The Course Website The Course Website includes a wide range of resources to help you study Chinese, including the following: Use the Vocabulary lists in the Textbook and the vocabulary flashcards on the Course Website to learn and review vocabulary. Study vocabulary until you can accurately provide the English translation for each new word, and until you can accurately write out the Pinyin spelling including the tone for each new Mandarin word. Test yourself by viewing the English translations on the flashcards and writing out the Mandarin words. If you type the words, include the tone marks so that you force yourself to pay attention to the tones. You can use the numbers 1, 2, 3, and 4 for the four tones. The instructions and answer sheets are in the Workbook. The audio recordings are on the Course Website. Use the recordings to practice reciting the lines of each Dialogue. The Course Website provides line-by-line recordings linked to the Dialogue text. The Sentence Pyramids in the Textbook help you to understand the structure of sentences by building them up, phrase-by-phrase. Study the Sentence Pyramids in the Textbook, and listen to the audio recordings on the Course Website. When you think you know the structures and vocabulary in the lesson, test yourself by using the audio recordings of the Sentence Pyramids as dictation practice. Listen to each sentence as it is built-up in the pyramid, and write down what you hear. Then, write the English translation of each sentence. The Structure Drills provide drills on each new structure introduced in the lesson. The audio recordings for the Structure Drills are on the Course Website. Listen as often as necessary until you understand each structure and can provide the correct responses to each cue. The Focus on Structure exercises in the Workbook provide written practice on new structures. Your teacher will probably assign many of these exercises for homework or will use them in the classroom. The Structure Drills and most of the Focus on Structure exercises are cross-referenced to Use and Structure notes in the Textbook to make it easy for you to find the explanations you need to complete each exercise correctly. You should consult the Use and Structure notes as you do each exercise, and you should look up and review and vocabulary items that you do not remember. Level 1 of this course introduces a relatively small number of characters but it places a strong focus on writing characters and on identifying their component parts. This approach will help you to understand the way that characters are formed and will help you to become a good reader and writer by hand and by keyboard of Chinese. You should be able to apply the information you learn about stroke direction and stroke order in these lessons to characters introduced in Lesson 11 and later. Study the Stroke Order Flow Chart that follows the list of new characters in each lesson of the Textbook as you practice each character. Writing a character in the same order each time will help you to remember the character. Conversely, if you write the strokes of a character in a different order every time you will find it much more difficult to remember the character. Complete all of the exercises in the Focus on Chinese Characters section of the Workbook. The first few exercises are designed to help you to understand the structures of characters and to distinguish characters that look similar. The last few exercises in this section give you the opportunity to use characters as you review previously learned structures and to use characters in written communication. Use the character flashcards on the Course Website to practice characters. Write your responses to make sure that you really know the

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accurate Pinyin spelling of each character and the accurate form of each character. Use these cards to test your memory of the English meaning associated with each character. To be literate in Chinese, you must learn to type Chinese accurately. Therefore, we include exercises in the Focus on Communication section of the Workbook that should be completed by typing Chinese on a computer. Characters are entered on computer via their pronunciation, and many characters share the same pronunciation. Therefore, to type Chinese accurately, you must be a good reader and proofreader who can select the right characters to use and who can spot mistakes and correct them. The Focus on Chinese Characters section in the Workbook includes exercises in which you find mistakes in a short message and correct them. These exercises may be challenging at first, but they will help to train your eyes to distinguish between similar looking characters, and they will also help you to associate characters with their meanings. When you complete homework assignments or write Chinese in class, use characters whenever possible. When you do homework, check to make sure you are writing each character correctly. You can find the characters in the Character Index at the back of the Textbook. We discuss the way that culture defines behavior in the Notes on Chinese Culture section at the end of each lesson in the Textbook. Sometimes, cultural conventions differ in different parts of the Chinese speaking world, and we discuss these differences in this section as well. The Listening for Information exercises and the Focus on Communication exercises in the Workbook provide a broad range of listening and writing communication-focused activities that incorporate the cultural themes introduced in the lesson. We have included information about Chinese that we think you will want to know, but which you do not need to know in your first year, in a Language FAQ Frequently Asked Questions section at the end of each lesson in the Textbook. We are certain that you will have many more questions than we address. Ask your Chinese teacher for more information, explore the internet for additional facts about China and the Chinese language, and plan to study in the Chinese speaking world as part of your overall study plan.
