The Vanderbilt Hall building, where the Law Library is located, is wheelchair accessible by ramps. All levels of the Law Library are wheelchair accessible either by a ramp or by an elevator. Access Policy Permission to use the Law Library may be granted to the following categories of visitors. All access passes and permissions expire at the start of the Restricted Access Period see Library Hours , prior to examinations each semester. For access during the summer for bar study or for other purposes, Summer Access Rules apply. Students outside NYC area must bring one of the following: Valid, current ID from their school which is part of the NYU Law Library Reciprocal Access List Letter of introduction from librarian or professor describing the research project, the need for legal materials, and the requested dates of access The Library reserves the right to limit or deny access as required by the needs of the Law School. These rules apply only during the academic year. For access during the Summer for bar study or for other purposes, Summer Access Rules apply. There is no general-purpose access to the Law Library for NYU non-law students absent a need to use legal materials. The student will have to specify the needed material. Professors may send class lists to the Access Officer when legal material is needed for coursework. Students from the Medical Center and Polytechnic Institute should bring a letter from a professor or librarian at their school requesting access, stating the period of time access is needed and the material needed. During the restricted access period at the end of each semester NYU non-law students who satisfy the above requirement will not be able to enter the Law Library on Sundays before 3: Prospective Students Prospective students must obtain a day pass from the Information Desk located in Furman Hall, which allows them access to the library and classrooms. This pass is date-stamped and recognized by the Security Officers. Prospective students should bring this day pass to the Law Library Services Office. Faculty Law faculty outside NYU must bring one of the following: Valid, current faculty ID, and Letter of introduction from librarian or professor describing the research project, the need for legal materials, and the requested dates of access Sponsored Guests Complete a Sponsored Access Request Form. These arrangements may only be made during regular office hours—no evenings or weekends. The Law School is contractually prohibited by these databases from issuing a password to anyone who is not a currently-enrolled student.

Lord Mackay of Clashfern to date In Stanley Shaw Bond , editor at Butterworths , began a project to produce a complete statement of the law of England and Wales that was authoritative, comprehensive and up-to-date. The first edition was published in 31 volumes from to Its articles run from action to bankers and banking. The volume deals with action, admiralty , agency , agriculture , aliens , allotments , animals , arbitration , auction , bailment and bankers and banking. Its articles run from bankruptcy to bills of exchange. It contains but four treatises, upon bankruptcy and insolvency pages , barristers 67 pages , bastardy 28 pages and bills of exchange, promissory notes and negotiable instruments pages. After a general consideration of the nature and domicile of companies, the work considers briefly the history of company legislation. Then follows an elaborate treatise on the Companies Act Special companies, like banking, insurance and public service companies, are considered; as well as chartered companies, the livery companies of the city of London, quasi-corporations, and illegal companies; and a few pages are devoted to foreign companies. The reviewer in the Harvard Law Review thought the table of cases cited must contain at least five thousand cases. He said the importance of this treatise was at once apparent; and that to the commercial lawyer in the Eastern cities of the United States it would be exceedingly useful. The articles in volume 11 run from descent to ecclesiastical law. It contains a short article on descent and distribution; a discussion of discovery, inspection and interrogatories, under the English practice; an elaborate article on distress; an article on easements and profits, which the Harvard Law Review said was the most interesting article in the volume to an American lawyer; and an elaborate disquisition on ecclesiastical law. The articles in volume 12 run from education to electric lighting and power. The Harvard Law Review said that the articles on education and elections had comparatively little value to the American bar, but the hundred pages devoted to electric lighting and power were useful. Its articles run from markets to misrepresentation. It contains articles on markets and fairs 59 pages , master and servant pages , medicine and pharmacy 82 pages , the Metropolis pages , mines, minerals and quarries pages and misrepresentation and fraud pages. According to the Harvard Law Review , the article on master and servant was of constant interest to an American lawyer; and that on misrepresentation and fraud, from the master hand of G Spencer Bower, was a valuable treatise in itself. Volume 21 was published in Its articles run from mistake to partition. It contains articles on mistake 34 pages , money and money lending 29 pages , mortgage pages , negligence pages , notaries 9 pages , nuisance 72 pages , Parliament pages and partition 59 pages. The Harvard Law Review said that the standard set by the preceding volumes appeared to be maintained and that the series, up to this volume, was a collection of very admirable treatises on English law. The editor-in-chief was Viscount Hailsham. The managing editor was Sir Roland Burrows. The third edition was published in 43 volumes from to The general editor was Lord Simonds. The fourth edition was published in 56 volumes from to The editor-in-chief was Lord Hailsham of St Marylebone. The editor-in-chief of volumes reissued from August onwards was Lord Mackay of Clashfern. Fifth edition[edit] Publication of the fifth edition began in and is being published in volumes. It will have a new title scheme, a new updating service, and improved integration of European law. They celebrate the value that people in law bring to society. US Law The library has a comprehensive collection of: Federal statutes, legislative history materials, and case reports All law school and commercial law reviews and journals indexed in the Index to Legal Periodicals State statutes as well as official reports, where available The library has current digests and one major secondary source for the following states only: The library also has: New York state legislative history material and New York City primary and secondary sources Treatises and monographs for subjects that comprise a major component of the curriculum or where there is substantial faculty research, including: Foreign Law Primary Materials Generally, the library aims to collect all current primary source materials codes, statutes, regulations, court decisions, jurisprudence , and standard finding tools for major jurisdictions of the world, for selected countries for which it has primary responsibility among the Northeast Foreign Law Libraries Cooperative Group, and as many others as it is possible to acquire, concentrating on Western Europe primarily Austria, France, Germany, Belgium, Italy, and Switzerland ; Eastern Europe primarily Romania ; Latin America primarily Argentina, and Mexico ; and Commonwealth countries. For non Anglo-American jurisdictions, the library collects mainly in English, where available, but has also acquired items in French, German, Spanish, Portuguese, Russian, and other Slavic languages. Secondary Materials Scholarly treatises in English and the vernacular are collected intensively for Western and Eastern Europe, Latin America, commonwealth countries, and in English only for China and Japan. For other jurisdictions, treatises tend to focus upon civil law and procedure, commercial and business law, constitutional law, criminal law and procedure, environmental law, human rights, patent, trademark and copyright law, private law, taxation, and trade. For the United Kingdom, Canada, Australia, and New Zealand, the library tries to maintain almost all the scholarly academic periodicals, as well as other leading journals on specific topics civil and criminal law, labor law, business, taxation, legal history. For non Anglo-American jurisdictions, the library tries to have a broad collection of foreign law journals and reviews, in English and vernacular, as budgetary conditions allow. The main component of this facet of the collection consists of French, German, Italian, Belgian, Swiss, and Austrian periodicals. In general, periodicals must be listed in a major index to be purchased. Comparative Law The library collects comparative law materials, predominantly in English, in which the United States is one of the jurisdictions studied or in which two or more legal systems are compared. The library also acquires the most important comparative law journals published in the US and throughout the world and major loose-leaf sets, such as Constitutions of the Countries of the World. International Law To support the wide variety of subjects covered in the curriculum, faculty research, the Global Law School Program, and law school journals, including the New York University Journal of International Law and Policy, the Law Library aims toward comprehensiveness for current English language materials in public international law. The library has particularly strong collections in international human rights, taxation, procedure, arbitration, international commercial law, and international organizations. In general, the collection contains all primary sources and substantial periodicals and monographs from major publishing houses. Treatises for the subjects covered are collected in English and vernacular. The library maintains guides on its website for researching international law and international organizations, with links to the major official and commercial online databases and websites. International Organizations The library buys extensively monographs, journals, looseleaf services, and finding tools to support the strong curricular and research interest in international organizations, in particular the European Union, the United Nations, and the World Trade Organization. The library has official documents of these three organizations as follows: The library is a designated depository for documents of the European Union. The library also has the Readex microfiche collection of UN documents through , and

Electronic Legal Databases In the field of international and foreign law, the library subscribes to an extensive list of legal databases and services that support the teaching needs of the Law School. Priority is given to those products that are used as primary sources, such as treaty series, legislation, and jurisprudence for those jurisdictions most often studied in our academic environment, and secondary sources such as indexes and databases required to access the primary materials. In addition, the law school community is able to access electronic resources that Bobst Library subscribes to on behalf of the university community. Professors may suggest new subscription databases. Evaluation, ordering, and start-up of new databases subscriptions requires time, money, availability, hardware and software evaluation, and a trial stage, and proposals should always be made in advance. The following links lead users to these databases: Our focus is on journals published by academic institutions, with some holdings of major practitioner-oriented material. The Law Library subscribes to many online periodicals, referred to as eJournals. Researchers can access these via the Julius Online Catalog and Bobcat. Print periodicals are shelved in several different locations in the library. A few rules of thumb should help library patrons locate the periodicals they need. If the library owns the title, JULIUS will provide you with a call number, a room location such as Bound Periodicals, Lasdon Collection, etc , and the volume of the most recent issue received. Click on "Latest received," which will indicate whether the issue is bound or unbound. It is an open reserve area, in which library patrons obtain their own materials. It houses major treatises, and other materials for which there is high demand. Library patrons are encouraged to use reserve materials in the open reserve area. There is study carrel seating and photocopy machines. If patrons want to take materials out of the area, they must be checked out. Government Documents For staff assistance in identifying and locating documents, contact Jeanne Rehberg. United States Government Documents The library holds many of the law-related documents published by the United States government, including documents of the President, executive departments, Congress, the courts, and federal agencies. As a designated United States Government Documents Depository, the library receives selected documents for free from the Government Printing Office, and it also purchases additional documents and related indexes. The library provides free public access to the depository. Click here for a guide to finding US government documents in the library. International Document Collections See International organizations above. Video Collection The extensive video collection includes panel discussions on practicing various types of law, and in-house productions which support the curriculum of the clinics, the lawyering program, and individual faculty. All production work is handled by the video services department of the law school. Audio Collection The audio collection consists of panels and seminars, Sum and Substance Review tapes, and class reviews, and a legislative history walking tour. It is open during all library hours.
