Yes, I think Chur is worth three days as a base. You should reserve one day for the town itself. Stroll through the narrow cobbled streets mostly pedestrian area or join a guided tour the advantage is that you can see the interior of the old town hall , have a look at the St. The highlight IMO is the cathedral on a hill above the town. It is under restoration at the moment, but still worth a visit. I was fascinated by the late gothic altar, the crypt with the pillars and capitals and the treasure. Luzi a few steps away is often overlooked, but has a years old crypt. The cable car to Brambruesch starts right in the town and takes you to a place with great views of Chur and the Rhine valley. There are many possible day trips from Chur: The vineyards with quaint villages north of Chur Maienfeld, Malans etc. Poschiavo is also definitely worth the two nights. I am assuming two nights means only one full day for exploring. Your Swiss pass offers you great opportunities to spend the rest of the day: In case you would be interested in a day hike: From there it is a 4 to 5 hours hike via Alpe San Romerio Romanesque church, restaurant, gorgeous views to Poschiavo. The entry includes total population as well as the male and female components. Life expectancy at birth is also a measure of overall quality of life in a country and summarizes the mortality at all ages. It can also be thought of as indicating the potential return on investment in human capital and is necessary for the calculation of various actuarial measures. This entry gives the number of deaths of infants under one year old in a given year per 1, live births in the same year; included is the total death rate, and deaths by sex, male and female. This rate is often used as an indicator of the level of health in a country. Data is originally sourced from either criminal justice or public health systems. This entry gives the average annual number of births during a year per 1, persons in the population at midyear; also known as crude birth rate. The birth rate is usually the dominant factor in determining the rate of population growth. It depends on both the level of fertility and the age structure of the population. It is the th largest country in the world by area with 41, square kilometers. The Swiss Confederation was founded in as a defensive alliance among three cantons. In succeeding years, other localities joined the original three. A constitution of , subsequently modified in , replaced the confederation with a centralized federal government. However, the country did not officially become a UN member until Switzerland remains active in many UN and international organizations but retains a strong commitment to neutrality.
