Early career[edit] Before he entered high school, Knotts began performing as a ventriloquist and comedian at various church and school functions. After high school, he traveled to New York City to try to make his way as a comedian, but returned home to attend West Virginia University when his career failed to take off. After his college freshman year, Knotts joined the U. Army and spent most of his service entertaining troops. In a TV Guide magazine interview in the s, he said that he had grown tired of playing straight man for a hunk of wood when he was in the Army. According to Knotts, he tossed the dummy overboard off a ship in the South Pacific. He swore that he could hear the dummy calling for help as the ship sailed on, leaving him bobbing helplessly in the waves. Knotts served in the U. Army from June 21, to January 6, Discharged in the rank of Technician Grade 5, which was the equivalent then of a Corporal. Knotts returned to West Virginia University after being demobilized and graduated in He married and moved back to New York, where connections he had made while in the Special Services Branch helped him break into show business. Knotts left the series in Knotts then began his Universal five-film contract with The Ghost and Mr. Knotts reprised his role as Barney Fife several times in the s: In the late s and early s, Knotts served as the spokesman for Dodge trucks and was featured prominently in a series of print ads and dealer brochures. The series, which was already an established hit, added Knotts to the cast when the original landlords, Helen Roper and her husband Stanley Roper a married couple played by Audra Lindley and Norman Fell , respectively left the series to star in their own short-lived spin-off series The Ropers. On set, Knotts easily integrated himself to the already-established cast who were, as John Ritter put it, "so scared" of Knotts because of his star status when he joined the cast. Knotts remained on the series until it ended in In early , Knotts joined the cast of the first-run syndication comedy What a Country! In , Knotts joined Andy Griffith in another show, playing the recurring role of pesky neighbor Les Calhoun on Matlock until In , Knotts played a small but pivotal role as a mysterious TV repairman in Pleasantville. Knotts was recognized in with a star on the Hollywood Walk of Fame. He continued to act on stage, but much of his film and television work after was as voice talent. Knotts also spoofed his appearances on that show in various promotions for Cartoon Network and in a parody on Robot Chicken , where he was teamed with Phyllis Diller. The year-old soldier was assigned to the Special Services Branch, where he entertained the troops. It was while in the Army that Don ditched ventriloquism for straight comedy. Don returned to West Virginia University after being demobilized. After graduating with a degree in theater in , he married and moved back to New York, where connections he had made while in the Special Services Branch helped him break into show business. His mid popularity as a movie comedian began to wane towards the end of the decade, and the contract was not renewed. Don returned to television as the star of his own variety show, but it was quickly canceled. During the s, Don had a spotty career, appearing in regional theater and making guest appearances on other television series. He remained busy for the next ten years touring with plays and doing voice-over work for cartoons. It turned out to be one of his final films.
