About that, she says that she always wanted to be honest with her writings. She even says that none of the adults were honest with her and therefore, she did not have the right information that she should have at the time of writing those novels. Author Blume is often praised by her readers for being frank and the way she addresses their anxieties and fear of teen sex, masturbation, birth control, menstruation, and death. There are a number of detractors in the literary world who wish to ban several books written by her. In fact, author Blume has been named among the most frequently challenged writers of the 21st century by The Library Association of America. Despite getting mixed reviews from the critics, her books have sold more than 82 million copies all over the world and have been translated into as many as 32 foreign languages. For her dedicated contribution to the English literature, author Blume has been awarded with numerous prestigious honors and awards in her writing career. She is recognized by the Congress Living Legend Library and has received a National Book Foundation award in the year 1998 for her distinguished efforts to the American letters. Her father, Ralph Sussman, was a dentist by profession while her mother, Esther Rosenfeld was a homemaker. Blume also has a brother named David, who is 5 years older than her. She was Jewish like her family. Author Blume used to love reading new stories and making up her own stories. She says that she used to spend most of her days as a child developing numerous stories in her head. She completed her school education from the Mattapan High School in the year 1968 and then enrolled herself in the Boston University. After getting diagnosed with mononucleosis she had to terminate her studies after the first semester. She recollects a memory from her childhood days when a total of 3 airplane crashes took place in her hometown. Around 100 people had died and her father helped to identify the remains of the unrecognizable dead bodies. She maintains that she had always been an avid reader, but started writing only when her children started attending preschool. Till now, author Blume has received more than 90 awards in her literary career, including 3 lifetime achievement medals. Throughout her writing career, author Blume has tried to advocate the organizations supporting intellectual freedom. When she was under attack by a banning campaign set against her in the year 1982, she started reaching out to all the teachers, writers, and librarians who were facing similar problems in their lives. Eventually, she was able to fight her battle and emerged as a winner. The Fudge series written by Judy Blume consists of 5 books in total, published between the years 1969 and 1974. To describe this as unusually solicitous behaviour from an interviewee to a hack is like describing Blume as a mildly successful writer. You must be so tired! Blume, wearing a T-shirt and three-quarter-length trousers, gets out of the car and gives me a big hug, followed by a pink baseball cap to protect me from the Floridian sun. Her pretty, pixie-like face, framed with a mass of brown curls, shines with warmth. There is a sweetly flirtatious manner between them, even after 30 years of marriage. Both 77, and trim and spry, they are a testament to the benefits of outdoor, warm-weather living. Books for teenagers, such as *Are You There God? Freedman as Herself* and *Tiger Eyes* explore issues of death and loss. Blume has said that she vividly remembers the questions and emotions of her own youth and that she attempts to show readers they are not alone in their fears and confusion. Her emotional adventure stories give her young readers a reference point from which to examine and discuss their own feelings. Blume has also written three novels for adults which share the writing style and empathetic tone of her juvenile fiction: In 1971, Blume published an anthology of letters she had received from readers called *Letters to Judy: Furthering this end, Blume established the KIDS Fund in 1972 to develop programs that encourage communication between parents and teens and that foster parent-child discussions through books.
