Taurus is associated with Venus which in tarot Venus is associated with The Empress. However, here Venus is less ethereal as she would be in Libra and is more down-to-earth and concerned with day-to-day matters of practicality and security.

Numerology and The Hierophant Card The Hierophant is the number 5 in tarot, which the number 5 is considered significant in religions such as Lutheranism, Judaism, Islam and Christianity. The pentagram is also a five-pointed star representing the five elements: Earth, Air, Fire, Water and Spirit. Humans have five fingers and toes – the number 5 connects humanity to the spiritual aspect. This connection to the number 5 and The Hierophant certainly has a religious overtone considering A. The number 5 brings change and something new to what is already stable. While the number 4 represents the four elements Earth, Air, Fire, Water, the 5th element is added that being Spirit. Sometimes he is shown with worshippers, as his alternate title is the Pope or, sometimes, Jupiter. When the tarot was invented, the Pope controlled a large portion of central Italy known as the Papal States. In Tarot of Marseilles, he wears a red cape and a blue robe, in contrast to The Papess, who wears a blue cape and blue robe. Hierophant Reversed Tarot Card Meanings The Hierophant tarot card represents spiritual or moral authority gained from a thorough understanding of tradition. When this card is reversed, it is often a painful reminder that this authority is not physical. While you can teach others the difference between right and wrong, you cannot prevent them from making poor choices. For example, you may have explained to a friend how his actions are hurting his loved ones and during the conversation it seemed that he finally saw the light. The next day you discover that, having learned nothing, he immediately returned to his negative behaviors. Reversed, the Hierophant card can also show inflexibility and intolerance toward others. This may stem from a too rigid or even false understanding of your own principles. For example, you may scold a child for speaking disrespectfully to his mother in a public place, not knowing that the two were only kidding around. Or you may scowl when you see a husband walking in front of his wife on the crosswalk. This may seem rude to you, but in many Native American cultures, for example, it would be rude for the husband to walk behind his wife. Remember that while your principles are universal, they are often expressed in a variety of ways. If the reversed Hierophant tarot represents another person, such a person tends to be rigid in his thinking. His closed-mindedness often stems from a too narrow interpretation of his beliefs and values, which generally indicates that he is not really in touch with them. While there is nothing wrong, for example, with choosing a vegetarian diet for ethical reasons, labeling meat eaters as murderers and barbarians is questionable. If this person presents himself as a

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spiritual teacher, you need to approach him with healthy skepticism. His knowledge may not be as in-depth as he would have you believe.

Is stolen, or lost, or destroyed or vanishes? In a panic, he heads into a temple where he finds the Hierophant, a wise and holy man. Acolytes kneel before the man ready to hear and pass on his teachings. The Fool tells the Hierophant his fears, and asks how he can be free of them. More than knowledge or experience, I value them. You can even pass such onto your children giving them the same fellowship with each other and with past generations. A sense of peace blankets him, and he takes a moment to thank the good Hierophant most profoundly. Stepping out of the sanctuary he makes his way to a meeting with his friends. Tonight they will talk about how they can create lessons and traditions to preserve not only their experience and knowledge, but their community. Where the High Priestess connects to the esoteric with her secret, solitary rites, the Hierophant or High Priest leads his flock in shared, communal rituals. No matter how chaotic and frightening the times, this can bring tranquility. Also, as he is working for the harmony of the community, the Hierophant is not a card that favors individuality. Harmony cannot be achieved if everyone is marching to their own drummer. The Hierophant is about shared feelings, beliefs and ways. It even can be about blending in or surrendering to tradition and community rather than asserting your uniqueness. Some find it hard to disassociate the Hierophant from certain organized religions or branches of a religion, which they view as domineering, irrational, even cruel. And so they tend to interpret the Hierophant only by his potential negatives: I like to point out that there are decks where the Hierophant is the Oracle at Delphi, a yogi, a pagan high priest or a village elder. If it helps, the reader can try and think of the Hierophant as one of these less conventional spiritual leaders. Try to keep in mind, however, that such irascible, orthodox types are usually acting out of fear. This is ironic as such traditions are meant to erase fear and create peace and harmony, not generate more fear. Likewise, the Hierophant might well be a warning to the querent, himself, against being too stubborn, too fearful of change, especially in matters of theology, ethics or traditions. The Hierophant could appear as a reminder that the aim of traditions is not to follow them by rote, but to use them to keep alive the spirit and faith of a people. This is an important message. When things are going very wrong in the world, it is the Hierophant who wades in, quiets the panic, and offers good, practical advice as well as spiritual assurances. He is the teacher, therapist, counselor, advisor, priest or rabbi. He answers questions people would ask of the divine, but also acts as the voice of the community, speaking for the people as well as to them. The Hierophant According to A. The Hierophant Tarot Card 5. It seems even to have been named the Abbot, and then its correspondence, the High Priestess, was the Abbess or Mother of the Convent. Both are arbitrary names. The insignia of the figures are papal, and in such case the High Priestess is and can be only the Church, to whom Pope and priests are married by the spiritual rite of ordination. I think, however, that in its primitive form this card did not represent the Roman Pontiff. Inner Symbolism of the Tarot Hierophant Card He wears the triple crown and is seated between two pillars, but they are not those of the Temple which is guarded by the High Priestess. In his left hand he holds a sceptre terminating in the triple cross, and with his right hand he gives the well-known ecclesiastical sign which is called that of esotericism, distinguishing between the manifest and concealed part of doctrine. It is noticeable in this connexion that the High Priestess makes no sign. At his feet are the crossed keys, and two priestly ministers in albs kneel before him. He has been usually called the Pope, which is a particular application of the more general office that he symbolizes. He is the ruling power of external religion, as the High Priestess is the prevailing genius of the esoteric, withdrawn power. The proper meanings of this card have suffered woeful admixture from nearly all hands. Grand Orient says truly that the Hierophant is the power of the keys, exoteric orthodox doctrine, and the outer side of the life which leads to the doctrine; but he is certainly not the prince of occult doctrine, as another commentator has suggested. He is rather the summa totius theologiae, when it has passed into the utmost rigidity of expression; but he symbolizes also all things that are righteous and sacred on the manifest side. As such, he is the channel of grace belonging to the world of institution as distinct from that of Nature, and he is the leader of salvation for the human race at large. He is the order and the head of the recognized hierarchy, which is the reflection of another and greater hierarchic order; but it may so happen that the pontiff forgets the significance of this his symbolic state and acts as if he contained within his proper measures all that his sign signifies or his symbol seeks to shew forth. He is not, as it has been thought, philosophy-except on the theological side; he is not inspiration; and he is not religion, although he is a mode of its expression.
