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Here are a few tips for preparing your dog for the new arrival. During this exercise, it is crucial that you set clear boundaries. Challenge the dog to sniff from a distance, while you are holding the item. Repeat this activity a few times before the baby arrives. This will let your dog know that this room belongs to its pack leader and must be respected at all times. Start by taking your dog on a long walk. Before returning, wait at the door step; make sure your dog is in a calm-submissive state before inviting her in. Upon entering, your dog will instantly know there is a new scent in the house. If you have already introduced the scent, it will be somewhat familiar. The mother or father holding the baby must be in a completely calm state. The dog should be allowed to sniff the baby, but at a respectful distance. During this first meeting, do not bring the baby too close. Eventually, the dog can be allowed to get closer and closer to the baby. By doing this, you are teaching the dog to respect the baby as another pack leader. Once your child is in the exploratory state, it is important to supervise all interactions between him or her and the dog. This is a great opportunity to teach your child not to bother the dog, yank her tail, etc. These lessons on mutual respect cannot begin early enough. Too many children have inadvertently provoked an otherwise peaceful dog, simply because they were unsupervised or their parents had not given them proper instruction. A dog does not need toys or special attention to feel important; you simply need to maintain the routine, providing daily walks and consistent leadership. This will help your dog feel secure and allow her to relax about the new addition to the family. What is the key? Be honest with yourself. Can you control your dog at all times in all situations?

Deaf dog By Cesar Millan Balanced dogs experience the world through their nose, eyes, then ears. But as humans, we often rely on sound while training our dogs. So what if your dog is deaf? Dogs experience the world through their nose first, then eyes, then ears. We are accustomed as humans to relate through sound ears, sight eyes, and then scent nose. When we bring a new dog home, we immediately give him a name. Principle 6 for Achieving Balance: Nose, eyes, ears A person with a deaf dog has a unique opportunity to communicate with their dog as the animal they are. Dogs communicate through energy and body language. So what are the lessons a deaf dog can teach? So many humans are out of touch with Mother Nature. They are not mindfully aware and emotionally in tune. With a deaf dog, it is critical that you be present, feel the energy, read signals, and be in tune to yourself and the environment around you, just as you are asking your dog to do. You will need to bond with your dog in a way that he trusts you as his leader; a leader whose job is to provide him with protection and direction. So if you are going to cross the street, he looks to you to keep him safe. If you are turning the corner, he looks to you to show him which way to go. People ask me about dog training all the time. So much that I wrote a book about training and the various methods people use. And I talk about the differences between training and balance because one does not equal the other. What is the same is that you need to choose and find the method that works for you, what you are most comfortable with. But if you use sound, that can help you feel the energy behind the word and therefore project that energy to the dog. It will require time and patience and consistency. But to me, it is a wonderful opportunity. I rarely ever use words with dogs. I use hand signals, energy, and most importantly body language to communicate that I want the dog to sit, lay down, back up, come. They feel the energy. It can only be effective, however, if you are calm and assertive, in tune to your own emotions, confident in your ability, and trust; and your dog will reward you not only with his trust, but respect and loyalty too. Remember that feeling sorry for a dog does him no favors. And in fact, puts him at risk for not being able to achieve balance later in life. Dogs need leadership before love. Being consistent with this approach is how to maintain a balanced state of mind, and calm submission, regardless of any physical disability.

When your dog is alone, they will be calm and relaxed. You will be able to stay relaxed and know exactly what to do no matter what comes up with your dog. Even though you will be hard-pressed to find indoor lodging with your dog or many pet-friendly restaurants in Big Sur, it is still a great place to hike and camp with your dog. You and your pup can enjoy much of what Big Sur has to offer, which includes a pristine river to play in, lots of redwood trees to hike through, beach time, spectacular views, and a peaceful setting to just be with your best friend after a day of activity. Located just 25 miles south of Carmel, Big Sur makes a perfect getaway no matter where you live on the Central Coast. You can head down for the day or a long weekend, or stay over for a night on your way to Southern California. On your way to Big Sur, treat yourself and your dog to a beach romp at Garrapata Beach. Garrapata is located off Highway One just 6. There is roadside parking. Follow the trail and steps down to the beach. As long as the tide is not too high, you will find two miles of beachfront. Your dog must be leashed, but do not let that stop you from exploring this beach. We have enjoyed staying at Fernwood Resort, which has great access to the river for dogs who love to play in the water or just want to cool off on a hot day. Fernwood Resort has tent camping and tent cabins that both allow dogs. The Redwood Grill at the Fernwood Resort is one of the only restaurants we have been able to find in Big Sur that has a pet-friendly patio. The grill has an eclectic menu that includes salads, hummus, quesadillas, burgers including veggie, and sandwiches. Some of our fondest memories of our dog Sunshine are from our camping trips. The first time we went camping she was nine months old and was nervous when it got dark. There were little growls under her breath in response to unfamiliar sounds, but she soon became a veteran camper. Forest Service lands, pets must be leashed in developed campgrounds and picnic areas only. In the state parks, they must be on a leash at all times and are not allowed on trails. Even with these restrictions, there are still plenty of places to hike and romp with your dog. Pfeiffer Beach is one of the most popular coastal access points in Big Sur. We are grateful that it is dog friendly although dogs need to be on leash. This gem of a beach can be hard to find. The trick is locating Sycamore Canyon Road, which is unmarked. Once you find the turnout, make a very sharp turn. Then follow the narrow, winding road for about two miles until it ends. Dogs are allowed off leash on this trail. This hike offers breathtaking views of Big Sur Valley. The ranger station is located 32 miles south of Big Sur. The pull off is exactly 8. Look for the Prewitt Loop Trail North entrance sign on the east side of the highway. If you reach the ranger station you have gone too far. Parking is available in a small dirt turnout. Dogs can be off leash. The Prewitt Creek Trail is a mile loop only suitable for advanced hikers in excellent shape. For most people hiking with dogs, the trail is perfect for a one- or two-hour hike that meanders up the side of the hill with spectacular ocean views. You can hike for minutes and then turn around and come back down. About 30 minutes into the hike, you will come to a redwood grove, which will provide shade and a nice resting point.
