

Chapter 1 : Controlling Garden Pests in the Pumpkin Patch by Pumpkin Nook

The first is the popularity of growing much smaller melons, in the 1- to 7-pound category, to be consumed by a single eater. The second is using vertical space to maximize a garden plot, by training sprawling plants to grow upward, describes the second inclination. If you have as much as a 4-by-foot bed, or even a large container, you have space enough to grow watermelon. Trellises, Tepees and Fences Locating your melon patch against an existing chain-link fence provides a support for the developing fruit by simply tying the vines to the fence at intervals. Adding hinges at the top makes the frame portable. Watermelons also grow well on stout tepees lashed together with rope. Gently tie them in place with cord or soft cloth. As an added benefit, vines that bear the weight of fruit will grow stronger than their counterparts lolling on the ground. Consider removing all fruit but the best specimens on the vine, because the plant has to split the sugar it produces among all of them. The more melons per vine, the less sweet each will become. Container Growing For a plant as large as a watermelon, choose a container at least 18 inches deep. Placing a trellis or other support next to the plant will be necessary to save space and increase production. The trellis should not be simply pushed into the pot, however, but anchored to the ground if feasible. A trellis may also be constructed of stout wires firmly attached to a garden wall. In warm regions where watermelons grow best, U. Department of Agriculture plant hardiness zones 8 to 10a, the shade created by these vines rising vertically can be a boon to sun-sensitive, shorter plants below. Slings Any melons that reach 3 or more pounds need the added support of individual slings. Slings made of stretchy fabric, like an old T-shirt or recycled pantyhose, allow the fruit to expand, while securely cradling it. First, fasten one end of the cloth to the support, draping the middle under the fruit, and then tie the opposite end to the trellis, too. One of the smallest of all, "Little Baby Flower," at 2 to 4 pounds, is ready in approximately 70 days. Exotic but small and easily-trellised, "White Wonder" offers delectable taste and snow-white flesh. All of these perform best in USDA zones 8 to 10a. Since the plant is an annual, however, gardeners outside the recommended area can sow it after night temperatures exceed 50 F, if a sufficient growing season remains before day temperatures reach 90 F consistently.

Dolls, animals and easy patterns to inspire a joy of sewing: Perfect to make for baby showers, little ones or anyone who loves the cute loveable style of Japanese Kawaii! Finished bunny measures about 8 inches tall with ears pointed up and kitty measures about 5 inches tall. Disappearing ink marker and ruler: Scissors, sewing needles and pins: Clear drying craft glue: Print pattern onto regular printer paper - no need to re-size the pieces. Cut out pattern pieces and pin each piece onto your chosen felts. Carefully cut around patterns. To mark the grid onto the felt, keep the paper pattern piece pinned in place and gently lift its outer edges, using your disappearing ink marker to mark the beginning of the lines onto the felt. Then remove the pattern piece and use the ruler to connect the lines. The grid will help with the facial features and arm placement in later steps. Transfer the dots onto bunny ears with your disappearing ink marker. Try to keep your stitches small, neat and evenly spaced as this gives a nice, clean finish and prevents the stuffing from escaping from the seams. Click on any of the photos to enlarge them. Embroider details onto face using stem stitches to outline the eyes and snout. The eyelashes are straight stitches at the outer corners of each eye. Fill snout in with satin stitches. Embroider whiskers with straight stitches. Stitch the outline of the arms with evenly spaced running stitches. Now fold the front piece in half, right sides facing, and whip stitch the darts at the top of the head. Repeat on the back piece. This will help give the head a more rounded appearance. Position front onto back, wrong sides together and pin. Starting at the bottom, blanket stitch all the way around, leaving an opening for stuffing. Stuff firmly and blanket stitch opening closed. As you close the hole, add more stuffing to the bottom area if needed. The snuggle bunny or kitty should be full and plump and quite firm, but not to the point of bursting at the seams. To make the bunny ears, position an inner ear onto an outer ear, wrong sides facing. Blanket stitch around sides of ears, leaving the bottom edge open. This will allow the ears to bend. Fold a pipe cleaner in half and lay it onto the ear as shown. Fold the right side of the pipe cleaner so that it forms a right angle just above the bottom edge of the felt ear. Your frame should be just wide enough at the base so that it fits between the two dots marked at the bottom edge of the felt ear. Slide the pipe cleaner frame into the ear. Blanket stitch bottom closed. Fold the bottom right hand corner of the ear so that it aligns with the right hand dot. Blanket stitch the bottom edge down. Fold the bottom left hand corner of the ear so that it aligns with the dot on the left and blanket stitch the edge down. Pin ears onto head seam and ladder stitch front and back of each ear in place. If the ears seem to be a bit wobbly, do another row of ladder stitches to the front and backs to anchor them in place. To make the kitty ears, position front ear onto back ear, wrong sides facing. Blanket stitch around sides of ear, add a few pinches of stuffing to plump them up and blanket stitch opening closed. Squeeze a blob of glue or, use a Q-Tip to apply it onto the marked spot and position the pom-pom on top. Gently press the pom-pom down into the glue for a minute or two to set. To make the little bow, fold bow in half lengthwise, right sides facing. Make a few tight stitches at the center on the wrong side of the bow to create a permanent pinch. Fold bow in half width-wise, wrong sides facing. Blanket stitch the two short ends together. Fold bow so that the blanket stitches run down the center. Position short edge of Bow Center onto the center of the blanket stitches. Whip stitch short edge onto center of blanket stitches. Wrap the bow center around over the front of the Bow, and overlap the opposite short edge onto the stitched edge. Gently rub your pink coloured pencil into the cheek area adding layers of colour. Use your finger or a Q-Tip to gently smudge it in for a softer look. So, what you waiting for? Go grab your supplies and get started!

So does a wide variety of animal pests. Some of them gnaw away at the plant, while others like the fruit. More than a few pests like to make a snack of both plants and fruit! Some garden pests forage by day, while other will visit your pumpkin patch at night. Once they have found your pumpkin patch, they will return on a regular basis. The four basic ways of controlling garden pests are: In urban and suburban areas, hunting and trapping is not be an option. Repellent sprays have a limited effectiveness, They need to be re-applied regularly, and after a rainfall. Miss just one application, and the pests return. Fencing and pest netting, carries an upfront cost, but keeps most animals out. Once you have bought it, it should last for years. Deer - These foragers like both the plant and the fruit. During the summer, they feed on the growing tips of the vines, and tender, newer leaves. Just as the plant is recovering, they return to feed again. In the Fall, they like the ripe fruit. They are controlled by hunting, trapping, repellents and fencing or pest netting. More on Deer Control Rabbits You may find rabbits in your pumpkin patch by day, or at night. Rabbits like the tender leaves and growing tips, as well as new, small fruits. If you have lots of other tender greens, like lettuce and beans, they will visit them first. More importantly, they tunnel under a ripening fruit, and up into it from the bottom in search of seeds. A field cat is an excellent way to keep the population under control. We discourage the use of poisons in the garden, as it can get into the soil and ultimately the food you eat. More on mice and mole control Squirrels and Chipmunks Squirrels and cute little Chipmunks love pumpkin seeds. Just as you are ready to harvest your fruit, you find they have gnawed through your pumpkin to extract the seeds. They are notorious at attacking pumpkins left out on the front step. Hot pepper sprays should keep them away from ripe fruit. Spray often, and after each rain. Like their cousins mice and moles , squirrels and chipmunks can be controlled by traps and poisons. A field cat will help keep chipmunks under control. They seldom go after squirrels, which are bigger. More on Squirrel Control Woodchuck These nasty garden pests can be a real problem. There is little that will keep them away. They will climb over, or burrow under a fence. They will gnaw a hole in anything short of a metal wire. Their diet includes tasty, ripe and almost ripe fruit. Hunting and trapping are your only effective methods of controlling woodchucks. Make sure to learn and abide by your local hunting and trapping laws.
