We have all heard the stories from Genesis; from the fall of Adam to Eve, to the betrayal of Jacob and Esau. One that we probably heard a thousand times over is the story of Cain and Abel. But that does not mean that this is a story of the footnote. No, this story reflects the redemptive character of God. It is a mountain for which you can view as a sign from God that he is not done with his creations yet, and he refuses to allow Sin to bring us death. Cain and Abel were born from the love of Adam and Eve. One thing of importance to notice is the fact that Cain was born first, the Abel. Cain is a tiller of the ground, a farmer of fruit. Abel is a shepherd, one that takes great care of sheep and goats, as tradition would say. Cain is a tiller. He plants the seed and reaps the harvest. He takes great care to ensure that plants grow fruitful for consumption. Plants do not have a personality or cognitive capacities, nor does it have blood flowing through its stems. In a human sense, there is no killing of a plant, nor do plants react to the affection of people. They only grow or die. On the flip side of that, Abel is a shepherd. He watches over and protects his flock from dangers and enemies. His animals have capacities to show affection towards humans. They can develop real connections with people, rather than the plants. It would be easy to value the life of an animal over that of a plant since they can return that love in their way. Furthermore, when taking the life of an animal, it is similar to that of a human. In a human sense, killing an animal is like that of a person. Given the two offerings, it took much more heart to offer an animal sacrifice than a plant. Furthermore, Abel chose the choicest of his flock; this shows that Abel thought hard and long about his offering. His was also an offering of Faith, as he brought the firstborn to sacrifice. It is not as if Cain went out and chose the worst of his harvest. There was no genuine sacrifice, there was no faith in the sacrifice, and there was no heartfelt thought in the sacrifice. Abel demonstrated heartfelt worship towards God through his faithful and well thought out offering. Cain offended God by giving heartless worship through his thoughtless and fickle offering. And God knew of the heart of Cain, so he rejected the offering and the sin behind it. It is not the fact that the offerings were different in their unique manifestations, but it was the heart of the offering that God rejected. When we are faced with sin through, especially of that which involved our personal worship with God, we must identify the sin that is rooted in our hearts. What sin is keeping you from facing God today? What sin is rooted in your heart that disappoints God? His anger was magnified by the state of his heart. But scriptures do not indicate that God found fault in the anger. Instead, God spoke of higher things. And if you do not do well, sin is crouching at the door. Its desire is contrary to you, but you must rule over it. He tells Cain that his anger will lead him down a path that is easy to follow, but it is not one of God. He tells Cain that his heart reflects that of laziness and unfaithfulness. He corrects him by telling him to do better, do what is right and have a spirit of excellence. God also warns Cain of future sin by personifying Sin as a hungry being ready to pounce. He also teaches that sin follows those that do not worship God with a whole heart. He personifies Sin as something waiting to grab him when he is most vulnerable. Finally, God provides an alternative path to sinful living. Do we turn from the ways that he disapproves of? Are we offering genuine worship to the Father, or it muddied by our sin? What is God asking you to get rid of today? He killed his brother over jealousy of attention from God. By killing his brother, Cain followed his anger. His anger led him to sin against his brother. Man kills man, a brother kills a brother. First, it is the first account of violence against another human being. This murder shows that sin not only manifests in conflict with God, through the actions of Adam and Eve in Genesis 3, but it also can manifest in conflict with another human being. When you reject the way, you dismiss the path-maker. Cain rejected God when he refused to defuse his anger and refused to deny sin. What sin have you allowed to take hold of your life? Have you allowed petty things to capture your heart? He obviously knows where Abel is, as his omnipotence witnessed the account. He fails to do so. There was no contrition, no confessing of sin, but instead, a repudiation and covering of it. Only God knows what would have happened had Cain confessed his sins. You shall be a fugitive and a wanderer on the

earth. This punishment is not because God is hateful in nature, but it is one to drive him back into the presence of God. He removes the blessing and from his hands and removes the active presence of himself to affect Cain so that he may find redemption. I shall be a fugitive and a wanderer on the earth, and whoever finds me will kill me. He even goes as far to claim that it is the cause of his death. But God makes it clear that his death is an effect of his sin. If anyone kills Cain, vengeance shall be taken on him sevenfold. Rather than killing Cain right there, he allowed him to live. Furthermore, He also gave him a curse of protection, so that no one would kill him By offering him a continuance in life, God offered Cain the opportunity live. This reflects the redemptive character of God. He wants all people to enter into his presence. Although Cain was disenfranchised and forced to leave the place of God, along with his family, he still had hope in the life that God spared. What sin holds your heart captive? Are you confessing that sin to God? Are you heeding his call to turn from wicket ways? What do you need to hand over to God today? He offers consequences to corral us back into communion with him. He offers redemption for those times when we truly mess up and sin, not just against other men, but against him. Are you embracing the sinful nature of man, or are you choosing to follow the good morals of God? When you do sin, do you go to God for repentance? Do you try to turn from your sinful ways?
