

Chapter 1 : "Not a Single Sound": Chinese Critic He Weifang Falls Silent

Here, in verse 1, the seventh seal is broken by the Lord Jesus. When He breaks this seal, seven trumpet judgments are unleashed upon the earth. If you think things have been horrible thus far, you are right, but the worst is yet to come. Today, we are going to watch as the first four of the trumpet judgments are sounded against the earth. We are going to see things go from bad to worse for those who will be living on the earth during the Great Tribulation. Allow me to share with you the observations offered in this passage as I preach on the subject When Heaven Falls Silent. John describes a scene that must be a first in Heaven. Absolute silence reigns there for one-half an hour. Chapters four, five and seven all describe Heaven as a place of worship, praise, joy and song. Heaven is described as a place alive with noise. It is pictured as a place that literally throbs with the excitement of its inhabitants. Yet, we are told there is silence in that land of praise for half and hour. The beast and elders are silent. The angels and the redeemed multitudes have neither shouts of praise nor songs of joy to offer up. There are no divine pronouncements from the throne. Heaven sits in total silence. Silence is a powerful thing. You can be about asleep in a service, but just let the preacher fall silent and you will snap to attention. The silence at the beginning of a wedding lets you know the time has come. Silence can also be nerve shattering! Have you ever been listening to the radio and suddenly there is silence? Imagine you have asked your girlfriend to marry you and she just sits in silence for thirty minutes. Imagine you have been accused of a crime and the jury has come back with your verdict. You are standing before the judge waiting for him to read it to you, and for thirty minutes he just sits there in silence. What we are seeing in this verse is the lull before the storm. The judgment of God is about to fall on the earth and Heaven has thirty minutes of silence before the judgments commence. They rush on in their sins, living their vain lives, all the while ignoring the God of Heaven. The inhabitants of Heaven, on the other hand, understand what God is about to do and they fall silent in awe at His presence and His power. Here on earth, we often see people call for a moment of silence in the aftermath of tragic events. We do it after the event because we have no way of knowing when tragedy will strike. Heaven, on the other hand, calls for a moment of silence before the event. Heaven knows tragedy is about to stroke and Heaven falls silent in the face of impending judgment. By the way, these angels present a good lesson for us. In a day when people are concerned about education, wealth, health and a host of other things they think they need to serve God; the greatest ability is still availability. The Lord is looking for people with a heart like that which Isaiah possessed. These seven angels are given seven trumpets. These seven trumpets are going to be used to send judgments upon the earth. Trumpets, as you know, figured heavily in the lives of the ancient Jews. A certain blast was used to assemble all the people; another was used to assemble just the heads of the tribes. A certain sound was used to tell the people when it was time to break camp and march; another alerted them when there was a war. There was a certain sound that was to be made for each event. Trumpets are a big part of our future too. Think with me for a minute about an event that occurred in the history of ancient Israel involving the use of trumpets. You will find the text in Joshua 6: The Israelites marched around Jericho once each day for six days and then seven times on the seventh day. As they marched, they sounded their trumpets. Well, you know what happened! On the seventh day, after the seventh lap, they blew their trumpets and they

shouted and the walls of Jericho fell down flat. There is coming a day during the Tribulation when Heaven will sound its trumpets against a rebellious earth, and the walls of rebellion that have been erected against holy God by sinful man will fall before His unstoppable wrath. These trumpets are war trumpets and they are used to sound the attack. When God attacks the earth in His wrath, no one will be able to repel His advance. He takes the incense and offers it along with the prayers of the saints on the altar before God. The smoke of the incense and the prayers of the saints ascend together into the very presence of God. These are mysterious verses, but they do have a couple of lessons to teach us today. These verses show us that God holds onto our prayers and keeps them in His presence. You see, some prayers cannot be answered when we pray them; the time is not right! In His time, however, they will be answered, as we see in these verses. They will be done in earth, as it is in heaven. For thousands of years the people of God have asked Him to demonstrate His power; avenge His name; and get glory over sin and sinners. Those prayers are about to be answered. They have been kept and they are mingled with the fire of the finished work of Christ from the altar. They ascend up before God and they will be answered! I have problems in the area of prayer! I have been saved for years, but I still feel as incompetent in my prayer life as I did when I first began to pray. There are no Ph. There are no experts in prayer. We may struggle in the arena of prayer, but if we are saved, we have power with God in prayer. It is an offering that He accepts and blesses for His glory! Our prayers ascend up to God on the basis of the shed blood of the Lord Jesus Christ and God hears us when we pray! There is power in the prayers of the saints of God! Think about it, we have an Advocate in Heaven, 1 John 2: An Advocate is a lawyer. We have one pleading our cause in Heaven. But wait, we have an Advocate in our hearts, John We have one member of the Godhead pleading our cause in Heaven. That is why you and I have power in our prayers! Our praying may seem weak and ineffective at times, but by the time our prayers arrive in glory, they are not in the same form as they were when they left our feeble lips. When He hears our prayers, they are a powerful force that He uses for His glory! The most powerful people in this world are not the political movers and shakers. The most powerful people are not the kings, queens, dictators, presidents and generals. The most powerful people are not the celebrities and the wealthy. The most powerful people in this world are widows, women, men, children, the poverty stricken and others who believe in the God of Heaven and call out to Him be faith. So, pray Christian pray! As you do, your prayers are mingled with the finished work of Jesus and you have power with God! There is more power in your prayers than you could have ever imagined! When he does, there are sounds from the earth. These sounds are the premonitions of the upheavals that are coming upon the earth. Did you notice that the same fire that causes the incense and prayers to rise up also causes the judgments to come down? That is what we are about to see as these trumpets are sounded and judgment falls upon the earth. Verse 6 tells us that the angels take their places and prepare to sound their trumpets. As they do, we are about to see one horror after another visited upon the earth and her inhabitants.

It took quite awhile to adjust to the onslaught of light. We had a short lesson in sign language and then entered the theater. All the actors were hearing impaired, sight impaired or both. Some have spent their entire lives in total silence and darkened. While watching the performance, we laughed, we cried, we discovered that despite differing abilities we all have the same desires and dreams. None of us can forget this experience and being able to go on stage and share the newly baked bread was a true blessing for us all, bonding our group even more. Only moments ago, in the middle of a staff meeting, he shrieked: The immunologist, the exercise physiologist, the nutritionist, they all sit back. These kinds of practices are considered by some to be on the fringe of medicine. But not to Rabin. Brown and tan shag-carpet art, soft brown couches, even a brown and tan background for the email program perpetually open on his computer screen. When Rabin steps outside his office, he trades earth tones and music for lab coats, stark white rooms, giant centrifuges, and walls of microscopes. His routine usually revolves around attending meetings, teaching courses, delivering lectures, being interviewed about stress by national publications such as Newsweek, and organizing workshops on smoking cessation, weight loss, and pastoral care. From the outside, it seems his world is fractured in two: The hard science of his lab work and the soft science of alternative medicine. But according to Rabin, nothing could be further from the truth. But the lines between immunology and psychology are blurred. So, in fact, his immunology lab makes perfect sense. In the late 80s, through work with animals, he showed with hard science that stress weakens the immune system by stimulating specific regions of the brain. He later replicated these findings in humans and found that by simulating stressful situations, he could cause a marked decrease in their immune function, which he measured through extensive blood tests. Beyond weakening the immune system and leaving people more susceptible to everything from the common cold to autoimmune diseases and cancer, recent studies by others in the field now show that cortisol kills neurons. So people with chronic high levels of stress begin to show cognitive impairment earlier than people with low levels of these hormones. People with demanding stress-filled lives seemed doomed. But Rabin soon found that exercise makes the body more resistant to stress: By regularly activating through exercise the same hormone-producing pathways that stress stimulates, the body becomes resistant. As a result, the pathways become harder to stimulate with stress. Rabin has shown this again and again through clinical research on volunteer subjects, and with HEP he can finally bring his science to the public on a large scale. That is no small accomplishment. This field was met with intense ridicule as it got off the ground in the late 60s and 70s. And other immunologists are thrilled to see it taken seriously. Who utilizes it, how frequently, and how it affects their overall health. This says something not only about Bruce, but about Pitt and the mindset that they have there. To date, there have been no scientific studies into the efficacy therapeutic touch, and no hints about the ways in which it supposedly boosts immune system function, ergo: McBurney has a favorite saying that goes something like this: Alternative medicine is just the politically correct term for quackery. If Bruce Rabin sticks to science with his health enhancement program and keeps the quackery out of it, I have nothing to say but more power to him. His forehead creases, and his thick, dark gray eyebrows angle down at the center as he raises a finger and holds it in the air. The room falls silent, and Rabin recites one of his favorite mantras: One of his research endeavors will investigate the therapeutic benefits of laughter through bringing teams of local comedians to visit hospitalized patients. There are so many other possibilities, some evolving daily. Only hours before playing music for the staff in his office, Rabin and Irene Cain, executive director of HEP, who he affectionately describes as being sutured to his hip, sat at one of their or-so daily meetings. Much of their current efforts focus on getting their program out into the community through libraries and other easily accessible spots. He folded his arms across his chest, bolted up from his chair, then sat back down. Then he rose, this time slowly, and lowered himself down again, and repeated the motion five times. Rabin and Cain put down their forks and watched intently. A subject Rabin knows intimately. He used to have an aversion to birthdays with zeros in them. Then when he hit 40, he took a hard look at his career, which had focused strictly on diseases, and he realized there were more healthy people in the world than sick ones. He decided that instead of joining the masses in looking for disease treatments, he could do more for the world by keeping healthy people from getting sick. This was the early 80s, and stress was the latest buzzword. People have to learn to live with the unavoidable stresses of life, and make sure their work brings satisfaction, not stress. And among other things,

it helped him get over his aversion to zero birthdays a good thing, since this year is the big six-zero. The fact that he exercises regularly well, almost regularly, and meditates often well, pretty often helps him maintain his calm. But he has another secret: What affects your health is your immunologic age, but what affects your immunologic age is your psychologic age. In the middle of his health club meeting over salads, squeezed between two other meetings back-to-back, his cell phone rang. He scrambled to answer it, fumbling with the phone, apologizing. Like an expectant mother, he drives around town with a suitcase in the trunk of his car. He also has three offices scattered around Oakland, yet he almost always answers his phone, regardless of which number you call: Her first book, *HeLa*: Through these groups, Rabin hopes to keep seniors healthy by teaching them to cope with problems like depression and stress management, and helping them maintain meaning in their lives. They attend classes to learn about computers, so many now keep in touch with disparate friends and family through e-mail. Lounds is forced to tape-record a statement before being set on fire in a wheelchair and killed, his flaming body rolled into the parking garage of the National Tattler as a warning. Graham rushes home to find his family safe but terrified. At his job in a St. She kisses him and they make love. I'm Dani Rabin, I play guitar in Marbin and in this channel I post the songs I write and sing.

With two versions of the band touring the United States, fans have been treated to a double helping of fantastic music. I saw the official Yes in Grand Rapids a few months ago see my review here. Seeing Yes featuring Anderson, Rabin, and Wakeman was a great way to compare the two groups while getting to see a few progressive rock legends. Jon Anderson is over 70, yet he sounds absolutely fantastic – maybe better than he did a decade ago. With that show, I expected nothing but prog played as it was presented on the albums. With ARW, I expected to hear more of the 80s classic rock music. Generally, they were true to the album recordings, but they in no way felt tied to them – especially the more progressive songs. It should surprise no one to hear me say that Steve Howe is a much better and more diverse guitarist than Trevor Rabin is. Rabin is very good, but his style is much more comparable to someone like Neal Schon from Journey than it is to Steve Howe. The prog songs, which were my favorite, still sounded great. I remember being amazed at how well Alan White kept up with the repetitive melody of the song that is played during the long keyboard solo. ARW did a really cool spin on that with Jon Anderson playing that part with a small hand-held harp. This brought a completely different atmosphere to the song that was very interesting and enjoyable. The cape only made it better. Towards the end, Wakeman donned a keytar, and he and Rabin started walking down the aisles of the pavilion. Wakeman ended up walking six or seven feet away from me, and the two met towards the middle and decided to sit in an empty box seating area and start jamming with the fans all around. This was probably twenty feet from me, although the swarm of fans made it difficult to see. Regardless, it made an aggressively mediocre song palatable to this prog snob. The band did the whole show without an intermission, and they played for two hours before leaving the stage and returning for the encore. I found that impressive, especially considering Anderson is in his seventies and sang on every song and played instruments on many others. The light show was pretty bad, especially compared to the official Yes 50th anniversary show I saw earlier this summer. That show had a very intricate and tasteful light show that matched the music. This show had extremely bright lights shining in my eyes periodically. The sound was also pretty bad – especially the bass. Lee Pomeroy had his tech running out on stage many times throughout the show, which was a shame because Pomeroy is obviously talented. The worst part of the show had to do with the ushers, however. If you come late, you normally have to wait until a break between songs. However, during this show they had people wandering up and down the aisles the entire time. It was like watching a concert in the middle of a train station. Obviously this did not spoil the music, but it did keep me from concentrating on the band. If you like a healthy mix of 80s pop Yes mixed with 70s prog Yes with slightly new interpretations, then ARW would be the answer. I enjoyed both concerts, and I would love to see both bands again in the future. ARW recently said they may have new music coming out by the end of this year, so that is certainly something to look forward to. Yes is arguably the greatest prog band ever, and to hear integral members performing the music at such a high level – regardless of what the bands call themselves – is a real pleasure. If Yes and Yes featuring ARW are playing anywhere near you in the near future, definitely grab a ticket and go.

Jul 30, Today, it is considered hazardous to even stand in the rain in our noxious cities where a downpour washes the air of suspended pollutants. It also pampers all five senses. The exhilaration lies as much in the visual bounty as in the smells and sounds that accompany the spectacle. The first rain not only breaks the long spell of searing heat. The sweet smell of the wet earth it invokes is better than any fragrance money can buy. Not surprisingly, the ancient Greeks believed that it came from the fluid that flowed in the veins of their gods. Equally intoxicating is the patter of the falling rain, which is among the most calming sounds of nature. Not only a mood lifter, it also helps us sleep better. With every grass patch getting sealed under asphalt or concrete, petrichor has become the stuff of nostalgia. Worse, the soaring urban decibel levels have made sure that the sound of rain, unless it really pours, is barely audible. For those who care, recordings of natural sounds such as raindrops, flowing rivers, ocean waves, waterfalls, birds and crickets chirping, the rustling of leaves, etc are available online. And what are we losing? Despite its constant onslaught on trees, Delhi still has the highest bird population in the world after Nairobi. But there is little appreciation for the birdsong. The overlit cityscape is hostile to birds and our modern urban living leaves no space for species such as the house sparrow, which has always been part of our household. Residents of neighbourhoods around the Ridge forests rue how the morning call of peacocks has fallen silent. Today, we hear rock pigeons, which are overfed by compassionate residents for some reason, cooing everywhere. But chirps of other birds are becoming a rarity. Noise is one of the biggest repellents for birds. Multiple studies conducted across Europe have suggested that birds started singing much earlier in the morning to avoid the urban din, or altogether avoided noisy areas. Certain species of birds were found to be discordant in an urban setting, singing louder and shriller compared to their counterparts in the woodlands. Besides the noise, the architecture of a city could also play a role in altering bird songs, other researchers found. Not so long ago, we used to hear frogs croaking from under the bushes in our gardens and neighbourhood parks after a good spell of rain. Now, landscaped gardens have killed the undergrowth that was the habitat for insects, frogs and other small species. It is not just about the sounds of nature. For many, these memories may now serve only to evoke nostalgia or document a cultural lapse. However, the restoration of hawking rights is also a question of civil rights and the survival of the economically backward. Every witness brought forth by the prosecution was asked if they had personally met Mr. Rick Gates or Mr. With the exception of Mr. Rabin, most testified that they had not met Mr. Kilimnik and had only interacted with Mr. Gates over email, if at all. It was revealed that Mr. Gates will likely be brought forth by the prosecution as a witness, but his testimony in this case is not for certain. Agent Mikuska testified that the FBI knocked three times with no response before entering the premises, where upon they found Manafort and his wife in the residence. The FBI used a key they had obtained to enter the premises and did not bust the door down like a James Bond movie. A number of documents that were found in the home and seized by the FBI were invoices for personal purchases or work done, which would be brought up later by the prosecution. Also seized were two passports, one valid from May and the other valid from February Both had pages filled with Ukrainian passport stamps. Manafort was one of their top five customers and had been a customer for approximately 10 years. Katzman stated that Manafort primarily paid his bills by wire transfer and there were occasional issues with late payment, but ultimately the bills were paid. Katzman testified that according to the documents subpoenaed from Alan Couture the payments were received by wire transfer from various overseas banks. The rest of the witnesses for the day were vendors similar to Mr. Katzman who had done business with Mr.
