Option 1 and 2: Including a Significant Other Another variation for Options 1 and 2 is perhaps including the mother or father or significant other. And this would be an obvious choice if both parents are accompanying the bride down the aisle, as well. I want them to be able to make an informed decision knowing all the choices that are available to them. Which leads us to Option 3. It all happens only to music. This option is what happens in about three-quarters of the ceremonies I officiate: All this happens seamlessly while the processional music plays, and the music fades out when the couple are in their place in front of the officiant. Then, we start our officiant speech. Here in Toronto, most couples take Option 3 for whatever reason. I think they like the idea of the hugging and the kissing and taking their place to the backdrop of the processional song they chose, rather than bringing everything to a grinding halt and then getting into place in silence. So there you have it: There may be a few others floating around there, but these three best cover the gamut " from full-on-traditional to an adaptable alternative to the whole thing set to music. Giving Away the Bride or Couple 9 / 11 / 17 9 / 11 / 17 The giving away of the bride is a traditional part of the ceremony that allows the parents of the Bride and the Groom to be part of the wedding ceremony.

Who Gives This Woman Away? Does it mean the same thing today? The doors to the grand entrance of the church open and in walks the bride, ready to be accompanied by her father down the aisle on a journey to happily marry the love of her life. As this is a timeless tradition at many weddings around the world, the father of the bride has played a major role in the presentation of the bride to her groom. In ancient times, it was very common for female children to have either arranged marriages or be purchased by their future groom so-to-speak. The root word "wedd" of Anglo-Saxon derivation actually means a "pledge" or "vow". The actual word wedding refers to a "wager". A female child in those days was known to be property of her father and so the transferring of "ownership" to her groom on her wedding day was indeed a legality. Do they still have a contractual agreement? No, of course not. It is more of a symbol of his blessing and wish of good health and happiness to the couple. In fact, in modern times, the mother is often more involved in some situations as the parents together may be asked the question of who gives the bride away by the officiant. Here is the most popular format used: We ask that you care for her and love her unconditionally as we have. The end result is still wedded bliss. How, though, has modern times influenced a modern bride? Due to divorces, widowings, remarriages, and female empowerment, there are various situations that now occur during a wedding ceremony. A bride now has to decide in a special situation like this, who will accompany her down the aisle, if applicable, and how it will be addressed during the presentation of the bride part of the ceremony. For example, if a bride has divorced parents, who will escort her? Her mother or father? In some cases, the bride has chosen the mother, for she has been her primary caretaker and has been closer to her daughter growing up. At my wedding ceremony, I chose to have both my father and stepfather walk me down as they both have played an integral part in my life. There may even be parental loss where the bride chooses to walk down alone as well. Who offers support and blessing to this couple? A bride and her family have the right to choose how she wants the biggest day of her life to play out. Some may call it "giving her away" and some may call it "giving her his blessing", but a father really gives the best of his love on that bittersweet day in time.

When Ziva is considering marrying Ray, everyone assumes Gibbs would walk her down the aisle. It does not happen, and never will. *Marrying Ray*, that is, not Gibbs walking her down the aisle. Ellie asks Chuck to look for their Disappeared Dad so he can walk her down at the altar. After Chuck successfully locates and rescues his father from Fulcrum with the help of his team, both Chuck and his dad do the task of giving Ellie away. Potter gave away the bride in an otherwise completely traditional Korean wedding. He had vetoed the wedding taking place in the compound; BJ said "but she wanted you to give her away," at which point he relented. Potter also gave Margaret away when she married Donald Penobscott. Unlike them, he realizes this entire discussion is ridiculous and that they must be under some sort of spell *The Original Series* episode "Balance of Terror" is interrupted by a red alert, we do get to see Scotty give Angela away.
