Hospital Pharmacy Technicians prepare and dispense medications to patients under supervision of pharmacists. The job description of the hospital pharmacy technician is identical to that of technicians that work in a public pharmacy, save for the fact that they get medication orders from hospital staff, instead of receiving prescriptions expressly from the patient. Also, they do not collect payment for medications given. When hospital pharmacy technicians take orders for medication from nurses or ward clerks, they arrange the quantity of medication ordered. In hospitals that have an automated medication dispensing system, the correct numbers of capsules or tablets are automatically dispensed into a cup or bottle for delivery to the patient who needs it. In case a hospital does not have the automated dispensing system, it is the duty of a pharmacy technician to count out the capsules or tablets manually. Hospital pharmacy technicians may at times compound medications. Among the type of medications that a hospital pharmacy technician compounds may include elixirs, in which he mixes a medication with a syrup base, or ointments consisting of a medication mixed into a semisolid base meant for topical application. Pharmacy technicians use standardized recipes to create compounded medications. Eventually, the hospital staff pharmacist would be responsible for the actions of hospital pharmacy technicians who work under them. Depending on the policy of the hospital, a hospital pharmacy technician may deliver an already prepared medication to the floor staff for distribution on the floor.

There is very good reason for this: Though their duties are similar, there are some key differences between working in a hospital pharmacy and a retail pharmacy. Many pharmacy technicians begin their career working in a retail pharmacy, but after a few years of experience, they may be hired to work in a hospital pharmacy. Although a handful of states do require pharmacy technicians to be board certified, the majority do not. The only requirements for becoming a pharmacy technician in most states are a clean background check and a high school diploma or GED. Many employers will give a basic reading and math test, and if the prospective employee passes, they can be hired. Many retail pharmacies have in-house training programs to teach the pharmacy technician how their systems work. They may or may not include certification in their training programs. Retail pharmacy technicians work under the close supervision of a licensed pharmacist. Duties of Retail Pharmacy Technicians Today there are few small, family-owned pharmacies. Most pharmacies are part of a large retail chain. These modern pharmacies have computerized systems which guide the pharmacy technician in their main duty of filling prescriptions. The pharmacy technician reads the prescription and inputs the data into the computer system. This involves typing in the information and scanning a copy of the original prescription. The pharmacist must then review the information. He will make sure that the prescription was transcribed correctly and check for any drug interaction problems. Once he has approved it, he will print the information on a form to be included with the prescription. This form will be used by the pharmacy technician to fill the prescription. Often this form will include the drug identification number which the pharmacy technician will match to the number on the stock bottle to make sure that the correct medication has been selected. This type of system makes filling prescriptions almost fool-proof. When the prescription is filled, the pharmacist must review it again before it is sold to the patient. Retail pharmacy technicians have many duties besides filling prescriptions. They spend much of their time interacting with patients when prescriptions are dropped off or picked up. They operate the cash register to sell prescriptions as well as other items sold in the store. They process insurance claims for the patient, which often involves being on the phone with insurance representatives. They also stock shelves, keep inventory records, clean the pharmacy, and file paperwork. They may even be asked to work in other areas of the store when needed. Qualifications of Hospital Pharmacy Technicians Regardless of which state a hospital is located in, they often only hire certified pharmacy technicians. Hospitals also look for pharmacy technicians who have at least 1 to 2 years of experience. Pharmacy technicians in a hospital are expected to have a greater working knowledge of medications than retail pharmacy technicians. They also have to understand more medical terminology because they may be required to read and update patient charts. Although they do work under the supervision of a licensed pharmacist, they are expected to work more independently than retail pharmacy technicians. They must also know how to create compound medications, IV fluids, and nutritional mixtures. Duties of Hospital Pharmacy Technicians In a hospital, the pharmacy technician does not deal with patients or process insurance claims. They spend more time filling prescriptions than any other duty. The process of filling prescriptions in a hospital is very different than in a retail pharmacy. In a retail pharmacy, the technician may fill up to prescriptions in a day. Each prescription will be anywhere from a 7 to 90 day supply of medication that the patient will administer to themselves at home. In a hospital pharmacy, the pharmacy technician may fill over individual doses of medications which are given to nurses to be administered to patients. Pros and Cons to Working in a Hospital Hospital pharmacy technicians enjoy earning the top pay in their field. They often have the best vacation and insurance benefits as well. However, retail pharmacy technicians often report

less stress in their jobs than those who work in hospitals. Retail pharmacy technicians often have a more flexible schedule than hospital technicians, and most do not have to work night shifts. Both hospital and retail pharmacy technicians find their jobs to be rewarding and feel respected. Working in a retail pharmacy is a great beginning for a pharmacy technician. This gives them an opportunity to learn about different medications and pharmacy procedures. They may be exposed to some compounding. After working in a retail pharmacy for at least one year, the technician may be able to be hired by a hospital if they are certified.

Pharmacy technicians assist licensed pharmacists with the preparation and distribution of prescription medications. In a hospital setting, the pharmacy technician helps fill orders for patients and ensures that they are delivered to the right units. They also help the pharmacist ensure that the pharmacy has the right amount of stock to meet patient needs. This technique allows pharmacies to create customized drugs that meet the needs of individual patients. For example, a patient may be allergic to the preservatives used in a particular drug. Compounding allows pharmacy professionals to create a drug that does not contain this preservative, helping the patient avoid an allergic reaction. Pharmacy technicians may compound solutions, suspensions, creams, ointments, elixirs, capsules, tablets and suppositories. This task involves weighing the ingredients and mixing them appropriately. The technician must also package and label compounded drugs. Filling Orders Pharmacy technicians help fill prescription orders written by physicians in a hospital. They verify orders, count out the correct number of capsules or tablets, and label completed orders. Some hospitals have automated counting machines, eliminating the need for pharmacy technicians to count pills by hand. The technicians must load these machines and monitor them during operation, however. A pharmacist must supervise the technician during this process and provide final approval for all orders filled by a technician. Inventory Control When a hospital pharmacy receives a delivery from a supplier, the pharmacy technician stocks the shelves and verifies that the amount of product in the package matches the amount of product ordered. A pharmacy technician may also have to perform inventory counts on a regular basis. This process helps determine whether a hospital pharmacy has the right amount of drugs on hand. It also gives pharmacy personnel an opportunity to identify expired drugs and remove them from stock so they are not used to fill prescription orders. Clerical Work Hospital pharmacy technicians perform a variety of clerical duties. They answer the telephone and provide customer service to physicians, nurses and other hospital staff members.
