The Navy trained 12, men to become officers. Rank structure[ edit ] The student body is known as the Brigade of Midshipmen. Students attending the U. Naval Academy are appointed to the rank of midshipman and serve on active duty in that rank. They rank just below chief warrant officers. Rank Structure A member of the entering class—the fourth class, the lowest rank of midshipmen—is also known as a "plebe" plural plebes. Because the first year at the Academy is one of transformation from a civilian into a military officer, plebes must conform to a number of rules and regulations not placed on their seniors—the upper three classes of midshipmen—and have additional tasks and responsibilities that disappear upon promotion to midshipman third class. Third class midshipmen have been assimilated into the brigade and are treated with more respect because they are upperclassmen. They are commonly called "youngsters. Second class midshipmen are charged with training plebes. They report directly to the first class, and issue orders as necessary to carry out their responsibilities. Second class midshipmen are allowed to drive their own cars but may not park them on campus and are allowed to enter or exit the Yard campus in civilian attire weekends only. First class midshipmen have more freedoms and liberty in the brigade. While they must participate in mandatory sports and military activities and maintain academic standards, they are also charged with the leadership of the Brigade. They are commonly called "firsties". Firsties are allowed to park their cars on campus and have greater leave and liberty privileges than any other class. Five companies make up each battalion, for a total of 30 companies. The midshipman command structure is headed by a first class midshipman known as the brigade commander, chosen for outstanding leadership performance. Overseeing all brigade activities is the commandant of midshipmen, an active-duty Navy captain or Marine Corps colonel. Working for the commandant, experienced Navy and Marine Corps officers are assigned as company and battalion officers. All wear gold anchor insignia on both lapel collars of the service dress blue jacket.

The neighborhood soon became known as "Oklahoma" because the arrival of all the wagons with household goods waiting for the gates to open reminded people of the land rush in the Oklahoma Territory," said James W. Cheevers, senior curator at the Naval Academy Museum. Now, the houses on Upshur and Rodgers roads are among the oldest buildings on the yard. With their wrap around porches, intricate woodwork and numerous bedrooms, they offer a glimpse into life at the academy at the turn of the century, when it was common for large, middle-class families to have live-in servants. Many officers were forced to live in Annapolis, paying rents often inflated by landlords who knew their tenants had little choice over where they could live. While the houses in the neighborhood were being built, other problems in the yard surfaced, according to Mrs. The buildings, once part of Fort Severn and some more than years old, were run down beyond repair. Because of inadequate plumbing, raw sewage ran through the streets into the Severn River, leaving a stench in the air, and backed up in the pipes inside some buildings. Navy officials appointed a commission to solve these problems. His master plan required that the academy grounds be expanded, with landfills along its river and harbor shores. The buildings, in the French Renaissance style, were in units. Naval Academy, An Illustrated History. Flagg designed the chapel on the central high ground where it stands today. He planned a new dormitory for midshipmen -- what is now Bancroft Hall -- and a group of academic buildings that still stand. He also planned officer housing -- dubbed Captains Row -- along Porter Road. Those homes were completed in the early s. Flagg and some superintendents, the Board of Visitors decided the house was too grand for the superintendent. For three years, it was used as sick quarters until the board members changed their minds and allowed the superintendent to move in. A few months ago, I had a tea for some of the young Navy wives and I was quick to point out that this is not the norm for Navy housing. There are two kitchens, one on the main floor and the original kitchen in the basement with a dumbwaiter that was used to send food to the main floor. There is a large receiving room, library, living room, dining room and kitchen, all with foot ceilings, and an enclosed porch on the first floor. The house also has two staircases, one in the kitchen that was used by servants and the main staircase with a cherry-wood railing in the center of the house. There are voice tubes in the wall to summon servants and a button in the library to buzz servants in the kitchen. But after we had some friends visit us last fall, it became our home. It is the memories that make this a home.

Anyone wishing to become an officer in the Navy and possibly captain a ship someday has several options. Naval Academy in Annapolis, Maryland is a four-year undergraduate college that prepares graduates to work as officers in the Navy. This is a prestigious and challenging program that requires a Congressional nomination to apply. This week course is more rigorous than boot camp, and requires recruits to hold a degree before acceptance. Navy Newly commissioned officers celebrate at the U. Naval Academy class of graduation and commissioning ceremony. Once past their initial training, recruits may attend a technical school or take part in the Journeyman Program. This places each Navy recruit with more experienced sailors in a variety of ratings to learn various Navy tasks first hand. The Navy Reserve Navy reservists train one weekend per month and two weeks each year. They provide a ready force of trained sailors who can be called up if the Navy needs additional manpower for a specific reason. Life on shore for Navy personnel is much the same as it is on other military bases. Everyone receives a housing stipend new recruits usually live in dormitory-style apartments, and on-base housing is available for single sailors as well as larger families. Many amenities are included on the base, like grocery stores, medical facilities, churches and libraries. Recreational opportunities are provided as well, such as movie theaters, golf courses and fitness centers. The focus of Navy life, of course, is living and working on a ship. The standard Navy ship deployment lasts for six months; however, the Navy is experimenting with deployments shorter or longer than six months to make them more flexible and less predictable. Needless to say, living for six months or more with several hundred people on a ship means close quarters and a lot of patience and camaraderie. There is a great deal of work to be done at any given time on a Navy ship, so sailors are kept busy. In addition, every sailor gets 30 days of leave each year. They can fly for free on a stand-by basis on any Navy flight and most other military flights [source: Women play an important role in the modern Navy – their progress toward equal treatment and pay mirrored the equal rights movement in the United States. In 1948, Congress ordered that women be allowed to enter the Naval Academy. However, a law prevented women from serving on most Navy ships. This was overturned in 1949, and women have been serving their country aboard Navy vessels ever since.
