We expect to offer four emblems, each of which will, respectively, emphasize one of the following age-appropriate themes: Catholic participants in our "Walk in the Light" emblems program can be confident that all the teachings within the curriculum are consistent with the teachings of the Magisterium. Each emblem will introduce a Trailman to additional intellectual resources, saints and heroes of the faith, prayers, devotions, and sacramentals. The emblems will be made available online, but it will include interactive, service, and mentoring elements. Many aspects of the program are still subject to further revision, and we invite your suggestions. Nonetheless, below is a basic explanation of the overall program and an introduction to each emblem.

Woodlands The Familia Dei "Family of God" Emblem There are actually three "ribbons" within this emblem, and each ribbon is designed to be earned during a specific stage in the Woodlands Trail. If they choose to do so, Catholics in Trail Life can quite literally be working on a religious emblem nearly the entire time they are in Trail Life. The "Our Father" ribbon is aimed at boys at ages ; the "His Mercy Endures Forever" ribbon is aimed at boys at ages ; and the "I Shall Not Fear" ribbon is aimed at boys at ages The sacramental focus of each ribbon is, respectively, Baptism, Reconciliation, and the Anointing of the Sick. Each ribbon emphasizes a distinct liturgical season: Christmas, Lent, and especially the Passion of Christ. The scriptural focus of this emblem is on the Ten Commandments and the Prodigal Son, and the theological virtue and corresponding theme that is emphasized are Hope and Mercy. The emblem emphasizes God the Father, and the social interactive work of this emblem is to introduce the concept of spiritual fatherhood by introducing the young Trailmen to a spiritual father, such as his pastor or his Bishop. The scriptural focus is on the Last Supper, the Beatitudes, and the Parable of the Talents, and the theological virtue and corresponding theme that is emphasized are Charity and Sacrificial Love. Specific points of emphasis are Adoration of the Blessed Sacrament, devotional praying of the Rosary, and the Spiritual Works of Mercy. The emblem emphasizes God the Son, and the social interactive work of this emblem is to introduce the concept of fraternal support by introducing the young Trailmen to the Knights of Columbus or a Squires Circle, or the Delta Life option within Trail Life. The scriptural focus is on the Acts of the Apostles and the Epistles, and the theological virtue and corresponding theme that is emphasized are Faith and Fidelity. The emblem emphasizes God the Holy Spirit, and the social interactive work of this emblem is to introduce the concept of communal faith life by introducing the young Trailmen to a monastic community. The scriptural focus is on the Great Commission. The social interactive work of this emblem is to introduce the concept of vocational discernment by introducing the young Trailmen to one or more seminarians as well as to a husband and father. Many religious-faith groups have programs of intensive religious education for individual Cub Scouts, Boy Scouts, Venturers and Sea Scouts. Religious Emblems are designed to recognize youth and adults who demonstrate faith, observe the creeds or principles of the faith, and give service.

United States[edit] In the United States, there are more than thirty different religious emblems, each representing a different faith. A diverse selection of religious groups participate in the program, including denominations of Christianity and other Abrahamic religions , the Dharmic religions and Zoroastrianism. The religious emblems are "created by the various religious groups to encourage youth to grow stronger in their faith. The religious groups, not the youth organizations, have created the emblem programs themselves. Each religious organization develops and administers its own program. Some offer different programs or emblems for each youth organization. Once a youth has completed the program of their religion, they are usually presented with the emblem at a ceremony organized by their religious institution or the youth organization. The emblem is generally in the form of a medal, pin, or patch. Depending on the youth organization, the emblem can be worn only on formal or religious occasions, or may be worn all the time. Many of the religions also have awards for adult members; however, adult members are generally nominated by others for service to the religion within Scouting. A few religious organizations offer awards for adults who serve as leaders or mentors for youth earning the awards. In most cases, adults do not have a formal program to complete to earn an award. The medals are usually only worn on special occasions, pinned immediately above the top of the left pocket flap of the uniform shirt. Youth may earn an emblem whether or not they are members of a unit operated by a religious organization. Chapter 4 : Religious Emblems for Boy Scouts, Venturers, and Explorers

Building Faith in Youth. We are known for the P.R.A.Y. Program - a Bible-based religious emblems program for Protestant and Independent Christian churches designed to bring children, youth, and families to Christ.

Generally each religious emblem program is a progression of learning, starting in Cub Scouting and ending years later as an older Boy Scout, Venture Scout or Explorer. Each program has specific emblems that are linked with age appropriate requirements. At the Boy Scout level the program focuses on the relationship of the Scout to his life in the community of his faith. And at the final level the program examines how the Scout will apply his or her faith in his or her life. In each case, the program material focuses on similarities between how the Scout sees himself in successively broader relationships and his relationship with God. In addition, each of the programs begins with simple concepts and moves toward more complex understanding through successive level of learning about religious writings, religious figures, religious celebrations, acts of service and worship with each religious emblem in the series offered by a particular religion. As the Scout grows in the Scouting family, he can participate in successive religious emblem programs at each age level that are more and more challenging. However, none of these programs at any level is a prerequisite to starting a program at another level. These religious emblems are presented by religious organizations to Scouts, who work with their religious leader or a counselor through a fairly demanding program of requirements that may take from a few months to a year or more to complete. By completing such a program, a Scout will learn about his relationship to his religious beliefs and grow spiritually. At the same time that Scout will be developing better character. Scouting Encourages Religious Emblems Program Participation Although religious emblems are not Scouting awards, the Boy Scouts of America encourages its members to participate in religious emblem programs and allows its member Scouts to wear these emblems on their uniforms. A Scout or Scouter who receives a religious emblem may wear the medal, medallion award or the appropriate square knot silver knot on purple for awards earned as a Scout, purple knot on silver for awards earned as a Scouter. Scouting also provides training to adult leaders to familiarize them with the opportunity for Scouts to grow in their own religious convictions through religious emblem programs. Religious emblem program information is also available at Scout Roundtables and Scout Service Centers. Wearing Religious Emblems and Awards Religious medals and award ribbons are worn only on formal occasions. The universal youth religious award square knot No. All Scouts and Scouters who received a religious emblem in their youth may wear the universal youth religious emblem square knot No. Otherwise it may be placed in any of the positions above the left uniform pocket flap for knots. Those receiving a religious award as a Webelos Scout should wear the gold Webelos device No. Those who earned the award as an Explorer should wear the gold Explorer device No. If more than one emblem was earned as a youth, only one knot is worn and any combination of the appropriate devices may be worn centered on the knot.

You should first get the signature of your parents stating that they approve of your involvement in the program. You should then have the counselor sign that s he is willing to work with you on the program. The Scoutmaster should then sign certifying that you have met all the requirements to start the program, and that s he is aware of your involvement in the program. Lastly, you should get the approval of your pastor for you to work on and receive the emblem. All journal entries, reports, and written work should be legible and neat. There are three parts to each step. When all parts of a step are completed, review the emblem book with the counselor. Keep the Religious Emblems Coordinator informed of his progress. National Catholic Leadership Development and counselor training are also recommended and may be required for counselors in your eparchy. Actively coach the youth throughout the program.
