In the following video I am playing the classical composition Fur Elise. Fur Elise As part of this blog I will continually be providing you with free video piano lessons. The way that I teach these lessons will be consistent with my own philosophies on teaching and learning music. I do like playing songs on the piano, but I do not like long hours of practice. I do not like tedious exercises and drills, but I do like learning piano pieces. I do like bridges, but I do not like burning bridges. I do not like drama, but I do like dromedary camels. Anyway! in accordance with my basic music philosophy, I will be teaching the piano by teaching you how to play actual songs. For those of you that would like to become exceptional piano players, I will use this blog to point you in the right direction. After each video lesson I will provide additional information for those of you that want to take things to the next level. The first song that I will teach you how to play is Fur Elise. This is the same song I am playing in the video above. Fur Elise was written by the composer Ludwig van Beethoven when he was already an established composer in Notice that the song is comprised of three different movements. A movement is a self-contained part of a musical composition. In other words, each individual movement could actually be considered its own song. For example, many people only learn the first movement of Fur Elise because it is the easiest. The first movement can be learned by anyone quite easily, and in addition, it is a beautiful piece of music that almost everyone loves to listen to. In the coming weeks I will be teaching you how to play all three movements. This will be done in 11 lessons. If you wish to learn the song without getting bogged down in theory and technical knowledge, then simply watch each video lesson one at a time. Make sure you sit at your piano or keyboard as you watch the lessons and practice what I teach you. Do not forget to rewind frequently until you internalize each new part. Fur Elise is one of the most amazing Piano songs that has been made especially for this musical instrument. And so, here I bring you the Piano notes of this beloved song. Many people are not much familiar with its name, but everyone in this world will definitely have heard this tune somewhere in their life.

Print Uploaded on Dec 22, Bagatelle No. It is usually classified as a bagatelle, but it is also sometimes referred to as an Albumblatt. The discoverer of the piece, Ludwig Nohl, affirmed that the original autographed manuscript, now lost, was dated 27 April There is a later version, with drastic changes to the accompaniment which was transcribed from a later manuscript by Barry Cooper. The most notable difference is in the first theme, the left-hand arpeggios are delayed by a 16th note beat. There are a few extra bars in the transitional section into the B section; and finally, the rising A minor arpeggio figure is moved later into the piece. The tempo marking Poco Moto is believed to have been on the manuscript that Ludwig Nohl transcribed now lost. The later version includes the marking Molto Grazioso. It is believed that Beethoven intended to add the piece to a cycle of bagatelles. Steblin admits that question marks remain for her conclusion. It begins with an A minor theme marked Poco moto little movement , with the left hand playing arpeggios alternating between A minor and E major. It then moves into a brief section based around C major and G major, before returning to the original theme. It then enters a lighter section in the subdominant key of the relative major of A minor C major , F major. It consists of a similar texture to the A section, where the right hand plays a melody over left hand arpeggios. It then enters a 32nd note C major figure before returning to the A section. The piece then moves to an agitated theme in D minor with an A pedal point, as the right hand plays diminished chords. This section then concludes with an ascending A minor arpeggio before beginning a chromatic descent over two octaves, and then returning to the A section. The piece ends in its starting key of A minor with an authentic cadence. Despite being called a bagatelle, the piece is in rondo form. The first theme is not technically difficult and is often taught alone as it provides a good basic exercise for piano pedalling technique. However, much greater technique is required for the B section as well as the rapid rising A minor figure in the C section. Kopitz presents the finding by the German organ scholar Johannes Quack that the letters that spell Elise can be decoded as the first three notes of the piece.
