

## Chapter 1 : Child Care Careers: Exploring Different Career Paths - The Learning Station

*The child care health consultant (CCHC) is a specialized role with the primary goal of promoting the safest and healthiest environment for the staff and children in child care settings, including child care centers, nursery schools, and camps.*

Call around to local centers and home-based care providers to get an accurate and up-to-date picture of what people are paying in your area. Of course, nannies who double as household managers, those with advanced degrees and specialty nannies get paid more, as do nannies in areas where the cost of living is higher. What about benefits – will you offer paid holidays and sick leave? How about health insurance? Again, speaking with a local placement agency or other families with in-home child care will help you determine a fair rate in your area. For more information on your responsibilities as an employer of a nanny, the International Nanny Association offers a guide to payroll and taxes. Check with your employer to see whether a Flexible Spending Account for child care expenses is offered. These accounts allow you to set aside pretax dollars for eligible dependent care, which could mean considerable savings throughout the year. Evaluating outside child care If you opt for a family day care or child care center, you should begin looking at local options before your baby arrives. Recommendations from other parents can be especially valuable in your search for good care. As you tour, pay attention to such things as cleanliness, whether the children are engaging with one another, whether the staff is engaging with the children and whether everyone looks happy to be there. Ask whatever questions come to mind. What is the adult-to-child ratio? How many children are in the room where your child will be? What are the training and hiring standards for caregivers? What is the staff turnover rate? Are all providers licensed in CPR and first aid? How does the facility ensure security, and what is the protocol for child pickup? Is there a waiting list and if so, how long is it? How much is the application fee and tuition? What hours and days is the center open? Check to see whether your state operates an online database of licensed child care operations. This map from Child Care Aware can help you locate the proper agency in your state. Before making a final decision, drop in at least once at a different time from when you toured. Evaluating in-home child care Interviewing a nanny may be far more intensive than distinguishing among child care centers. Although you can find nannies advertised on community bulletin boards and even Craigslist, the Nerds recommend you contact an agency or a local training program or get a referral from a friend or family member about potential candidates. If your preference is for a nanny, but the costs are too steep, consider a nanny share program, growing in popularity across the U. Nanny sharing is when two or more families share the services of a single in-home provider. You pay a fraction of the cost of a full-time dedicated nanny. These agencies come at a cost, however. And you can boost your chances of achieving a promotion by gaining the right qualifications. This blog post aims to give you an overview of each child care setting. I am not going to share the pros and cons of each setting, only because everyone has their own preferences. My advice to you for deciding a career path is to try and gain some experience in each setting and then decide which one is best suited for you. And if you can, talk to people who work in these child care settings. And on that note, here are the four different child care settings that you can work in:

**Nurseries** Nurseries are very popular places for child care careers. By working in a nursery, you are part of a team that helps to care for babies and children up to the age of five. As a nursery worker, you work alongside both parents and carers to ensure children get the best possible care. Many parents tend to drop their kids off at nurseries during the working day. So most nurseries open during the weekdays, and they tend to close during weekends and bank holidays. There are many types of nurseries. There are privately-owned nurseries, local council, voluntary and community groups. Some colleges and schools also have their own nurseries as well. Besides providing care, nurseries organise a whole host of creative activities and trips. This helps to ensure children are having fun, and learn at the same time. By law, half the workforce who work in a nursery must hold an accredited childcare qualification. Meaning, most nurseries look for a good mix of qualified and non-qualified people. For you, this is good so you can gain some experience and decide whether working in a nursery is right for you.

**Pre-Schools** Pre-schools are exactly what they are. They help to prepare children from the age of two to the age of five for school. Pre-school workers play an important role in teaching children about the wider world. But more importantly, they play a key role in the development of their social and learning skills. These are essential skills to learn before they begin primary school. Most pre-schools workers work for either a morning or afternoon session. And they usually take place during term-time. Parents are often asked to help out. That means pre-school workers have a great deal of flexibility during their working hours so it can fit around their busy lives. Like nurseries, Ofsted require half the people to be qualified.

**Childminding** Childminders are generally self-employed and they work from home. They look after children of all ages and they set their own hours and fees. Childminders need to register themselves with Ofsted to look after anyone under the age of eight for more than two hours a day. You are not eligible to register if the child is a close relative or if you are looking after children between the hours of 6pm to 2am this is known as babysitting. Before registering with Ofsted, you need to complete an introductory to child care careers course and also get a paediatric first aid qualification. Their services are available to parents from pregnancy right through to reception class at primary school. Parents can also get professional support and advice on family matters and health. Assist students as they each outline their personal educational plan for. Stress the importance and benefits of setting career goals. Allow students to share their outline with the class.
