Leonardo da Vinci Lodge No. Have you heard of the Seven Lively Arts? I had not until June , when I visited the Union League Club of Chicago and saw seven paintings, each depicting one of the "seven lively arts" - architecture, painting, sculpture, dance, drama, music and literature. Each lively art is a field of aesthetic endeavour in the plastic or performing arts. The paintings which I saw depicting the seven lively arts were once displayed in a Chicago restaurant. They were dispersed, but eventually a collector reassembled the collection which may be seen online [i]. The seven lively arts should not be confused with the seven liberal arts and sciences, about which Freemasons receive some instruction - grammar, rhetoric, logic, arithmetic, geometry, music and astronomy. These were known as the "liberal" arts as proficiency in them was thought to liberate the mind. For example, a study of geometry was thought to liberate and lead one from contemplating the material world to the cosmos, and thence to the Deity. I had not heard the expression the "seven lively arts" before seeing the paintings in Chicago. Occasionally they have also been known as the "seven major arts", but I do prefer the dynamism and energy which is associated with the word "lively". It seems the expression may have been first used in the title of a book written in by Gilbert Seldes, entitled "The Seven Lively Arts" [ii] , in which the author wrote an account and defence of American Popular Arts - film, popular music and dance, musical comedy, cartoons, and popular fiction. He states "Seldes wanted his book to serve two purposes: The artist Dali created illustrations of the seven lively arts for the theatre foyer. What does this have to do with Freemasonry? Well, in the past some creative artists drew upon the ideals of Freemasonry. Some sculptors have used Masonic themes as a source of artistic inspiration. But these are examples from one to two hundred years ago. These days drama is employed to effect in ceremonies by good ritualists, but Freemasonry tends to be used in modern mass drama only in a debased form, as a museum piece or a sinister conspiracy, as, for example, in the recent movie "From Hell". Its leaders and members are likely to be suspicious of the avant guard who tend to monopolise the more highbrow areas of the seven lively arts. If Freemasonry is to recover its intellectual and creative vibrancy and expound its purpose in terms that are comprehensible and relevant to modern society, perhaps it can best do so by expression of its ideals through the seven lively arts. How this might be achieved by present day Freemasonry is a major challenge. The seven lively arts of architecture, painting, sculpture, dance, drama, music and literature are important constituents of each human culture. They may challenge us, but also help to bring meaning to our lives. Freemasonry would be enlivened if it could attract and act as a source of inspiration for exponents of the seven lively arts.

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Load more share options Warning: Sitting among eight candidates standing to be governor of Massachusetts, his pointed comments about homosexuals drew shrill cries of derision and ridicule. It was a very different reception when he took his anti-gay message to Uganda, a country he has visited for more than 10 years. In Uganda he has cultivated ties to influential religious and political leaders. Watching the hours of video of that March conference billed as exposing the gay agenda Dr Lively appears to be a man on a mission. The Nazis were super machos. You see them in prisons! Men having sex with boys and other men, usually in some sort of aggressive way. Inflammatory rhetoric This key conference was filmed by the Reverend Dr Kapyka Kaoma, a Zambian Anglian priest who was appalled by what he witnessed. Now based in Boston, Kaoma told me that a week after the conference Lively gave a separate five-hour briefing to the Ugandan parliament, and the following week some MPs said it was time for a new anti-gay law. Kaoma, now working for Political Research Associates , argues that Dr Lively stirred up anti-gay hatred in Uganda through his inflammatory rhetoric about gays and his suggestions that they were coming to target young boys. That is now the reason why there is the new law. What I talk about is public policy. But I repeatedly challenged him on some of his controversial comments. He again accused me of taking his comments from the conference out of context, so I played the clip in question to him. After repeatedly pushing him on the issue of his opinions and the impact he has had, he said: What you are doing is propaganda. He is certainly a radical homosexualist meaning a person, whether they are homosexual or not, meaning a person who is per cent invested in the homosexual agenda. When I asked if he thought President Obama was part of the gay agenda, he replied: Yet this same man was heralded as an important scholar in Uganda, who influenced some of most draconian anti-gay laws in the world laws now denounced for inflaming hatred and stirring persecution. Lively is a controversial pastor known widely for his anti-gay rhetoric. I stand on the original intent of the Constitution. GOP and the state as a whole? Well, Scott Lively joins us now. Lively, welcome back to Radio Boston. Good to be with you. Well, so first of all I just want to ask you, I mean you said this weekend at the Mass. GOP convention that you stand for conservative values in the Bay State. So if you stand for conservative values that put women and family at the front, but you assaulted a year-old back in , I mean why should Massachusetts Republicans vote for you? Wow, that was quite an opening. But these are facts. No, it is predatory. They can hear it. The people have ears. This is what this is called a gotcha interview. First of all I was not found guilty. I was found liable. When guilty is a criminal verdict, liable is what is found in a civil case when a jury agrees with the arguments of the plaintiffs and not the defendant. And the case at issue was an extraordinarily political case in which the judge actually happened to be a corporate attorney for an organization that was funding the opposition in a ballot measure campaign in which I was the spokesman. The civil case was heard by a jury. There was a jury trial but it was a jury trial with the judge who was on the other side. That judge made the jurors leave the courtroom and then he threatened my attorney, with this first case out of a law school, with sanctions if he proceeded any further, which was our absolute constitutional right to do. So the jury never actually got to hear that Catherine Stauffer was the one who was guilty. WBUR obtained several court documents related to this case. The form shows DA Michael Schrunk declined to press criminal charges against Lively because the state could not sustain its burden of proof beyond a reasonable doubt. A year later, during the civil trial, the jury decided Stauffer did not commit criminal trespass. That was all made up. She was a journalist for Just Out magazine. Why did you pay? I went to law school because of what I experienced in that case. I was never going to let that happen again. Most outrageous abuse of judicial authority. It was it was completely political. It was all about Ballot Measure 9. And I was stuck. What can you do when you have a corrupt judge. A Oregon Court of Appeals ruling shows that Lively paid a major portion of the damages in the Stauffer case, but the Oregon Citizens Alliance had not. When the Soviets would find you guilty, you know, even in the Soviet Union there were procedures that you could follow, you know, to sort of get an appeal. But everybody knew it was just ridiculous to even try because the entire system was rigged. And you know what? During this whole thing, this is a complete setup. This case, the incident happened like over a year before. But they intentionally postponed and postponed it until just before the election so they could turn it into a show trial to influence the vote on Ballot Measure 9. And they, and they characterized me on the evening news every night as, as somebody was like a Nazi and the Ku Klux Klan. And it was all about, is all about destroying the credibility of our ballot measure. So they started saying because of that anyone who opposes special rights for homosexuals is like the Nazis. Into my office comes a guy with a sheaf of documentation, and he said, you know they got it completely backwards. So he showed me the documentation, and I said this is outrageous. So later on I responded to it by showing that the argument that they were making, the attacks they were making against me were just simply not true. And the documentation proved my position and disproved there. Are you equating a United States court of law, this is Multnomah County, an Oregon county court as being equivalent or worse than a Soviet court? I know and have you. I actually grew up in Oregon. I would have pegged you as a Eugene-ine in an heartbeat. Well they border and this is really the same ultra leftist crowd. So you come from an interesting background that explains why you conduct your interview the way you do. Now did you do any fact checking on the documentation. Well, I have your book. But did you did you do any fact checking on the documentation. You have a responsibility. Homosexuality in the Nazi Party. So I want to, I want to just play what you said this weekend in Worcester. Mea culpa, I have overstated some things. Not so much in my writings. But sometimes
