heat. They were often seen in the vicinity of the Morro Velho mine and sometimes they would engage in curious maneuvers like figure 8 patterns. Sometimes two boitatas would appear to collide only to separate and repeat the maneuver. These objects were also known as "assombracaos" or "ghosts". When Joao Filho was a young man, he also saw boitatas when he was leading some pack donkeys through the hills near Aracariguama. A moon-shaped fireball came from high in the sky and rushed passed

him. It came so close he could feel the tremendous heat. This particular area was well-known for sightings of the lights He saw two of them colliding with each other very near to the cemetery where Joao was buried. These lights continue to be seen in the area to this day. In , a young girl Regina Barbosa da Silva saw a globe-like UFO that struck her with a powerful beam that caused severe headaches. There have been many sightings of werewolf-like beings known as "lobisomem" there. Members of the Filho family, including Emiliano and his father, saw one of these beast-men in , which they were able to drive off with rocks. The lobisomem add another layer of weirdness to the location. And the San Roque area is also infamous for reports of the sinister chupacabra or "goat-sucker". Now to try and unravel the mystery of the Burning Man. What was it that struck and killed Joao Prestes Filho in ? The Filho family and the natives of Aracariguama always believed that it was a boitata or assambarcao that killed Joao. At the time of the incident, no one in Brazil knew what a UFO or "flying saucer" was. There is a difference between a boitata and an assambarcao. Boitatas were thought to be "fiery serpents" Assambarcaos were thought to be actual human ghosts When Filho was taken to the hospital, he was examined like the victim of any other severe accident, with doctors recording his symptoms and cause of death. They were baffled by his burns, but refused to consider a supernatural explanation for them. And this is perfectly sensible, because by admitting that demons or ghosts caused the burns, they would basically be saying the attack was insoluble. They agree he was attacked by a boitata, though for what reason is unknown. On the other end of the scale are those who say that Joao was the victim of some kind of accident he caused himself. Walter Buhler always thought that Joao had somehow been burned by a candle. But this is highly unlikely. As stated before, the house itself was not burned in any way. And the burns were not consistent with normal combustion. Buhler strongly believed that extraterrestrials were non-violent beings, incapable of causing harm. This may have influenced his decision. Electrical burns might have been possible, but there was no electricity in the house or in the entire village of Aracariguama in Equipment once used at the Morro Velho mine might have been capable of sending such a jolt, but Joao had went fishing the night of the attack, nowhere near the mine. The doctors who examined Joao did not believe the burns were chemical in nature so exposure to some toxic substance can probably be ruled out. Later investigators were convinced that the burns were radioactive. Certainly there were no natural sources of radioactivity in the village that could have caused them. Many modern authorities believe that Joao Prestes Filho may have been attacked by an alien craft of some kind. The natives of Aracariguama knew the strange lights there as boitatas or assambarcaos Some of the descriptions of "lights" were just that But others described more solid apparitions. In , there were reports of a flying object that looked like a metallic sombrero turned upside down. This sounds quite different from the orbs seen by others. Joao described the object that attacked him as a "fiery torch" and he said that he immediately knew it was "not of this world". The Morro Velho mine would certainly be ideal as a secret base for alien craft. The weird lobisomem spotted in the area could even be the extraterrestrials themselves. But that leaves a question why they would attack and kill a poor farmer like Filho. It may not have been an intentional attack at all. If the UFOs were malevolent in nature, surely somebody else would have been burned or attacked by them during the many years they were seen in the Aracariguama area. It seems very improbable that the simple and superstitious Joao would have done anything that a UFO could have considered a threat. This assumes that the UFOs were even manned objects. But there is one final alternative to consider Joao Prestes Filho may have been one of the few human beings to have been struck by this most mysterious of atmospheric phenomena. Until recently, ball lightning was not accepted as a "real" phenomena by scientists, but now the existence of this odd effect is no longer challenged. Ball lightning is a globe of intense electric energy that moves and behaves in erratic fashion. The source of its creation remains unknown. It can appear at high altitude or at ground level. Many times the orbs vanish or explode harmlessly, but on rare occurrences, they blast apart with devastating effect.
