During the summer, most have a festival where the main feature is the "family-style" or cafeteria-style chicken dinner. As you empty the bowls and platters, more is served. The price includes the drink and dessert. About half the time, the desserts are home made. Cafeteria-style dinners are served as you proceed through a line receiving all your food at once usually there are a couple of items, such as slaw and sliced tomatoes, on the table. Many times, you will find pleasant companions at the table and be reminded of a simpler, more friendly way of life. Their disbelief indicates that they had no hope of him being alive. Now Jesus is clearly alive. His body is physical. It bears marks of his suffering, identical with the body of the Jesus they have known and loved. But his body is now more than that. It can relate to space and time -- yes -- but it is no longer bound by them. Jesus can now live bodily as easily in the heavenly, spiritual sphere as in the earthly. He now transcends the physical, and someday we will also. We must be very clear. I went to a pseudo-Christian liberal arts college at which the religion classes were taught by well-educated, ordained, scholarly unbelievers. This is a religious myth, say some scholars. We must demythologize it. It was a "spiritual" resurrection, not a "physical" one, others proclaim. It has to be! This is not presented as a religious myth, but as an astounding, historical reality.
