This should be during late summer or early fall to give birds plenty of time to locate them. Time will allow the houses to be well-weathered by then. It may be a good idea to leave the birdhouses up year round so they can serve as roosting sites or shelter for migratory birds during winter. It can be taken down after the nesting season for cleaning and put back in place. There are instances that birds will not begin nesting immediately as it takes time for birds to find a birdhouse. If it is impossible to set-up birdhouses by fall, they should be in place as early as possible in the winter. Bird watchers should not wait to see birds in their yards before mounting or hanging their nest boxes. Location of the birdhouse is as important in attracting certain kinds of birds as the size of the box. Birds depending on the specie may prefer wooded to shady area or open grassy areas. However, dense shade is not recommended as most birds prefer a sunny open space. It is not advisable to mount birdhouses on the sides of trees as this can give squirrels and cats easy access to it. The best way to erect small nest houses is to use free-standing metal poles or PVC pipes. This option offers various advantages such as being able to mount at a higher position. Most predators find it difficult to climb poles and poles can easily be equipped with predator guards. If there is no other option but to attach a box to a living tree, nails should not be used. A strand of galvanized wire slipped through the vent holes with a bungee cord attached to both ends is a better alternative. Again, other preventive measures should be taken as this location provides an easy route for predators to reach the box. All houses should be securely fastened to prevent swinging as birds do not appreciate moving houses. Birdhouses should be from 5 to 30 feet above the ground and placed where it will be inaccessible to enemies. The sides of the houses and fence rails are also suitable sites depending on the species to be attracted. Regardless of where they are located, birdhouses should be placed at least 25 feet apart. There is such a thing as the concept of territory so proper distancing between birdhouses should be observed. The major factor that will determine what specie will nest on a particular property is the habitat surrounding the box. The absence of the right habitat will make it unlikely for birds to find the birdhouse. The most perfect box is nothing without it. Houses should be mounted with the entrance hole facing slightly downward and away from prevailing winds to keep rain from entering the house. When the aim is to attract a variety of species to nest boxes while at the same time maintaining ample room; pairing of boxes should be done. This involves placing boxes in pairs on poles for bird species that can nest closely to one another. It offers the advantage of allowing more birds of varied species to peacefully coexist within the same habitat. Golf courses, cultivated fields, gardens and yards are all potentially good habitats for nest boxes. However, areas where pesticides and herbicides are used should be avoided. They are harmful to birds and sometimes succeed in eliminating insect populations. This will not serve the best interest of the birds as insects are the primary food source of many cavity-nesting species.

Chapter 4 : Bird Bath & All You Need To Know In Keeping Your Backyard Birds Happy

Backyard birding involves meeting birds' basic survival needs for food, water, and shelter, and for many birders, getting started with birdhouses is the most intimidating step of creating a bird sanctuary.

Hang Up A Bird Feeder There is a reason why bird feeders are the most popular item bought to attract birds. Some have suction cups so they can get stuck to windows, others have rods so they can get attached to posts or walls. Then there are suet feeders. They are like cakes made from beef fat and usually have seeds added. They are very nutritious and high in protein, and from my experience, birds like suet feeders more than normal feeders! Most people buy little boxes made from chicken wire to slip the suet inside. Also avoid hanging them where rain water will gather and pour down, as bird seeds will rot if they get wet. Make sure to wash your feeder with mild soap every time you add seeds.

Add A Bird Bath Most people think that bird baths are useless to attract birds, as the only purpose they serve is for decoration. Birds love bird baths almost as much as bird feeders. Actually, birds need the bird baths just as much as seeds! Birds need to bathe because bugs cling to them and could be deadly. Birds also need to stay hydrated. These are two reasons why birds need bird baths! A bird bath should be placed in a sunny area, preferably near a food source such as grass or a feeder. The reason for this is because birds enjoy a drink of water before and after having food. Birds are also very clean animals so they enjoy having a little bathe after having food. As I mentioned before, bird baths are very important. They provide water, a place to bathe and relax, and it can double as a very beautiful feature to your yard! The ones that are built to be hung up are usually just a shallow plate with string. Some are built for standing on the ground. These ones are usually about 2 feet in height. And have one thin leg with a plate on top. The water added to bird baths should be chlorine free. Change the water every week, and rinse with a hose. Do not use soap! The problem with bird baths is that mosquitoes lay their eggs in the water and they reproduce within days! To stop this, you can buy little tablets made to add to water. Make sure to check the label, as those that are dangerous for animals can kill birds! But there is a simple solution, build the birdies a home! That way they can live in your backyard! If you want to add bird houses to your backyard, you have three options. Then there are other ones which are expensive, but birds love them! And just like with the first choice, some can be cheap but not good and others can be expensive but very good. The kit will contain pieces of wood already cut into the pieces you need , nails, and all the building materials. They provide shelter, fresh air and food. 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Install bluebird houses at least feet off the ground in a moderately open area with a few bushes and shrubs interspersed throughout. Purple Martin Houses - Purple Martins like to nest in colonies but prefer to keep humans and other structures at a safe distance, so the more open the area the better. Purple martin houses are best placed in a centrally located area of the yard that is at least 40 feet away from human habitats and trees. Housing can face any direction. However, once you have decided on an orientation, it is important that the house remain secure and the direction it is facing does not change. If the house shifts on its pole, Purple Martins may become disoriented, causing them to abandon their nests. Bat Houses - Believe it or not, bats are an incredibly beneficial addition to your yard. Bats are the single most effective natural source of mosquito and insect control and have the ability to eat their body weight in bugs during one evening alone! Bat houses should be placed high on buildings or posts, typically feet above ground. Placing a bat house next to vents on the outside of a home with an attic will deter the creatures from inhabiting homes. In many cases this is also a safe way to move bats that are already nesting in homes.
