Chapter 1: Joshua and the Israelites Enter the Promised Land (Joshua) | calendrierdelascience.com

He showed Moses the Promised Land, but did not let him enter in. The incident at the waters of Meribah Kadesh is recorded in Numbers Nearing the end of their forty years of wandering, the Israelites came to the Desert of Zin.

Write "Ephesians" on slips of paper and hand out to the students at the end of class. Pray that the Lord gives us good memories and tender hearts. Over head Projector see March - Visual Aid 4 on this blog. Chalk a huge mountain and place a small Moses at the top see Activity below for an example. A biblical map, showing the area that the Israelites had walked would also be helpful. What God says, happens. At the end of forty years of wandering in the wilderness, Moses, Joshua, and Caleb were the only older men in the middle of thousands of people who were under the age of Moses was years old by the time they finished their wanderings. We might think that someone who was sixty years old was a very old person, but in this group of Israelites, years was old! Moses told them that their clothes and their shoes had not worn out traveling in the wilderness for forty years or eaten bread or drunk wine or strong drink because God wanted them to know that He was the Lord God. Moses retold the laws and what God expected of them, being His chosen people. Moses did not want these younger Israelites to make the same mistakes that their parents had. He wanted them to be stronger, more faithful and less complaining. He gave the people a blessing. Moses went up from the plains of Moab point out on map, and went to the very tip-top of this mountain--Mt. The LORD showed Moses from this very high point on the mountain, the land that flowed with milk and honey. Was Moses able to go into the Promised Land? Remember when he hit the rock twice and asked the people, "Must we give you water from this rock? Then, Moses died up on the mountain and was buried in a valley in the land of Moab. The Bible says that no one today knows where Moses was buried. He was years old. He lived forty years in Egypt, forty years in Midian as a shepherd, and forty years in the wilderness. His eyes were sharp and he was still a strong man when he died. Just think of all the things that Moses had done like God wanted him to do! The children of Israel grieved and cried for thirty days. Discuss how loving God was to Moses, letting Moses at least see the beautiful land that God had promised His people. Hand out yellow paper. This is the background. Each student creates a beautiful picture of the Promised Land by using scraps of paper, bits of this and that any way the student chooses. Pass a small amount of cotton batting which can be pulled apart to create two small cloud.

Chapter 2: Why Did God Get Angry with Moses and Forbid Him from Entering Holy Land?

In this week's parashah, Moses and Aaron are told they will not be permitted to enter the Promised Land. Rabbi Charles Kroloff points out the need to consider whether or not Moses is a successful leader of the Israelites.

There is nothing to fear when we trust and obey God. Here is what I am commanding you to do. Be strong and brave. Do not be terrified. Do not lose hope. I am the Lord your God. I will be with you everywhere you go. Choose an older child or adult to be Moses. Chose a smaller child to be Joshua. Put a towel or cloth on each of their heads, and give Moses a staff or stick. Start with your Moses up in front of the group. We have studied all about Moses, the leader of the Israelites. God used Moses to lead the Israelites out of slavery in Egypt. God had promised to lead His people through the wilderness into a wonderful land. God said the land was good and spacious, and it would be flowing with milk and honey Exodus 3: The Israelites were now east of the Jordan River. God was going to give the Israelites the land that was west of the Jordan. The land was not a land without people, though. Point to cities on map. These people had homes, cities, and armies. Do you think all of these people would just give up their home land when the Israelites came? We will see that the Israelites will have to participate in many battles to conquer this land. Call up your Moses. Because the Israelites did not obey God while they were in the wilderness, God did not lead them straight into the land He had promised them. The very people who had been delivered out of Egypt by mighty miracles soon mumbled and grumbled about God and His provision for them! God said none of those grumblers would enter the Promised Land. Only Joshua and his good friend Caleb would enter Numbers After forty years of wandering, the entire generation of Israelites who were delivered from slavery had died, except Joshua and Caleb. It was the children who had been born during the wilderness years who were left now. By this time, Moses was over years old. Call up your Joshua to act this out with your Moses: God told Moses that Moses would die soon. Moses was not allowed to enter the Promised Land because on one occasion he had disobeyed God in front of all the Israelites Numbers Moses asked God to appoint another man to lead the Israelites Numbers Have kids act out: God told Moses to lay his hands on Joshua, and Joshua received the spirit of wisdom Numbers God told Joshua that he would be the one to lead the Israelites into the Promised Land Deuteronomy God warned that after the Israelites were in the Promised Land and their lives were going very well, they would turn from God and begin to worship other gods. God said He would burn with anger and many disasters would come upon the people Deuteronomy Use a chair for Moses to step up on. Then God instructed Moses to climb a mountain. There he could see the land of Canaan, the Promised Land. God always keeps His promises! He was always with Moses. Now Joshua was in charge of all the Israelites. Listen to what God told him: I will never leave you. I will never desert you. You will lead these people, and they will take the land as their very own. It is the land I promised with an oath to give their people long ago. Make sure you obey the whole law my servant Moses gave you. Do not turn away from it to the right or the left. Then you will have success everywhere you go. Never stop reading this Scroll of the Law. Day and night you must think about what it says. Make sure you do everything that is written in it. Then things will go well with you. And you will have great success. Notice how many times God told Joshua to be strong and brave. Why do you think God repeated phrase this so many times? It was important, God wanted Joshua to remember it. Hard times were coming. They would have to fight many battles. Do you have to be strong and brave when everything is easy? The Israelites would have to cross a big river, called the Jordan River. Joshua told the people to get ready. They would cross the Jordan River in three days. What is a spy? Someone who goes in secret to find out information. What would a military spy do? Joshua sent two spies to check out the new land, especially the city of Jericho. The two men crossed the Jordan River to get to the Promised Land. They went to the home of a woman named Rahab. The king of Jericho heard there were Israelite spies in his city. The king sent an urgent message to Rahab. He demanded that she turn the men in to him. Rahab hid the men under large bundles of flax plants on her roof. Rahab went up to talk to the men. She told them that she and her neighbors had heard terrifying stories about the Israelites. She knew that God was going to give the land to them. Rahab had heard about the mighty works God had done for the Israelites. They had all heard about God parting the

Red Sea, and the times God made the Israelites able to conquer other people. When we heard about it, our hearts melted away in fear. The Lord your God is the God who rules over heaven above and earth below. The spies promised never to harm her or anyone in her house as long as she did not tell anyone what they were doing. Do you think the spies will keep their promise? We will find out next week! The men ran into the hills and waited until it was safe to return to Joshua. When the men crossed back over the river to report back, they told Joshua everything that had happened. All of the people there are weak with fear because of us. God hates a lying tongue Proverbs 6: Rahab feared God and His people more than she feared men the king and his men. This is a principle found in Luke She took a great risk, lying for these men. Her actions gave proof of her faith and fear of God. Notice, James specifically names Rahab as a prostitute. Clearly, prostitution is wrong, just as lying is wrong. We are all sinners. We are only considered righteous by our faith.

Chapter 3: Why Did God Keep Moses From Seeing The Promised Land?

He allowed Moses, before he died at Mount Nebo (located directly east of Jerusalem), to view the broad panorama of the land inheritance he swore to give the descedants of Abraham, Isaac, and Jacob (Deuteronomy - 5).

God clearly commands Moses to speak to the rock, and the water would pour out to feed the children of Israel. So Moses struck the rock with his staff, and the water poured out. Why Did This Anger God? This angered God because God specifically commanded Moses to simply speak to the rock. Just like it may frustrate you if you specifically tell someone to do one thing, and they do another. In this same manner, it angered God. The reason this is such a big deal is because God is trying to prove a point to the Israelites. He is trying to prove that He will provide for their needs, and they only need to have faith in His word. Moses neglected to give God the glory for providing water for the Israelites. Instead, out of anger, Moses appeared to be the one who could bring it forth. This mistake by Moses caused him to never enter the promised land. Instead, God only allowed him to see the land before he died. However, many centuries later, Moses was allowed to be with Christ during the transfiguration of Christ. So eventually Moses did get the experience of being there. Important Lesson to Learn: We suffer grave consequences when we disobey. You cannot obey God without receiving some kind of blessing, and you cannot disobey God without receiving some negative consequence. Are you disobeying God right now? Are you living in obedience to His word? Have you accepted Christ to be your Lord? If not, I beg you to put your trust in Christ.

Chapter 4: Children's Bible Lessons: Lesson - Moses Sees The Promised Land

This Moses, seen in this way, is transformed, and his failure to enter the promised land is redolent with meaning for us. We spend our lives wandering in the desert, aiming towards ever receding goals.

Chapter 5: Moses Leads the People Out of Egypt (Exodus 14) | calendrierdelascience.com

In chapter 34 of Deuteronomy, God shows Moses the promised land but he is not allowed to enter there because he didn't sanctify Him in the midst of the children of Israel at the waters of Meribah-Kadesh (Deut, Nu).

God wants us to listen to Him and follow Him completely. Moses, go up close and listen to the LORD. Then come back and tell us, and we will do everything he says. God made a promise to Abraham that he would have an uncountable number of descendants - more than the stars in the sky! Pharaoh was the ruler of Egypt. What did Pharaoh say to Moses and ultimately to God? God sent terrible plagues upon the land of Egypt. Why did He do this? God was showing His incredible power. God had power over all the false gods that the Egyptians worshiped. Repeatedly God proved His power and might. Now remember, some of the Egyptians believed God - they were listening to Him. But Pharaoh would not. The last plague that God sent was by far the worse plague. God sent the death angel to kill the first-born child of every family and the firstborn of every animal. The Bible says that there was loud crying in Egypt for there was not a household without someone dead. During the night, Pharaoh summoned Moses and told him to leave Egypt. This is exactly what God said would happen. Moses and all the Israelites left in a hurry. Their bread did not even rise, and this is why Jewish people today still celebrate the Feast of Unleavened Bread. Out Of Egypt Exodus 14 Say: Moses led, people out of Egypt in the middle of the night. God did not lead Moses and the Israelites through enemy land. God led His people with a pillar of clouds during the day, and a pillar of fire at night. Following these incredible sights would remind them that God was always with them, guiding them each step of the way on their journey to the Promised Land. What has God given us so that we can know that God is always with us? The Bible something the Israelites did not have. God told Moses to lead the people toward the Red Sea. God would then do something amazing so all the Egyptians would know that He was the one true God Exodus Earlier, we read in the Bible that Pharaoh hardened his heart against God and would not listen to Him, but now we read that God hardened his heart. The hardening of a heart is a process - a repeated event. If a person hardens their heart too many times, he may come to a place where they cannot listen anymore. Once the Israelites had left Egypt, Pharaoh became upset that he released all of his slave workers, so he changed his mind - again. This happened just as God said it would. Pharaoh sent of his best chariots after Moses. The king of Egypt was told that the people had gotten away. Then Pharaoh and his officials changed their minds about them. To the east was the sea. The Israelites were trapped. Have you ever been trapped? Do you know how it feels to be completely trapped? To top it off, listen to what the people were saying to Moses: What have you done to us by bringing us out of Egypt? Let us serve the Egyptians. The Israelites were afraid. They were blaming Moses for being trapped. Moses answered the people. You will see how the Lord will save you today. Do you see those Egyptians? You will never see them again. The Lord will fight for you. Now listen to what God said. Then the Lord spoke to Moses. Tell the people of Israel to move on. Hold your wooden staff out. Reach your hand out over the Red Sea to part the water. Then the people can go through the sea on dry ground. The Lord told Moses to stop praying and get moving! Prayer must have a vital place in our lives, but there is also a place for action. Sometimes we know what to do, but we pray for more guidance as an excuse to postpone doing it. If we know what we should do, then it is time to get moving. I will make the hearts of the Egyptians stubborn. They will go in after the Israelites. I will gain glory for myself because of what will happen to Pharaoh, his whole army, his chariots and his horsemen. The Egyptians will know that I am the Lord. I will gain glory because of what will happen to all of them. Remember that earlier I told you that the Lord placed a pillar of clouds to lead the Israelites by day and a pillar of fire to lead them by night. Just at this moment, God moved these pillars in between the Israelites and the Egyptian army, so that the cloud brought darkness to one side and light to the other. Neither army went near the other all night long. Then Moses reached his hand out over the Red Sea. All that night the Lord pushed the sea back with a strong east wind. He turned the sea into dry land. The waters were parted. The people of Israel went through the sea on dry ground. There was a wall of water on their right side and on their left. There was no apparent way of escape, but the Lord opened up a dry path through the sea. Sometimes we find ourselves caught in a problem and see no way out. Can you imagine

walking across the Sea with a wall of water on each side? Do you think the kids poked at the water? Do you think it was exciting? And listen to what God did next! The Egyptians chased them. Near the end of the night, the Lord looked down from the pillar of fire and cloud. He saw the Egyptian army and threw it into a panic. He kept their chariot wheels from turning freely. That made the chariots hard to drive. The Lord is fighting for Israel against Egypt. The waters will flow back over the Egyptians and their chariots and horsemen. At sunrise, the sea went back to its place. The Egyptians tried to run away from the sea. But the Lord swept them into it. The water flowed back and covered the chariots and horsemen. It covered the entire army of Pharaoh that had followed the people of Israel into the sea. Not one of the Egyptians was left. God had already sent TEN plagues upon the people of Egypt. He gave them many opportunities to listen and obey. They chased after the Israelites, and died because of it. Terrible consequences come to those who will not listen to God. God delivered His people, the Israelites.

Jesus Christ was only struck once in the sense that He was only abused of man once. There is nothing but glory left for Him to experience! He does not need to be struck twice. What are His instructions? The life-giving waters are flowing freely from Jesus Christ today. Everything that is wrong with us, Jesus Christ died to pay that debt. Jesus Christ was punished on our behalf, that we may enjoy the benefits of eternal life in Heaven!

The Bible says that the Lord overthrew the Egyptians in the midst of the sea! The waters returned and covered the chariots, the horsemen and all of the army of the Pharaoh, and not one of them was left standing! After the Israelites had crossed over and seen this supernatural event occur right before their very eyes, they then believed in Moses and the Lord. Before God decides to take the children of Israel into the Promised Land, He first tests them by keeping them out in the wilderness for about two and half years. Please remember, it was only about a 3-day journey to get to the Promised Land of Canaan. However, God apparently took them on the longer route to test their patience, their resolve and whether or not they would stay faithful and loyal to Him through this journey. During the time of testing in this wilderness experience, the first thing God wanted to see was whether His people would keep His laws and commandments. Therefore, God then presents Moses with the laws that He wants the Israelites to abide by, during a private and dramatic meeting up on Mt. It was during this second meeting that God gives Moses the 10 commandments written on a stone tablet. He was given two tablets and the tablets had writings on both sides. All of the writing on the tablets was the handwriting of God Himself â€" literally engraved right on these stone tablets. Near the beginning of the year journey through the wilderness at about the two and half year mark, God brings the children of Israel up to the borders of the Promised Land â€" the land of Canaan. According to Biblical timelines, this would have been about B. Moses sent 12 spies into the land to investigate it out before decided to enter in. Ten of the twelve spies come back with a negative report. They tell the rest of the Israelites that the people who dwell in this land are giants and that cities are high-walled and well protected. Therefore, fears about larger men and strong walls kept the Israelites from having faith that God could give them victory. After hearing these negative reports, Caleb speaks out and says: Here is the direct word from God Himself: But my servant Caleb, because he had another spirit with him, and hath followed me fully, him will I bring into the land whereinto he went; and his seed shall possess it. The rest of the Israelites 20 years and older all died out in the wilderness over the next 40 years due to their lack of faith in the one true God. Even Moses was forbidden from entering the Promised Land because he took the focus off of God and allowed the people to believe that he was performing a miracle by striking a rock to get water to come out of it. Egyptian bondage and oppression increase, especially towards the Hebrew people. This period saw the beginning of the Hurrian conquests. The Cretan palaces at Knossos and other centers flourish despite disasters. The city of Mycenae, located in the northeast Peloponnesus, comes to dominate the rest of Achaea, giving its name to Mycenaean civilization.
