Flights usually depart London in the evening. The rest of the day is free to relax and recover from the flight or for individual exploration of Delhi. Rooms in the hotel are usually available after mid day. Those who have made their own flight arrangements will join us at the hotel during the day. We often have to leave the hotel at around 2 am and drive to the airport for the very early morning but highly spectacular flight over the Himalaya to Leh. If the weather is good and the flight goes on time we should be in Leh early. The rest of the day is free to relax and acclimatise to the altitude 3,m. In the morning we rest and catch up on some sleep and in the afternoon there will be a gentle orientation walk of Leh and its bazaars. We first drive to Shey, a former Royal Palace of the Ladakh kings. Inside is a small temple containing a year old copper and gold statue of the Buddha. From Shey we drive or we can walk across the fields to Tikse, where we visit the monastery - perched on top of a hill - its red and white buildings can be seen for miles. A recently built temple contains a magnificent image of the Future Buddha. We return to Leh and the rest of the afternoon is free to explore. From here a winding path takes us to Tsemo Monastery, from where we are rewarded for our efforts by magnificent views of the whole of Leh and its surrounding villages. Descending round the back of the palace we walk via Sankar to the recently built Japanese Peace Pagoda. This huge stupa overlooks Leh and we have stunning views of the town and the Stok range of mountains across the valley. There is the chance today to make an optional jeep safari to the Khardung Pass; at 5,m, one of the highest motorable roads in the world. Your leader will have details. If you do the jeep safari this will be in the morning and you can do a walk in the afternoon. We drive past Spituk, the site of the first Gelugpa Monastery in Ladakh. There should be time to visit the monastery with its commanding views over the Indus Valley. From here a new road takes us across the Indus towards Jinchén. We will drive as far as the road conditions allow and to where our ponies will be waiting. After they are loaded up we start our trek into the Jinchén Gorge at the foot of the Stok Mountains. The trail is straightforward as we follow the Jinchén Nala upstream. The valley closes in around us and spectacular rock formations tower above us. An ever-changing panorama of fantastic coloured mountains surrounds us as we ascend the valley. We may have to cross the river as the stream forces the path closer to the side of the valley. Suddenly the valley widens and reveals the snow-topped peaks of the Stok mountains. Prayer flags on a wide pasture mark the junction with the trail leading to Rumbak village. We can visit the village this afternoon and maybe sample the local delicacy, salty yak buttered tea, in one of the many home stays. We head up the main valley past a watermill and to a bridge, which we cross. The trail ascends the valley gradually and when the valley splits we take the right-hand fork up past the one house village of Yurutse. Leaving the fields behind we ascend towards the Ganda La and camp tonight by a small stream below the pass. In the afternoon there will be an acclimatisation walk on the hills around camp. The trail is clear as it zigzags towards the pass. As we climb the views become more and more spectacular. Behind us, Stok Kangri dominates the skyline. Finally, we reach the top of the Ganda La 4,m decked with colourful prayer flags and the views are worth all the effort. Ahead is the Zanskar Range and behind are the Stok Mountains. Far below in the valley are the fields of Shingo. As we descend keep an eye open for marmots and blue sheep, both of which seem to thrive in these desolate, high altitude spots. The trail to Shingo is easy and in the main season, there is usually a tea tent here, which may sell cold drinks. From Shingo, the trail takes us through a spectacular gorge with beautifully coloured and eroded rocks. We continue down the gorge all the way to the small hamlet of Skiu. We camp either in Skiu itself or about 20 minutes beyond the village by the river. The terrain along the valley is not demanding so there are plenty of opportunities to admire the magnificent scenery. The colours of the barren mountains of Ladakh are truly spectacular, pastel pinks, blues and greens shine in the brilliant sunshine and change colour dramatically as the sun rises and sets. We follow the river all day today and will have to cross the river a few times and although bridges have been built in some places there will be some river crossings today. We will have lunch in Sara, where there is usually some

welcome shade in a tea tent. Beyond the settlement of Chalak, there is an impressive line of chortens and a huge mound of goat horns, which are placed on the chortens to ward off any evil spirits trying to enter the valley. Climbing up to a small col we descend again to the river and a mediaeval fort silhouetted on the hillside tells us that we have almost reached Markha. Just before Markha, we will need to don our river crossing sandals for at least 2 river crossings. Markha is only a small village and there will be time to explore the small monastery in the afternoon. Our camp will be on grazing flats near the village. We will have one or two river crossings this morning. Just after the river crossings is Tache gompa, set way above us on the cliff face. There is time to visit the monastery, which is the most important in the valley and is affiliated to Hemis. It is a steep minute climb up to the small temple but the stunning views from the top are well worth the effort. Continuing up the valley we walk through Umlung village to Hankar where there are more impressive fort ruins and a small gompa. From Hankar the trail turns off from the main valley, climbs up a small side valley past the ruins of Hankar Fort before dropping down to Upper Hankar. Climbing more we now follow the Nimaling stream to Thachungtse where we camp. We may be lucky and see Blue Sheep a type of wild goat high up on the grazing areas above the campsite. The trail climbs steeply to a plateau where the valley opens out. Ahead are spectacular views of Kang Yangtse, at 6,m, the highest peak in the valley. In this area, there is no permanent habitation but during the summer months, the shepherds bring their flocks of sheep, goats and dzos cow-yak cross breeds to graze on the high altitude pasture. The shepherds stay in stone shelters close to the grazing area for the whole summer and we can often buy yoghurt or local cheese from them. In the evenings, the animals are brought down from the hills and it is quite usual to have hundreds of them wandering through the campsite. Look after your edibles! We should get to Nimaling by lunchtime and in the afternoon, there is an optional walk up behind camp towards Kang Yangtse. This is well worth doing and highly recommended for the impressive close-up views of Kang Yangtse. Our trail begins today by climbing to the Gongmaru La. It is a fairly long, steep ascent zigzagging to the top of the pass at 5,m, but the views from the top are worth the effort. Ahead there are views of the Stok Range and down to the Indus valley. The descent is steep at first and we then enter a spectacular gorge and descend more gradually now with many small river crossings. High up on the barren cliffs we may spot the elusive Blue Sheep which inhabit this area. Passing through Chuskurmo and Chokdo we continue our long descent crossing the river several times to the village of Shang Sumdo. Today is a hard day due to the crossing of the high pass and the long descent. Very occasionally the road gets blocked in which case we walk down the jeep track to Hemis. Hemis was once the largest and richest of all the Ladakhi monasteries. A wander round the dimly lit temples containing grotesque yet beautiful masks and statues will take us back hundreds of years in time. We then drive back to Leh and the comforts of a hot shower at our hotel. We should get to Leh for lunch and the rest of the day is free for last minute sightseeing or shopping in the bazaars. You will be transferred to the airport for your journey onwards. Check-in to a Ladakhi style hotel, take rest and get acclimatized to the arid high altitude of Leh m. In the evening, enjoy the sunset point Shanti Stupa and Leh market , followed by dinner and overnight stay at your OYO hotel. Enjoy sightseeing at the places of interest in Sham Valley. Start with the Hall of Fame, a museum constructed by Indian army in the memory of brave Indian soldiers and proceed towards the sacred Gurudwara Pathar Sahib followed by a 4-km drive towards Magnetic Hill which defies the law of gravity. Then, visit the beautiful confluence of the Indus and Zaskar rivers at Nimmu Village and drive back to Leh. Enroute, explore the famous Spituk monastery. Spend your evening at leisure and stay overnight at the hotel. From the top, enjoy views of the beautiful Indus valley and its snow covered peaks. If the weather is clear, it is also possible to see the Karakoram mountain range from here. Take rest till evening and go for an excursion to the Hunder sand dunes before sunset and ride the double humped bactrian camel. You can also take a walk around the village to observe the local people and their culture. Stay overnight at the hotel. Along the way, pay a visit to the Diskit monastery that belongs to the Gelugpa sect of Tibetan Buddhism. Drive towards the other side of Nubra valley, travelling through the main part of the silk route, reaching Leh via Khardungla. On arrival at Leh, you will be transferred to your OYO hotel for an overnight stay. Enjoy the spectacular landscape on your way to Pangong. Reach and stay overnight. It is kms long and 4 kms wide, extending almost in a straight line, towards Tibet. In fact, only a quarter of the lake is in India. Enroute, you will see some Himalayan marmots and migratory birds. Drive back to Leh for an overnight stay in the hotel. After breakfast, check-out from the hotel.

Chapter 5 : The Summit Adventure Ladakh

The best outfitters for outdoor adventures in Ladakh. Because of the relatively complex logistics of acquiring permits to Nubra Valley and the need for good guiding and safe drivers on precarious Himalayan roads, we recommend working with two outfitters that we have tested in the region.

Two decades later, the Buddhist province has modernized but in a way that still maintains its majestic beauty and traditional Indian and Tibetan Buddhist cultures. I described the difficulty of accessing the high-altitude desert where India rubs against Tibet and Pakistan. Landslides had closed the two-day overland route from Manali, the next significant town south. My access had been further limited by violent clashes on the India-Pakistan border in the troubled region of Kashmir; this had meant that the only other road into Ladakh—from the Mughal-built city of Srinagar—was too dangerous. I was determined to get here, my nagging curiosity for this part of the world derived from a peculiar family tragedy: In my great-aunt Margot dove into a river up here on her honeymoon and drowned, most likely following a heart attack from the shock of glacial melt. Not only are travel logistics smoother—the roads are the best-maintained in the entire country; up to seven flights a day are coming into Leh from three Indian cities, including Delhi, a one-hour hop—but new hotels, camps and lodges are also popping up, especially in the main Indus Valley, anchored by Leh. There are decent hiking outfits, like Shakti Himalaya, which has converted a bunch of village houses in the Indus Valley into tasteful whitewashed lodges where walkers can sleep between crisp cotton sheets. There are also some respectable restaurants, which I discovered in the village of Nimmu, where a guesthouse recently opened in the local palace. While the accommodation is not quite up to standard, it is a decent stop for a lunch of paneer pulao a spiced rice dish with Indian cottage cheese after a morning of white-water rafting on the Zaskar River or biking down some 6, feet of mountain in an hour. This single circuitous route allows for a week- to ten-day-long loop of biking, hiking and rafting. The combination works well: The Indus Valley delivers the most luxurious places to stay, as well as iconic monasteries—Thiksey, Hemis, Sheya—while Nubra is much wilder. The landscape is an easy sell: For the first 24 hours, it is hard to breathe at the almost 10,000-foot altitude. There are no trees, just rocks that have tumbled into crevices or sit precariously on slopes. Then the sun slinks deeper and hits streaks of river in valley floors. This is where the settlements lie—small hamlets of white-and-oxblood flat-roofed homes among almond trees and tidy terraced fields. Barley is tied into stooks, which villagers carry as golden thickets on their backs. Above them are bone-white Buddhist monasteries still humming with chanting monks. Chamba has a pricey boutique and chefs in white hats; I have a butler, Wi-Fi and knowledgeable private guides. At night I fall asleep to the haunting jingling of wind chimes rolling out from the courtyard until it bounces back off the valley walls. When I get up to close the shutters, a storm of swallows flits about the walnut grove below. For this part of the trip, we therefore use Kaphila, a new mobile camp made up of tasteful canopied tents furnished with portable wooden beds and Tibetan rugs. The camp is pitched on an apron of cultivated ground—a crescent of green above the precarious mud track that we have climbed using modern four-wheel-drive vehicles, as opposed to the cheap Maruti Suzukis that I notice occupying a sinister graveyard of fallen vehicles beneath the Nubra switchbacks. Behind our tents, yaks graze the edelweiss-covered slopes. We walk to a nearby hamlet where butter lamps burn faintly in a private Buddhist shrine packed with century-old scrolls. On another walk, the wind catches the prayer flags hanging from a tenth-century statue overlooking an empty gorge. These are mountains on an intensely epic scale. There are streaks of green in them and purple; there is a glacier slipping down one side; fresh snowfall dusts the long view. The Himalayas speak in millennia the Karakoram formed over the last 65 million years, not the life spans of individuals or civilizations. This is made clear when we enter the Valley of Sorrows, bisected by the river Shyok and covered with stones resembling billiard balls, their distinctive shape molded by the ferocity of water that has flooded nine times in the last years, wiping out every settlement. I think of the local shaman who I visited the day before. The oracle—a woman who worked herself into a trance in the living room of her suburban home—lives in a new town called Solar Colony, which sprung up outside Leh to rehouse survivors of a devastating flash flood that killed people four years ago. It reminds me

how quickly foundations we consider solid can be destroyed by the least expected turn. Over the last few days, I have been dosing myself with coca drops, a natural remedy for altitude sickness. It unnerves me to hear something in this empty valley where I can see no sign of human life, no animals grazing, no flow of water in the summer drought.

Chapter 7 : How to reach Leh Ladakh, Flights, Buses and Taxi to Leh Ladakh

Leh-Ladakh, one of the coldest deserts in the world, is located towards the eastern side of Jammu and Kashmir. Explore Nubra valley and Pangong Lake, the highlights of the region. Nubra is a picturesque valley surrounded by stark slopes and green villages, and Pangong Lake is the world's highest.

Stay overnight in Delhi. You will be met by our representative at the airport and transferred to your hotel in Leh City, after a drive of only 3 to 4 km. On arrival at the hotel you will be served a welcome drink and then proceed to your rooms to spend a full day at rest to acclimatize yourself completely to the high altitude of Ladakh, which is a must. In the evening, have a nice, easy walk to Leh Bazaar. Stay overnight at the hotel.

LEH After an early breakfast, enjoy a full-day tour of the Indus Valley, which includes visits to Leh Palace and the Stok Monastery, both of which are among the historically most important and magnificent examples of royal architecture and Buddhist culture in Ladakh.
