Unit Tests There will be three unit tests worth points each. Each unit test will consist of 50 multiple choice questions worth 2 points. There are no make-up tests. A comprehensive final exam will be given at the end of the semester for anyone wishing to make up a missed exam. Take-Home Essays There will be three take-home essay tests. Instructions for the essays are available on the blackboard site for this class and the due dates are listed on the calendar at the back of this syllabus and on blackboard. Each essay is worth points. Attendance and Participation Class attendance is mandatory, but it is not enough to just show up. The only way to make the class interesting and relevant to your lives is for everyone to come to class prepared to discuss the assigned reading and the current news items for the day. There will also be film clips shown on a daily basis that we will discuss and use as a supplemental resource. Some assignments will require you to bring information from internet or other media sources for discussion. All of these activities require you to be present to contribute to the quality of the class. Classroom Etiquette Tardies and other disturbances will not be tolerated. Expected classroom etiquette includes arriving to class on time, remaining in class until you are dismissed, and controlling whatever urges you feel to get up or disrupt class in other ways. Please inform me about any medical or other condition that might prevent you from meeting these basic requirements. It is also expected that you will show respect and consideration to me and your fellow students at all times. This includes paying attention and not engaging in other activities not related to what is happening in the class. If this is seen to be a regular problem, a mandatory conference will be scheduled to determine if you will remain in the class. Event Reports This assignment requires writing two reports on political events or activities. You may choose to attend any of the number of political events or meetings that take place in Austin on a regular basis. If attending two events outside of class is overly burdensome due to work or family, you may choose to substitute two other reports approved by me. There will be a large number of events throughout the semester that will qualify. Other events are listed in the Community section of the Chronicle and Statesman. You should not attend two meetings of the same group, though. They should be different organizations or events. The written portion of the assignment consists of a detailed report on each of the 2 events. Each report must be typed and a minimum of 2 pages 46 lines , double spaced, and in a normal 12 point font. This syllabus is typed in a normal 12 point font. The content of the report should be the important political issues that were discussed. You will need to take notes or record what is said in order to do this. I do not want a narrative about who was there and what happened. You should focus on what was said about substantive political issues. Points will also be deducted at a rate of 10 points per day , including weekends, after the due date. You are then responsible for making arrangements with me to fulfill the remaining course requirements by the end of the next semester. At that time, the Incomplete will be changed to the appropriate letter grade in your files. Withdrawal Policy Another alternative in the case of failure to attend class or meet the course requirements, is to officially withdraw from the class. It is your responsibility to officially withdraw from class if necessary. Withdrawal forms are available from the Admissions Office. Evaluation and Feedback There will be continuous evaluation of your performance and my performance throughout the semester. I will give you regular feedback through evaluation of your performance on homework and unit tests and through conversations with you about your participation in group activities and discussions. In return, I will be asking for periodic feedback from you concerning this course and my performance as your instructor. All of this is designed to allow everyone to perform to the best of their ability and improve the overall content and dynamics of the course. I am available for consultation during my posted office hours. If you need to meet with me at a different time, you can talk to me during class, email me or call my office at and make an appointment. It should not be viewed as a replacement for actual contact with an academic advisor. For questions related to your specific needs, please contact Dr. Students are not required to physically attend any classes on campus. Faculty, however, are located on the Dahlonega campus of the University of North Georgia. Students are free and encouraged, though not required, to arrange meetings with any faculty currently teaching in the program. This is a distinctive feature of the MAIA program. The on-line approach to instruction requires a great deal of self-discipline on the part of students. While the on-line delivery method provides students with a great deal of flexibility, all courses in the program will require weekly coursework in the form of postings, bulletin board participation, or position papers in addition to exams and formal paper assignments. Deadlines are established and posted for each activity. These deadlines are strictly adhered to. One of the most important elements to successfully completing a course is to remain in constant contact with the faculty in the program. During the course of a semester you need to remain in regular contact with your course instructor. If there is a problem or an issue, you need to let the faculty member know. Otherwise, we cannot help if there is an issue. His job is to help you deal with any issues related to the program and to ensure that you successfully complete the program. He will contact you several times during the semester to provide general information and advising. But if you have any other questions, concerns, problems, or issues please do not hesitate to contact him. You can also contact either Dr. Course Preparation Admission to the program does not require students to have any prior class work in international affairs. Students are, however, assumed to have some knowledge of the foundational aspects of the discipline. The faculty compiled a reading list to serve as a primer on international affairs. Students needing this basic knowledge, or just seeking a refresher, should have these readings completed prior to the beginning of the semester. Readings Prior to Class Students whose primary academic background was not in international affairs are strongly encouraged to review three books prior to the beginning of their first class. Though not exhaustive and in-depth, these texts cover foundational material in international affairs. Course work in the program assumes that each student is familiar with basic themes, concepts, and theories in international affairs. All three books are available on Amazon and many other online book outlets. Williams, Editor Suggested Course Load Students should not attempt to enroll in more than nine hours of courses in any given regular semester. Students may opt to take fewer hours. Students enrolled in nine hours are considered full time. Because the summer term is shorter, it is suggested that students take no more than three hours of coursework. Students can complete all degree requirements within a two year time period without taking more than nine hours in any term. One of the most important decisions that students will make once they enter the program is how many courses to take in a given a semester. Most of the classes in the MAIA are three credit hour classes, the only exception being the Capstone which is a six credit class. For students working full time it is not recommended to take more than six credit hours. While this may lengthen the program, enrolling in fewer courses allows the student to focus more on the courses they are taking. Please contact the MAIA graduate advisor for a more specific discussion about the class time commitments in the program. See the Degree Requirements Suggested Course Sequence While students may enroll in the program at any time during the year, the program coursework is sequenced for a fall initial start. Students should enroll in foundational courses for their first year and specialization courses their second year. If you begin either in the summer or spring terms the MAIA graduate advisor will work with you on your course selections.
