He also stated how the works He was doing were a witness or proof. Remember, the Old Testament Scriptures—the ones Christ was referring to—were the only Scriptures available at that time. Christ directed those asking for proof that He was indeed the true Messiah to examine the Old Testament writings of the prophet Jonah concerning the length of time He would be dead. For if you believed Moses, you would believe Me; for he wrote about Me. But if you do not believe his writings, how will you believe My words? Said another way, Christ was telling them that what Moses wrote is just as much a part of Scripture as what He was saying. Moreover, it is not only necessary to believe what Moses wrote in the first five books of the Bible, but we must also believe what all the prophets wrote, in addition to the Psalms and other writings—the entire Old Testament. Ought not the Christ to have suffered these things and to enter into His glory? Christ authoritatively states His approval of the entirety of Scripture, showing the Old Testament is relevant. What were the Scriptures Timothy would have known from childhood? The Old Testament Scriptures were the only ones Timothy had. Peter, Philip and Paul preached Christ from the Old Testament Peter preached a powerful sermon on the Day of Pentecost—the beginning of the New Testament Church—that resulted in the conversion of 3,000 people. Peter did it, Philip did it, Paul did it and, as we have seen, Jesus Christ did it! Why would Herod make such a demand? Was it because he suspected this information was recorded in a prophecy of their Scriptures—the Old Testament? If so, he was right. This prophecy was fulfilled according to Matthew 1: So the Old Testament Scriptures add yet another detail about the birth of Christ. Moreover, Isaiah recorded several more prophecies about Christ, all of which were fulfilled. Some of the prophecies in the book of Isaiah point to the time when the Messiah was to be born and grow up from a child. The prophet also explains how Jesus was to be despised and rejected, not hailed as a mighty King and Deliverer. Again, we find the Old Testament is relevant in filling in more details about the life of Jesus Christ. Of the 39 books in the Old Testament, Christ, in the book of Revelation makes references to 31 of them. Actually, there are only four New Testament books that do not have a direct quote from the Old Testament: The New Testament is based on the Old Testament. How would one be able to understand the book of Revelation, for example, without Old Testament writers like Daniel and several of the other prophets? So is the Old Testament relevant?

Though the Bible was completed approximately 1, years ago, it remains absolutely relevant to the spiritual needs of people today. Hebrews says, "For the word of God is living and active, sharper than any two-edged sword, piercing to the division of soul and of spirit, of joints and of marrow.

I occasionally return to these guides when I have a problem or need an answer. But, about once a year, I sift through these documents and throw many of them away. But, while my collection of instruction manuals shrinks every year, my collection of Bibles and related study materials increases. My experience as a cold-case homicide detective is partially to blame for my growing Biblical library. Their accuracy is the key to their relevancy. When I first investigated the claims of the New Testament accounts, I knew their relevancy would be similarly dependent upon the degree to which they were true. I was thirty-five years old and a seasoned detective when I first began to evaluate the reliability of the Gospels using the same skill set I applied to my criminal investigations. Were the accounts written early enough to have been produced by eyewitnesses? Could they be corroborated by additional early witnesses, external archaeological or internal linguistic evidence? Were the accounts corrupted or changed over time? Did the authors possess a bias that would motivate them to lie? I investigated these attributes of the gospels and became convinced they were telling me the truth about Jesus of Nazareth. But their reliability and truthfulness were only part of the story. The gospels also accurately described something I observed in murderers. The more I spoke with these murderers, the more I realized they were just like me. And everyone else on the planet. Some had become fire captains, some teachers, some businessmen. They were good parents, reliable family members, and trustworthy employees. But they were all protecting a dark secret from their past; striving daily to convince a watching world they were good people, even though they had done something unspeakable. None of these killers committed more than one murder, and none would likely commit another. But each bore the burden of knowing who they really were, despite appearances. The penal code in my state describes crimes that are as old as human history. In fact, many of our statutes still reflect the Biblical language of the Old Testament. Some things change, but our fallen, base desires grudgingly remain. We are moral outlaws to one degree or another. The instruction manuals I routinely discard are still true, but they are no longer necessary. The Bible, however, is both true and necessary.
