I was facing a divorce after twenty-seven years of marriage, had huge debt and no means of income. I was beyond depressed. To top it off, I broke both my legs! My divorce attorney jokingly gave me what turned out to be a life-changing piece of advice: In the next couple of weeks, I started looking through the classifieds for the perfect pup and soon answered an ad for a four-month-old bulldog. When I arrived at the kennel, I found myself face-to-face with the saddest-looking puppy you can imagine—the mirror image of what I felt in my heart. We were both underdogs looking for a big dose of unconditional love. I wrapped my new best friend in a blanket, took her home and named her Zelda. From Underdog to Top Dog In , at the age of fifty-two, the rug was pulled out from underneath me. With Zelda in my life, I started to heal and feel happy, yet I desperately needed to find a solution for my debt and lack of income. I had four credit cards and was living off my credit limit; time and money were running out. Fortunately, a friend who knew of my financial plight told me about an annual Christmas card contest that a local pet store was sponsoring. The winner would receive forty pounds of free dog food every month for a year. With the Christmas theme in mind, I borrowed a Santa hat from a neighbor, filled the bathtub with bubble bath and lowered Zelda into the tub. With the hat on her head and a beard made from the bubbles, Zelda was the perfect Santa imposter. I snapped the photo and sent it off to the store with the one-liner: I remember asking Zelda how many ways she knew to fix dog chow! No closer to solving my financial problems, I began to take stock of my personal strengths to find a solution. I had worked many years in advertising as a creative director, writing one-liners and designing ads for corporate clients. Maybe I could write and design a greeting card line around Zelda, using my personal experiences surviving tough times for creative inspiration, I thought. A couple of years earlier I had written a book, Bumper Sticker Wisdom. Perhaps I could also feature Zelda and the one-liners in a book? My mind was bursting with ideas! Looking back, I realize our lives are like jigsaw puzzles without the picture on the box; we collect pieces that fit together, but it takes a while to see what picture will be revealed. Next, I wrote a business plan outlining how to launch Zelda. I aimed high; my goal was to eventually license Zelda cards with Hallmark. I researched the greeting card industry. It was important to come up with something no one else in the industry had done before. I saw two areas where Zelda would be different. First, no one had taken an individual living dog, given it a name and designed an entire greeting card line around it. I needed the best professional people I could find to help me launch Zelda Wisdom. Shane Young is a genius photographer. Sandi Serling is a public relations wiz. I had worked with both of them in my advertising career; we respected each other and loved working together. I bought twenty-four costumes right after Halloween at reduced prices. Shane and I photographed around the clock, and luckily Zelda loved being the center of attention. She also, we discovered, loved caramel ice cream bars as a reward for her time in front of the camera. We convinced a printer to produce the twenty-four card images and three poster images and give us ninety days to sell them and pay the bill. The gift stores in Oregon and Washington were our test market, and in order to reach them, we needed publicity. With her many contacts in the media world, Sandi landed Zelda in local newspapers and on television stations. Storeowners started calling to order Zelda Wisdom cards and posters. The results were extraordinary. The stores kept ordering more. Our product was flying off the shelves. Within a few months, we knew it was time to take the giant leap. More than fifteen hundred small greeting card companies like Zelda Wisdom would be at the show, and we were hoping to be picked up and licensed by one of the larger card companies. To that end, we sent a press kit and invitation to a top licensing agency. I remembered the advice a friend once told me: Everyone stopped to watch this funny bulldog running around in her bikini while sporting red, lip-shaped sunglasses! When the executives from the licensing agency stopped by, they had to fight their way to our booth! Here was a bulldog that was making people think, laugh and want more. Zelda was the hit of the National Stationery Show! We signed a contract with the licensing group, and they brought us licensees for

Zelda Wisdom cards, books, calendars and stationery. Soon there were contracts for Zelda Wisdom giftware and apparel. Today, we have reached our goal, and Zelda Wisdom cards are being produced and distributed worldwide by Hallmark. There is even a Dear Zelda column on our Web site where Zelda gives some tough but tender advice to her fans. You just have to be you, and never, never, never give up. Foreword by Susan Chernak McElroy It has been a long time, too long, since I have revisited my warmest memories of my beloved mutts. My first mutt, Keesha, was my animal companion for nearly eleven years. Keesha, a shepherd and malamute mix, was, I thought, from the best of all possible dog worlds. She brought me the devotion of her shepherd ancestry, the independence of her sled-dog heritage, and the unique beauty of blended breeds. When Keesha died, it was eleven years before another dog began calling to me again. At first, I dreamt about her. She showed herself over and over in my dreams, clear as spring water, vivid as autumn, so that I would recognize her instantly in waking time. She was a collie and shepherd mix, and maybe something else. Brown and furry beyond belief with eyes like brown topaz. Her name would be Arrow. Four months later, she made her appearance at an animal shelter. She was one of five skinny puppies rescued from a pier in Seattle. When I walked into the room she stood up and looked squarely at me. I burst into tears in that moment of recognition. Today, Arrow rests at my feet as I write. She is six years old and in her glorious prime. We have another dog, too, Strongheart. He is a purebred Anatolian Shepherd who protects our family, but it is Arrow, the mutt, who remains the guardian of my soul. Unforgettable Mutts is more than a validation to those of us who have loved mixed-breed dogs. It is also an important testimony against prejudice. This fascination we humans seem to have with blood purity, breeding, and origins has been a root cause of the suffering of millions of living beings, human and animal. I question this notion of blood purity at the canine level as well as at the human level. I remember some of the challenges my parents faced with our first two family dogs, Lady and Sugar, who were purebreds. Lady was crippled by hip dysplasia when she was only six months old. Sugar, at eight months, had been shuttled to four different homes because she did not live up to her show-dog potential. She was a coal-black shepherd and her color was not prized in the show ring back then. Strongheart, my current purebred dog, has been diagnosed with a peculiar auto-immune disorder, and his back legs are not strong. There is no question in my mind that these three dogs of mine have suffered just a few of the consequences of being pure of breed. Often, I have wondered, What has happened to us? Why are our hearts so hardened and our vision so corrupted with shallow appearances and a false image of value? How can people learn to see the worth, the vitality, and the enormous heart of the mutt? Her enthusiastic effort on behalf of these enchanting and devoted animals is admirable. Unforgettable Mutts so overflows with the essence of the pure heart and the nobility of the mixed-blood, that mutt owners everywhere will have to take precautions to keep themselves from bursting with pride. The next time you are called to find an animal companion, sit down and re-read this very special book that you hold in your hands. Then, go search for that one-of-a-kind mutt that the universe will never see again. I want a purebred dog. You know, like a German shepherd or a collie. It was August , we had been married less than a year, and had just moved into our first house in Southern California. I have always loved dogs, and had grown up with several, but was unable to have pets in the apartments I lived in before getting married. About a month after moving into our house, I was driving home from work one day, when all of the sudden it was as if my car switched to auto-pilot. The next thing I knew, I was pulling into the parking lot of the local animal shelter. Amazingly, I had never actually been to an animal shelter before, since all of the dogs I had as a child were brought home by my parents. There were only a few dogs at the shelter that day, but once I saw Barney I knew why I ended up there on this particular day. He looked like a cross



between Benji and Tramp the dog from the movie *The Lady and the Tramp*, and had such a loving, happy-go-lucky disposition. When I took him out to the play area, we bonded instantly. He was about a year old, and was brought in by a woman who found him wandering the streets, covered in chewing gum and dirt. She wanted to keep him, but was living in a small apartment, and already had another dog. The shelter manager told me that the woman was crying hysterically when she brought Barney in, concerned that he might not be adopted, and may have to be euthanized. Since I knew I was adopting him, I asked for her phone number to let her know that Barney had found a good home. Then I filled out the adoption paperwork, and Barney and I were on our way. On the drive home I was nervous anticipating how Jack would react. As soon as we walked through the door, Barney ran directly over to Jack as if he'd known him all his life, his tail wagging furiously, and smothering him with kisses. That night Barney and I camped out together on the living room floor because Jack refused to allow him in the bedroom. And the next morning, Jack insisted that I take Barney back to the shelter because he didn't want a mutt. But after a few hours of pleading, I finally convinced him to give Barney a chance. Fortunately, since Barney had already paved the way, things went a lot smoother when I adopted our next mutt, Zelda, a few years later. According to The Humane Society of the United States, approximately 75 percent of all dogs entering animal shelters each year are mutts. Although some are adopted, between one and two million mixed-breed dogs are euthanized. People are often hesitant to adopt a mutt because they are not sure what personality traits the dog will have, or they are under the common misconception that if a dog is not purebred, he or she must be somehow defective. This, of course, could not be further from the truth. But the main problem facing all dogs in this country, whether mutts or purebreds, is the pet overpopulation crisis. Between two to four million dogs are sadly destroyed in animal shelters each year. One of the main causes for this horrible statistic is pet owners who do not spay or neuter their dogs. In just six years, it is estimated that one unsprayed female dog and her un-neutered and unsprayed offspring can produce up to 67, puppies. Adopting a dog is saving a life, but if the dog is not immediately spayed or neutered, many other dogs will perish, simply because there are not enough homes for them. Many people would stop us, and still do, to ask what type of dogs they are. After realizing that Jack was not the only one who had a terrible misconception about mutts, I became determined to do something about it. I started a regional pet magazine in Orange County, California called *Pet Gazette*, featuring photos and descriptions of pets for adoption at neighborhood animal shelters. Many dogs were adopted as a result of my magazine, but I knew I had a long way to go. There were still millions of homeless mutts across the United States, and millions of people who needed convincing about how wonderful these dogs really are. Thinking of everything short of going on the Oprah show to get the word out, I decided a book would provide the best publicity for mutts on a national level. I sent a press release and a photo of Barney to newspapers nationwide, calling for photos and stories about mixed-breed dogs for my book. More than twenty newspapers ran my article, and I received nearly two thousand submissions from mutt lovers coast to coast. There were so many wonderful stories and photos, it was extremely difficult selecting which ones to include in the book. But after several months of poring through submissions, I finally narrowed it down to a strong representation of the millions of magnificent mutts across America. The result, *Unforgettable Mutts: Pure of Heart Not of Breed*, is a celebration and tribute to mutts past and present. President; Owney, the U. During his presidency, Lyndon Johnson took in a small white stray named Yuki, who was his constant companion at the White House; Hollywood animal trainer, Frank Inn, rescued the famous Benji from a Los Angeles animal shelter; and Nipper, the RCA mascot was rescued from a medical research lab by the Dawn Animal Agency. If Link performs the march while wearing the Bremen Mask , dogs will fall in line behind him and march along with him to the music, until he stops playing. It is also mentioned by Guru-Guru that a dog was the leader of the animal troupe, [9] and wore the Bremen Mask, which Guru-Guru stole. Mamamu Yan still believes her pet to be much cuter than the rest, [11] despite the fact that there are no other dogs in all of Labryna. Throughout the game, he can be seen fetching a red ball thrown by his master. Stockwell claims he is too busy to visit his dog, [17] and as such he becomes very lonely. One is Rolf, a dark-furred dog belong to Romio. The other is Growler, a light-brown dog, who, in the beginning of the game, blocks a staircase leading to the southwestern part of town. Dogs can be picked up and played with. Link can even play catch with them using bones found lying around. If the bone is thrown into a patch of grass or near a tree , the dog may bring back a few Rupees instead of the bone. Stalhounds , skeletal dog-like beasts, appear roaming Hyrule Field at night.
