The situational theory postulates that people can be identified and classified according to their problem awareness and information seeking behavior in problems solution process. The situational theory provided a means to segment stakeholders as nonpublic, latent public, aware public, and active public according to their relationship and response to a problem. Results from these studies extended the Excellence theory into a global public relations theory, which provides generic principles that are understood in the same way around the world and can be operated effectively in most nations. Therefore, this model is known as the non-Western model. Criticism[edit] Many scholars have questioned the possibility of the two-way symmetrical model in real-life context. Van der Meiden [11] observed that the two-way symmetrical model is unrealistic since it suggests that organizations should value the interests of their publics more than those of the organization. Murphy [12] proposed that the concept of symmetrical communication works along a continuum from pure conflict to pure cooperation, which is based on mixed motives. Cameron and his colleagues developed the contingency theory of accommodation ,which represent the stance movement of an organization toward a given public at a given time and in a given situation [14] and suggests that the true excellence in public relations may result from picking the appropriate point along the continuum that best fits the current need of the organization and its publics.
