

Chapter 1 : Sarah, Plain and Tall by Kathy Wong on Prezi

This is really a lovely little story, beautifully told, deceptively simple, full of hope and fear and love. Sarah, Plain and Tall, winner of the Newbery Medal (one the shortest books ever to win that award), was written in but feels like something from a much earlier time.

The novel won many awards, including the prestigious Newbery Medal in 1966. She tells him that Mama used to sing every day. Papa sang too, but both children know he does not sing anymore. They are lonely for Mama, who is gone, and in a way they are lonely for Papa, too, because he is no longer the same man he was when their Mama was alive. Anna bakes bread, and Caleb presses her to tell the story of his birth. She says he came out looking like dough, but he wants the story the way he knows it. She keeps one more thought to herself, too: That was the worst thing about Caleb. Anna was so sad that at first she could not love Caleb, not for three days. Even when she learned to love him, the house seemed empty. Papa comes in, and Caleb asks him why he does not sing anymore. He shows the children a letter from a woman named Sarah. In it, she explains that she has always lived with her brother, who is now getting married, which makes her feel she must find another place to live. She invites Papa to write if this sounds okay to him. Anna, Caleb, and Papa all write letters to Sarah. Anna wants to know if she can braid hair and bake. Caleb wants to know if she knows how to make fires and if she snores. Seal has never told me. Sarah always writes about the sea, and Anna can tell she will miss the ocean if she comes to live on the prairie. Caleb worries that he is too loud to be lovable and that their house is too small. When they learn she is coming, the family spends the day smiling over their farm chores. When Sarah comes, Papa combs his hair and dresses up to go meet her. The children wait on the front porch, eager but scared. On that count, he has to reassure himself. Sarah and her cat, Seal, are with him. Caleb rushes to her and asks if she brought the sea. Caleb points out that there is no sea nearby, and Sarah tells him that the rolling prairie is a little like the sea. Sarah, Plain and Tall by Patricia MacLachlan is the story of Sarah Wheaton, who travels from Maine to the prairie in response to a family's advertisement for a wife and mother. This simple tale of belonging and family will inspire readers of all ages.

Sister Anna has moved to town to attend high school, leaving Caleb to "reluctantly" take over her journal writing. The warmth and love of Wittig family life come through in this heartwarming tale from the prairie. Objective Students will gain an understanding of the use of prediction as a reading strategy. Students will practice making, confirming, and revising simple predictions about what will be found in a text e. If you have read the previous books together, simply remind your class of their events. What different perspective might he bring? Can they predict who is pictured? Where might the family be going? Who is the older man in the back? Who might the little girl be? Stop reading halfway through the book. After finishing Chapter 6, it might be a good place to stop. Have them draw a line down the middle of a lined sheet of paper. Have each student share his or her predictions with the rest of the class. Talk about the predictions and the supporting clues. Are many the same? Why or why not? Will there be more from the Wittigs? Ask each student to choose his or her favorite character. Try to ensure that not all students choose the same one. Have students write a paragraph about what might happen to his or her chosen character over the next five years. Depending on the abilities of your class, you may also ask them to make predictions about the next ten years and beyond. Share these predictions with your class. Post the paragraphs on a classroom bulletin board. *Prairie Songs by Pam Conrad* A harsh and unrelenting look at the realities of prairie life.
