Abstract Some segments of modern American Christianity consider faith healing an acceptable and integral part of their worship and religious practice. Faith healing, as a system, attempts to merge two fields: This merging uses supernatural forces to produce a natural, physical result. This paper will examine modern American faith healers. It will address the purposes of their actions, the sources of their knowledge, methods of inquiry, institutions and structures, history, and argumentation. Scope and Purpose This paper addresses Christian faith-healing in modern America. Many medical doctors report people with a religious faith sometimes heal faster than those without. This is most often attributed to their attitude of hope and optimism. Some segments of society reject any medical attention altogether and hope to be healed by their faith alone. Belief in faith healing takes many forms. This paper will address a very specific variety: For them, healing is not a process, but instantaneous. In this respect, they resemble Christian Science. These leaders travel the nation, attracting hundreds, even thousands, to their revival-like events. People flock to these events seeking healing and deliverance from their visible and invisible ailments. The denominational representation at these events and among the leaders is diverse; it is a very inter-denominational movement. Sources and Criteria of Valid Knowledge Looking at this instantaneous faith healing as a system, its primary source of knowledge is the Christian New Testament. Several Gospel and Pauline passages referring to miracles of healing, performed by Jesus and his disciples, as well as the event of Pentecost, serve as evidence and justification for these practices. While the Bible is the most official source of knowledge, several secondary sources also exist. Each of the popular evangelists, in addition to traveling the country healing people, also run major ministries that market numerous books, resources, and complex web sites all designed to teach people how to heal and be healed. The sages or prophets in this tradition are these popular faith-healing evangelists. These men have celebrity-like status and are believed to possess special supernatural healing powers. Methods of Inquiry The methods of inquiry in this system require two theological assumptions. The first is that God still performs healing miracles today similar to those performed by Jesus and his disciples. This contradicts the views of many other Christians who maintain a more dispensationalist theory of the gifts of the spirit. Illness, similarly, is either the result of or consequence for iniquities and un-confessed sin. Given these assumptions, knowledge is acquired in this system through two sources: A believer in this system who has an illness is convinced that he or she has sinned against God. He then begins a process of introspection, searching his soul for their sin. If they are healed, they rejoice. While the faith of the recipient is always required for a successful cure, the special healing ministers are another important method through which this system operates. These healers are said to have special gifts based on I Corinthians These healers lay their hands upon the sick, command them to confess and believe, and command them to be healed. Once healed, they present the cured individual i. This system does not even come close to meeting the standards of modern science. In fact, miraculous faith healing defies science completely. The deaf can suddenly hear, the blind can see, and tumors simply disappear according to this tradition. Without any medical treatment, bodies are transformed. The only proof is the testimony of those healed, which is not really proof because it is based solely on a subjective experience. Institutions and Professional Structure This system has a very loose organization. There is no central authority, official form of accreditation, leadership hierarchy, means of recognition, standards, or control over community of participants. Each sect of faith healers appears to be independent. Each healing evangelist works independently; they run their own separate healing ministries. No common organization associates them. These evangelists play a huge role in the system. Without their large-scale events and publicity efforts, the system would certainly exist on a much smaller scale. The charismatic leaders of this movement have established their own mega-ministries to ensure the transcendence of their mission. These ministries are an attempt to add structure and organization to a very diverse and decentralized movement. Examples of

web-sites of these ministries are available in Appendix A. The roots of the faith healing movement are clearly biblical. Beyond the Bible stories, various churches throughout history have believed God would heal his sick children. Even before the Protestant movement, faith healing was a common belief in the Roman Catholic Church. While there is no clear originator of the modern faith-healing movement, E. Kenyon was the first modern theologian to begin exploring doctrines of this nature in the early s. The concept that sickness is a symptom of un-confessed sin or lack of faith began to gain popularity. However, this faith-healing system did not become a defined and popular practice until the s. The evangelist Kenneth Hagin is often credited with the exponential growth of the faith-healing movement. On an international level, groups in many of these other countries that parallel faith-healing practices predate the influence of Christianity. While many of the participants in this tradition could be categorized as evangelical Christians, it is interested that the main focus and purpose of this ministries is healing. Granted, these individuals use their transformation testimonials to legitimate and promote their faith, but the focus of the healing meetings is only to cure the afflicted believers.

Representative Examples of Argumentation: This system conflicts with numerous other systems. Medical science discredits all the healing claims of this tradition. Other Christians say this system is characterized by unorthodox theology and fraud. For example, theological problems occur when the faith-healers say that all illness and strife are a result of un-confessed sin. Compared to the overall Christian tradition, faith healing is an extreme, fringe movement. The beliefs and teachings of the faith healers are not considered mainstream. The response of the faith healers to all these criticism is almost always the same, and comes in the form of a personal attack on the criticizer. They say that if you disagree with the believers in this system, it simply means you do not have enough faith. If you really believed you would see things differently. Unless you are an insider and have experienced the gifts of the Holy Spirit, you cannot understand. They also maintain, against medical criticisms, that these cures are physical and real.

Relative emphasis on traditional authority or the testimony of experience X On this scale faith healing is given a 9. The testimony of experience is the primary emphasis. Healers are given credibility in this tradition by their success rate and testimonials, not by traditional means of church endorsement or ordination. These groups do not follow traditional ecclesiastical structure or doctrine, but are more based on practice and feelings. Authority in this system is result driven. And while it is linked to traditional Biblical healing and the miracles of the first followers of Christ, the legitimacy of leaders are not checked by such biblical standards, but by the healing powers they claim and demonstrate. Thus modern and current experiences, not traditions, receive emphasis.

Relative centralization of authority or decentralization X Instantaneous faith healing is given a 9. It is a highly decentralized system. While there are several different churches and evangelists who practice this healing, they are not linked in any official way. Only common beliefs link them together; there is not organizational structure or common authority. The only forms of accountability are their results and popularity. Each individual charismatic group or evangelist does things its own way.

Relative emphasis on invisible realities or material earthly ones X On this scale faith healing is given a 7. While the emphasis is predominantly material: The physical act is the primary focus, and it is material. But the process that causes the healing, the transforming through the power of the Holy Spirit, is a spiritual infusion process that is unobservable and immaterial. Mainly spiritual or moral objectives or pragmatic aims X The aims and objectives of healing are pragmatic. Cures of ailments are the primary purpose. Moral and spiritual elements, namely faith, are seen as the end goal of such practices. While this system strongly emphasizes faith, a spiritual attribute, it is not an objective. Faith is the means, not the end, of this system. Most power or agency reserved for a divine being or realizable in individuals X On this scale, Christian faith healing must rest in the center with a score of 5. No healer claims to be performing miracles by their own power, the result is always attributed to the glory of God.

Chapter 2 : The Three Pillars of the Christian Faith -- Miracles, Prophecies, and Precepts

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Seek and ye shall find. Knock and it shall be opened unto you.. Will not the Heavenly Father give the Holy Spirit to those who ask him? One received all there was when one became converted. Speaking in tongues was thought of as emotionalism. What if there IS a baptism of the Holy Spirit? It was forecast to be one of those bitter Minnesota winter nights which make houses creak and pop with the cold. The morning weather forecast had said it would be 20 degrees below zero Fahrenheit that night. Just as my husband was leaving for work, our furnace ran out of oil. We were in desperate financial straits. He was working full time at a print shop as well as putting in long hours trying to save our failing gas station business. We barely had enough money to put a little food on the table. There was nothing left over for anything else. On Friday night when he got his paycheck from the print shop, my husband would buy two five gallon cans of fuel oil for our furnace, and that would have to last for the week. This particular week, we could afford only one. Now on Tuesday morning, it was all gone. We would have to put oil in the tank and bleed the air out of the line before it would start again. We seemed destined to be left to the mercy of the weather that night. I knew that within a few hours it would be getting quite chilly in the house. How would I protect my children? Maybe you could make it not get so cold, or you could give us tough hides to see us through this. I will not ask for charity! My help is in You. Jesus, you promised that you would never leave us comfortless. You promised that when you went away you would send us another comforter. Little did I know what I was asking for. None of my religious upbringing prepared me for what happened next. I felt a surge of powerful energy flowing in through the top of my head, down my body through my feet, and back up again and out through my head. With my toes tingling, I felt myself being lifted to my feet by unseen hands as words in a language I have never heard flowed from my mouth. With hands held high I began dancing around the house praising the Lord and singing songs I knew, and making up new songs of praise as I went. I tried to remember the few words I had spoken in that strange language. It dawned on me that maybe this was what those crazy Pentecostals were experiencing. I put the children to bed with their snowsuits on, and I piled on all the blankets I could find. It never occurred to me to worry that the water pipes in the basement could freeze up. I was just so filled up with the presence of the Lord. I was reveling in it. My husband came home after closing up the gas station late that night, crawled into bed with me and promptly fell into an exhausted sleep. There was nothing else we could do about the heat. The little electric space heater would have to do, because that was all we had. I got up to turn it off, since it would be senseless to let cold air blow about the house. I pushed the thermostat lever all the way down as far as it would go, but the furnace kept running since the house was already colder than the lowest setting. Next I went into the kitchen and placed my hand over the hot air vent. To my utter amazement, warm air was coming out of the vent. I knew that maybe You could moderate the weather, but to make an empty furnace run "that was a miracle greater than anything I have ever heard of. There was warm air coming out of the vents. Sure enough, it read empty, just as I knew it would. I tapped on the tank from the top on down to the bottom. It was hollow all the way. There was no oil in the tank! Warm air was circulating all through my house. No one in his right mind would ask God for something so outrageous. By Wayne Jackson In discussing the theme of biblical miracles, several important areas of consideration must be surveyed. First, exactly what is a miracle? People use that term rather loosely—frequently, not at all in a scriptural sense. And what are those tell-tale traits that identify the miracle and distinguish it from a natural phenomenon? If folks only knew what to look for in certifying the miraculous, they surely would be aware that supernatural deeds are not being performed in this age. Further, does the Bible itself contain any information as to whether miraculous displays would be perpetual, i. These are questions which we propose to answer in this study. Definition and Classification of Miracles How does one define a miracle? A miracle is an event which the forces of nature—including the natural powers of man—cannot of themselves produce, and which must, therefore, be referred to a supernatural agency Fisher , 9. A miracle is a divine operation that transcends what is normally perceived as natural law; it cannot be explained upon any natural basis. The miracles recorded in the Bible fall into several categories. The following examples are illustrative, though certainly not exhaustive: First, there are supernatural acts of creation. Certain creation activities were accomplished by the word of God Hebrews Second, there were miracles which involved a temporary and localized suspension of laws regulating nature. Jesus calmed a ferocious storm on the Sea of Galilee Matthew 8: The blind were made to see John 9: Fourth, there were signs demonstrating divine power over death. Lazarus, dead four days, was raised John Fifth, some of the wonders of the New Testament age had to do with the expulsion of demons that had entered into human bodies Matthew Sixth, the exhibition of divine authority was seen in the manipulation of certain material things. Christ turned water into wine John 2: Seventh, miraculous power was demonstrated in both the plant and animal kingdoms. In this study, we will limit ourselves mostly to a consideration of miracles recorded in the New Testament record. Characteristics of a Genuine Miracle What are the traits of a genuine miracle, as opposed to feigned signs? Consider the following facts. A supernatural display of divine power is not an arguable proposition; it is a dramatic, demonstrable fact. No where in the New Testament is there a record of a divine spokesman arguing for the validity of miracles. No logical scheme is needed to establish such a case. When Jesus performed signs, even his enemies did not deny the effect of such; they merely attempted to attribute his power to some other source e. Is anything being done today of such compelling nature as to elicit this type of reaction? In biblical times, miracles always had a worthy motive. Signs were not done for the purpose of personal aggrandizement. When Peter encountered the lame man of Acts 3, he had no money v. As a general rule, the miracles of the Bible era were done in the presence of a multitude of credible witnesses—even hostile observers. When the Lord multiplied the loaves and fishes, possibly some ten thousand or more people were present cf. Genuine miracles were not slow, progressive processes; rather, they produced instantaneous effects. In the New Testament, one never reads such statements as this: True miracles must be subject to sense perception. The water that Jesus turned into wine could be tasted John 2: The wonders of the Bible were objective demonstrations, not subjective speculations! Actual signs must be independent of secondary causes. By this we mean there must be no possible way to explain the miracle in a natural fashion. One is reminded of the boy whose cat gave birth to kittens. When the lad noticed the kittens were blind, he prayed for them. Sure enough, in about nine days they all could see! Can the miracles of Christ be explained in any natural fashion? For instance it cannot be argued that the blind man of John 9: How can a perfectly restored ear, that had been amputated, be explained by current processes Luke A genuine miracle will generate more than a superficial and temporary interest. It will have an abiding effect. The miracles of Christ were never denied during the apostolic age, nor even in the immediate ages beyond. We submit, therefore, that so-called modern miracles do not meet the criteria suggested above. They thus must be rejected and explained upon some other basis. Their Purpose and Method of Reception What was the purpose of miracles in the ministry of Christ, or in the apostolic age? As

noted above, their design must be consistent with the lofty theme of redemption. Of the early disciples who were endowed with spiritual gifts, Mark declares: And they went forth, and preached everywhere, the Lord working with them, and confirming the word by the signs that followed Mark. The function of the signs was to confirm the revelatory process, i. The writer of Hebrews argues similarly. The word denotes evidence that establishes the validity of the divinely-given word Brown , The supernatural gifts of the primitive age, therefore, had as their design the establishment of the credibility of Christ and his spokesmen, and so ultimately, the validation of their message, namely, that Jesus Christ is the Son of God, the Savior of the world! Now observe this very important point. If it can be established that those early miracles do corroborate the testimony of Christ, and those commissioned by him; and further, that the recording of these events in the New Testament was designed to perpetually accomplish that function, then it stands as demonstrated that the repetition of such signs is not needed today. The fact is, that is exactly what is affirmed by the apostle John. Even those who claim that God is working miracles today, when asked if they believe that the recorded miracles of Christ in the New Testament are sufficient to establish faith in him, will answer affirmatively. It ought to be abundantly clear, therefore, that since the miracles of the Bible continue to accomplish their original purpose, there is no need for a repetition of them today. They are not being replicated in this age! Next, one should explore the method of gift reception, as that concept is set forth in the New Testament. Christ, of course, was empowered directly by God to work miracles. So far as New Testament information goes, there were only two ways by which others received spiritual gifts in the apostolic era. The first was by means of Holy Spirit baptism, i. Let us consider the biblical facts regarding these two matters. Holy Spirit baptism was demonstrated in only two New Testament situations. It was given to the apostles of Christ Acts 1: Then, as a very special case, it was received by the household of Cornelius Acts Is Holy Spirit baptism available today? We can show that it is not by the following logical argument. First, when Paul wrote to the Ephesians ca. It is generally conceded that this baptism must be either Holy Spirit baptism or water baptism. If it can be established that the one baptism of Ephesians 4: That water baptism is age-lasting is demonstrated by the fact that it is the baptism of the great commission cf. Whatever the baptism of this passage is, therefore, it continues in force until the end. This baptism, however, must be water baptism, as evidenced by the fact that it is administered by human beings: It must be concluded, therefore, that the one baptism of Ephesians 4: Such being the case, spiritual gifts are not received via Holy Spirit baptism today. Other than by Holy Spirit baptism, miraculous gifts could be conveyed only by an apostle of Christ. Philip, the evangelist not an apostle , could perform miracles, but he could not pass that gift along to others. Accordingly, apostles, namely Peter and John, were sent to Samaria, where Philip had been preaching, so that the church there might be furnished with certain divine gifts cf. He wanted to purchase that privilege for himself, but he was informed that he had neither part nor lot in that matter, i. Such, however, was a very illogical position, for that church possessed spiritual gifts 1 Corinthians , and they had received them from none other than Paul. If to others I am not an apostle, yet at least I am to you; for the seal of mine apostleship are ye in the Lord 1 Corinthians 9: Some argue that 1 Timothy 4: However, the passage does not suggest that. This verse asserts that Timothy had received a spiritual gift on the same general occasion when elders had laid hands upon the evangelistâ€”doubtless to appoint him to some special mission. It does not affirm that the elders themselves imparted miracle-working ability to Timothy. Since, therefore, there is no Holy Spirit baptism today; and further, since there are no apostles or successors to them in this age, it should be quite clear that men are not in possession of supernatural gifts of the Spirit in this post-apostolic era of the Christian dispensation. Two Contexts Considered Were miraculous gifts to abide with the church until the end of time, or, due to their specific design, were they only a temporary phenomena? This matter is discussed rather comprehensively in two New Testament contexts.

Chapter 4 : Modern Christian Faith Healing

Here the term miracle refers to common The Essential Truths of the Christian Faith devotional is excerpted from Essential Truths of the Christian Faith.

It is an occurrence at once above nature and above man. It shows the intervention of a power that is not limited by the laws either of matter or of mind, a power interrupting the fixed laws which govern their movements, a supernatural power. One force counteracts another: When a man raises a weight from the ground, the law of gravity is neither suspended nor violated, but counteracted by a stronger force. The same is true as to the walking of Christ on the water and the swimming of iron at the command of the prophet. The simple and grand truth that the universe is not under the exclusive control of physical forces, but that everywhere and always there is above, separate from and superior to all else, an infinite personal will, not superceding, but directing and controlling all physical causes, acting with or without them. In the New Testament these four Greek words are principally used to designate miracles: Purpose Miracles are seals of a divine mission. The sacred writers appealed to them as proofs that they were messengers of God. Our Lord also appealed to miracles as a conclusive proof of his divine mission John 5: Thus, being out of the common course of nature and beyond the power of man, they are fitted to convey the impression of the presence and power of God. Where miracles are there certainly God is. The teacher points to these credentials, and they are a proof that he speaks with the authority of God. The witnesses were competent, and their testimony is trustworthy. Unbelievers, following Hume, deny that any testimony can prove a miracle, because they say miracles are impossible. We have shown that miracles are possible, and surely they can be borne witness to. Surely they are credible when we have abundant and trustworthy evidence of their occurrence. They are credible just as any facts of history well authenticated are credible. Miracles, it is said, are contrary to experience. Of course they are contrary to our experience, but that does not prove that they were contrary to the experience of those who witnessed them. We believe a thousand facts, both of history and of science, that are contrary to our experience, but we believe them on the ground of competent testimony. An atheist or a pantheist must, as a matter of course, deny the possibility of miracles; but to one who believes in a personal God, who in his wisdom may see fit to interfere with the ordinary processes of nature, miracles are not impossible, nor are they incredible.

Chapter 5 : 4 Prayers for Healing - Powerful Words for Miracles (Updated)

Being a Christian is a much deeper life than simply asking Jesus to come into your heart and believing in the forgiveness of sins. It's a life of development and growth in the things of Christ.

Expand Collapse Can you think of one miracle you have performed? Think back over your entire life, and see if you can remember one occasion when you performed something supernatural. In fact, I know I have never performed a miracle. And I am guessing you have reached the same conclusion regarding yourself. We have the natural tendency, even as Christians, to assume that our spiritual life is primarily the result of our own efforts, contributions, and personal power. But nothing could be further from the truth. The Christian life itself is a miracle. And it is very different than what a person gets when man is the source of his religious experience. Human beings can choose to be religious, but only God can produce the Christian life. It begins when a person repents of his sin and believes the good news that Jesus died on the cross to pay for our sins. No one becomes a Christian apart from the miracle of conversion. That is to say, a new believer immediately begins to live for the Lord. The temptation is to assume: Jesus saved me, and now I am the one who must produce righteous fruit in my heart and life. But that is not how it works. In fact, such a plan will backfire. The correct way to understand Christianity is to recognize that the miracle of the Christian life can only be produced by God. After all, you and I are not capable of performing even one miracle by our own power. We have already established that fact, right? And so we need God just as much in our life of discipleship as we did when we first came to know Christ. And thankfully, God is more than willing to provide just what is needed at every point along the way. Scripture reveals the power source of the Christian life. Jesus said, "Remain in me, and I will remain in you. No branch can bear fruit by itself; it must remain in the vine. Neither can you bear fruit unless you remain in me. I am the vine; you are the branches. If a man remains in me and I in him, he will bear much fruit. You and I do not possess that kind of power. Therefore, it must be given to us if we are going to walk in it and experience it on a daily basis. Our natural tendency, even as believers, is to assume: I am wise enough and strong enough to handle this life of discipleship. In reality, you and I are not wise enough or strong enough to do it. We need God to do it in us and through us. Remember, we are merely the branches. You and I are not the vine. The apostle Paul described his life of discipleship this way: He has made us competent as ministers of a new covenant "not of the letter but of the Spirit; for the letter kills, but the Spirit gives life. We are powerless to pull it off. And so the Holy Spirit came at Pentecost to empower the apostles to boldly proclaim the Gospel and to live for Christ. Pentecost was just as much of a miracle as Calvary. The other "clothed" Christians with "power.

One example is the case of "a woman who had had a discharge of blood for twelve years, and who had suffered much under many physicians, and had spent all that she had, and was not better but rather grew worse. Be cured from your illness. Jesus endorsed the use of the medical assistance of the time medicines of oil and wine when he told the parable of the Good Samaritan Luke Jesus then told the doubting teacher of the law who had elicited this parable by his self-justifying question, "And who is my neighbor? Jesus also told his followers to "cure sick people, raise up dead persons, make lepers clean, expel demons. You received free, give free". Jesus used miracles to convince people that he was inaugurating the Messianic Age. At the beginning of the 20th century, the new Pentecostal movement drew participants from the Holiness movement and other movements in America that already believed in divine healing. By the s, several faith healers drew large crowds and established worldwide followings. The first Pentecostals in the modern sense appeared in Topeka, Kansas , in a Bible school conducted by Charles Fox Parham , a holiness teacher and former Methodist pastor. A former English plumber turned evangelist who lived simply and read nothing but the Bible from the time his wife taught him to read, Wigglesworth traveled around the world preaching about Jesus and performing faith healings. Branham has been credited as the initiator of the post-World War II healing revivals. Because of this, Branham has been recognized as the "father of modern faith healers. My parents believed very strongly in medical science and we have a doctor who takes care of our children when they get sick. I cannot heal anyone â€” God does that. Also in this era, Jack Coe [33] [34] and A. Allen [35] were faith healers who traveled with large tents for large open-air crusades. His former pilot, Kenneth Copeland , started a healing ministry. Pat Robertson , Benny Hinn , and Peter Popoff became well-known televangelists who claimed to heal the sick. Kuhlman influenced Benny Hinn, who adopted some of her techniques and wrote a book about her. On the basis of experience and evidence, the probability that miracle occurred is always less than the probability that it did not occur. As it is rational to believe what is more probable, we are not supposed to have a good reason to believe that a miracle occurred. Accordingly a thing is wonderful simply, when its cause is hidden simply: Now God is the cause which is hidden to every man simply: Therefore properly speaking miracles are works done by God outside the order usually observed in things. Of these miracles there are various degrees and orders. The highest degree in miracles comprises those works wherein something is done by God, that nature can never do: Among these there is a certain order: The second degree in miracles belongs to those whereby God does something that nature can do, but not in the same order: Among these miracles also, there are degrees, according as the thing done is further removed from the faculty of nature. The third degree of miracles is when God does what is wont to be done by the operation of nature, but without the operation of the natural principles: This is a typical situation in Hindu mythology wherein "wondrous acts are performed for the purpose of bringing spiritual liberation to those who witness or read about them. What a small beginning for the Son of God! The church was born with a few men and women gathered in an upper room, praying. It has grown since that time, through multiplication. At times we are faced with tremendous needs and challenges. If we were to merely ADD solutions to the problems faced, we would never be able to overcome them all. The needs are vast, but God is greater than all these things. Yet God has chosen to work through the kind of fruit which contains in itself the seeds of further multiplication. In the story of the feeding of the five thousand, we see God at work through Jesus to meet the needs of an assembled audience. Today when we have large conferences we send people off to the local restaurants in order to cater to their need for food, but when Jesus ministered out in the remote places there were no nearby restaurants. You can read the story in Matthew Jesus and his disciples fed the multitude using 5 loaves and 2 fishes. It is worthy of note that Jesus started with something that the people already had. You could say that what they had was not much for so many people. You could say that God could have just created food out of nothing. But the story unfolds in a way that shows how God works " it reveals something of the ways of God. Its interesting that the pattern in this story is repeated several times in the New Testament. One of these times is at the Last Supper. To meet a great need, God always starts with what we have. Its easy to despise the small resources that we have many times when we start on a project for God, but God usually begins with such small things. The key is to surrender what he have into the hands of the Lord. The boy who brought the five loaves and two fishes to Jesus had more than enough for himself, but not enough for the needs of the multitude. So it is many times with us. I look at my own situation, and the scope of vision that I have received from the Lord and the sense of call that I have in my heart. Perhaps you feel the same way also about your own call. You know that what you are called to do requires far more than what you currently have in your hands. But really, this is no obstacle to God. What God is looking for is people who will take the first step, and surrender what they have to Him. The boy in the story had to be willing to give up his lunch, and put it in the hands of Jesus. I suppose he might have kept in for himself, but then he never would have been involved in the miracle. God has a plan for your life to make you a blessing to multitudes. To fulfil that plan, the first thing you need to do is to surrender yourself to God. Surrendering to God goes against our carnal nature. Something in our very nature rebels against the idea of fully trusting God. But really, such a thought is not logical. If God was evil, He could easily force us to give Him our wills and mock us. But He never does that. He made us with the capacity to give ourselves to Him, but He never obliges us to do so by force. There is an unfolding of the goodness of God that is only known by those who give what they have, including their own lives, to God. What does God do with our lives once we give them to Him? He does the same as He did with those five loaves and two fish. When you give your life to God, He will bless your life. Whether it be in healing, or deliverance, or in restoration of relationships, or in some other way, God will definitely bless your life. And whatever you give to God from a pure heart, God will bless. Sometimes we give God so little of what we have, and yet look at the amazing things God is able to do with what He receives from our hands! Hopefully we can be encouraged by this to more fully trust God. There is a lot on this site about how to receive blessings from God, and its an important topic. However, God has much more in mind for your life than for you to be blessed. No matter how blessed those 5 loaves and 2 fish were, they were not going to be a blessing until the next phase of the process was complete. And this is the part of the process that for us is often the most painful. Until the loaves and fish were broken, they were never going to multiply under the hands of Jesus. In the same way, God will lead us

into situations and places where our own self will is going to be broken. We have to learn to be obedient to God, to do His will, to be shaped and molded and conformed to His nature, which is the nature of Christ. The Bible says that we are predestined to be conformed to the nature of Jesus Christ. Think about Jesus, how He was and is. He so much gave Himself for others. But His ultimate giving of Himself could not happen until His own body was broken on the cross. The real life of Jesus could not come to us until the blood of the Son of God was spilled in our place. Until there was a payment for sin, mankind would always be divided from God by a terrible wall of condemnation, hostility and alienation. Only God could break through that wall, and He did so by the spilling of His own blood, and the breaking of His own body. Nothing less than that would suffice. Nothing less than that could enable the impartation of the Life of God to the soul and spirit of man. Just as Jesus went through this process for us, so we will go through it that we might be conformed to the image of Jesus, and become a blessing for others. The breaking phase in our lives can occur on multiple occasions, and it happens usually through suffering. It is through pain and suffering that we learn obedience to God. But it transforms us from being selfish shallow people interested merely in our own gratification, to mature, caring people who are a blessing for others. We have enough people in this world who are simply concerned with their own physical, sexual and social gratification. The world is full of people who are looking for sexual fulfillment and a sense of importance, and little else. Such people can easily be seduced into evil, because there is no stronger principle at work in their lives than what tends to the gratification of these things, even though it may be at the cost of others. People commit adultery, murder, reject truth, use lies and steal because they are not filled with the Love of God. God has to break us, even as Christians, before we are really able to reflect His glory fully. Its a painful thing, but very necessary. God does not do it to hurt us, neither is He indifferent to us. But He has a plan for us which is bigger than what we are probably personally comfortable with. To make us into the kind of people we need to be, we have to go through crisis and suffering at certain seasons in our lives. After the breaking, comes the giving. The bread and fish that was broken was given out to meet the needs of the people, and kept multiplying. And I believe that for us, our highest fulfillment comes in being like God, being like Jesus, and being given out for the needs of others. Nor does it require a miracle to skip a golf ball over water. As long as the ball has the proper spin and trajectory, it is a simple matter. The term miracle tends to be used loosely today. A touchdown pass, a narrow escape, or the beauty of a sunset are routinely called miracles. But the word miracle can be used in three distinct ways. The first describes common, but nevertheless impressive, events. We speak of the birth of a baby, for instance, as a miracle. In so doing, we honor God for the intricacy and beauty of His creation. We stand in awe of the majesty of the cosmos as God works through the secondary means of natural laws, which are themselves creations of God. Here the term miracle refers to common things that point to an uncommon cause in the power of God. A second way in which we use the term miracle is similar to the first. The star of Bethlehem, for instance, perhaps had a natural, scientific cause. The extraordinary alignment of a group of stars, or a supernova may explain its brightness. To concede this possibility, however, makes the event no less a miracle. It pointed the magi to Bethlehem. The star is then a miracle of timing and placement. Such a miracle honors God as He weaves the tapestry of history in such a way that the event occurred in a miraculous way. Thirdly, miracles refer to acts of God against nature. This is the more technical usage of the term. There can be no natural explanation for these events. They serve to validate Christ as the divine Son of God. The Bible uses several words to capture the concept contained in the single word miracle. The Bible speaks of signs, wonders, and powers. In its narrowest sense, we link miracle to the biblical word for sign. Miracles are called signs because like all signs they point beyond themselves to something more significant. God used miracles to prove or attest His agents of divine revelation Hebrews 2: God gave Moses the power to perform miracles in order to demonstrate that He had sent Moses. So also the Father authenticated the Son through the signs that He performed. Today there are three distinct views of miracles. The first is the skeptical view that denies that miracles can ever happen. The second view argues that miracles happened in Bible times and continue to happen today. The third view is that true miracles happened in the Bible, but God ceased performing miracles once His revelation was established in Scripture. This view holds that God still works in the world in a supernatural way but no longer grants miracle-working power to human beings. The Bible speaks of signs, powers, and wonders. The Bible records different types of miracles. All miracles are supernatural events, but not all supernatural events are miracles.
