Published March 16, Submitted by: In time almost incredible fire department No. All the doors were opened and in a few minutes there were four nozzles pouring as many different streams into the burning building. The greater volume of smoke appeared to issue from the rear end of the basement and the fire is supposed to have [originated] in the property room. The firemen were unacquainted with the building and the basement was cut into so many different rooms, and side stairways that they could tell nothing about it, but go to work and turned the hose in every direction. The firemen asserted that had they been acquainted with the building they could have perhaps saved it. The resolution which passed the council requiring two firemen to be present at all entertainments was spurned by the owners of the opera houses and they were refused admittance. The firemen bitterly denounced Mr. Heffernan for his action in refusing them admission in conformity to the resolution of the council. It required but an instant for them to spread from the first floor to the top of the building after the fire reached the scenery. When Della Fox showed here Monday night, the company had its own special scenery and that of the opera house was taken down and stood upon end in the rear part of the stage. When the flames struck them the fire ran up like a flash to the top part of the building and soon caught in the roof and broke through. It was about 1 a. The Grand Opera enjoyed a period of popularity and success before falling by the wayside, a story that paralleled the fate of the Tabor family. This sort of transportation, however, was too slow and costly for most theatrical companies, especially for the opera troupes that enjoyed less popular appeal than circuses, stage plays, and song-and-dance acts. In two rail lines finished construction in Denver—one westward from Kansas City and the other a spur from the transcontinental Union Pacific mainline in Cheyenne—facilitating access to the city. Yet major opera companies still avoided Denver. Too many playing dates could be lost reaching the city and leaving it, and the town lacked a properly equipped theater with enough seating to make opera financially attractive to entrepreneurs. En route to New York City, the Gruenwalds found themselves stranded in Denver when heavy snows on the high plains blocked all roads east. Shortly, two evenings of entertainment were scheduled at the Denver Theatre, a sizable two-story wood structure at the northeast corner of G Sixteenth and Lawrence Streets. Enter the Tabors Silver magnate Horace A. Tabor and his architect, W. Edbrooke, went to inspect other opera facilities to gather ideas. Construction began that summer. Tabor proclaimed that no expense would be spared in bringing to Denver the finest opera house in the American West. Accordingly, Edbrooke imported cherrywood from Japan, mahogany from Honduras, and paintings from Europe to adorn the interior. Tabor wanted the opening of his opera house to be the grandest cultural and social event in the history of Colorado, and determined that the theater should be dedicated with a two-week season, beginning on September 6, Despite a chilly drizzle, a capacity crowd of 1, filled the Tabor Grand Opera House. Though Abbott had chosen Maritana as the dedicatory entertainment, she could not resist beginning the evening by singing the Mad Scene from Lucia di Lammermoor, a decision that she announced to the Rocky Mountain News the previous day. Newspaper accounts of the grand opening were ecstatic. Save for some uncertainty in the orchestra, the performance gave complete satisfaction. Headlines from the Rocky Mountain News blared: Abbott followed Maritana with a performance of Lucia, again garnering favorable reviews. Over the next two weeks, the Abbott organization mounted eight additional full-length productions, a remarkable achievement for any touring company, especially so early in the season. Abbott sang every night, with the exception of September 8 and 14, when she allowed Julia Rosewald to sing the soprano roles in Il trovatore and The Bohemian Girl. Between and , the Tabor hosted a number of operatic luminaries. Christine Nilsson and Amalia Materna gave concerts there in and , respectively. Waning Success The grandness of the Tabor Grand lasted only nine years. Thereafter, most of the leading attractions came to the Broadway rather than the Tabor. As for Horace Tabor, financial declines during the Panic of left him bankrupt, and he was forced to sell his opera house in It became a decrepit third-run movie house and was torn down in Virtually destitute, Tabor was charitably appointed postmaster of Denver in and died the following year.
