Inter-section hybrids, except between species of sections *Quercus* and *Mesobalanus*, are unknown. Recent systematic studies appear to confirm a high tendency of *Quercus* species to hybridize because of a combination of factors. White oaks are unable to discriminate against pollination by other species in the same section. Because they are wind pollinated and they have weak internal barriers to hybridization, hybridization produces functional seeds and fertile hybrid offspring. The wood is very resistant to insect and fungal attack because of its high tannin content. It also has very appealing grain markings, particularly when quartersawn. Oak planking was common on high status Viking longships in the 9th and 10th centuries. The wood was hewn from green logs, by axe and wedge, to produce radial planks, similar to quarter-sawn timber. Wide, quarter-sawn boards of oak have been prized since the Middle Ages for use in interior panelling of prestigious buildings such as the debating chamber of the House of Commons in London and in the construction of fine furniture. Oak wood, from *Quercus robur* and *Quercus petraea*, was used in Europe for the construction of ships, especially naval men of war, [14] until the 19th century, and was the principal timber used in the construction of European timber-framed buildings. Today oak wood is still commonly used for furniture making and flooring, timber frame buildings, and veneer production. Barrels in which wines, sherry, and spirits such as brandy, Irish whiskey, Scotch whisky and Bourbon whiskey are aged are made from European and American oak, with single barrel whiskey fetching a premium. The use of oak in wine can add many different dimensions to wine based on the type and style of the oak. Oak barrels, which may be charred before use, contribute to the colour, taste, and aroma of the contents, imparting a desirable oaky vanillin flavour to these drinks. The great dilemma for wine producers is to choose between French and American oakwoods. French oaks *Quercus robur*, *Q.* American oak contributes greater texture and resistance to ageing, but produces more powerful wine bouquets. Oak wood chips are used for smoking fish, meat, cheeses, [15] and other foods. Sherry maturing in oak barrels Japanese oak is used in the making of professional drums from the manufacturer Yamaha Drums. Biodiversity and ecology Oaks are keystone species in a wide range of habitats from Mediterranean semi-desert to subtropical rainforest. For example, oak trees are important components of hardwood forests, and certain species are particularly known to grow in associations with members of the Ericaceae in oak-heath forests. Similarly many other mushrooms such as *Ramaria flavosaponaria* also associate with oaks. Many species of oaks are under threat of extinction in the wild, largely due to land use changes, livestock grazing and unsustainable harvesting. For example, over the past years, large areas of oak forest in the highlands of Mexico, Central America and the northern Andes have been cleared for coffee plantations and cattle ranching. There is a continuing threat to these forests from exploitation for timber, fuelwood and charcoal. In the Himalayan region of India, oak forests are being invaded by pine forests due to the increase in temperature. The associated species of pine forest may cross frontiers and become new elements of the oak forests. Scientists suggest that shedding excess numbers allows the oaks to satiate nut gathering species, improving the chances of germination. Every four to ten years, certain oak populations will synchronize to produce almost no acorns at all, only to rain them down excessively the following year, known as a "mast" year. The year preceding the mast year is thought to starve off the mammal populations feeding on the supply, thereby increasing the effectiveness of the overproduction in the mast year that follows. The goal of the project is to create a high resolution sequence of the *Quercus robur* genome, and to study genetic diversity by comparison of the genomes of different species. The project is still in the process of annotating this genome. Oak wilt, caused by the fungus *Ceratocystis fagacearum* a fungus closely related to Dutch elm disease, is also a lethal disease of some oaks, particularly the red oaks the white oaks can be infected but generally live longer. Other dangers include wood-boring beetles, as well as root rot in older trees which may not be apparent on the outside, often being discovered only when the trees come down in a strong gale. Oak apples are galls on oaks made by the gall wasp. The female kermes scale causes galls to grow on kermes oak. Oaks are used as food plants by the larvae of Lepidoptera butterfly and moth species such as the gypsy moth, *Lymantria dispar*, which can defoliate oak and other broadleaved tree species in North America. Examples are oak artichoke gall, oak marble gall, oak apple gall, knopper gall, and spangle gall. A number of species of fungus cause powdery mildew on oak species. In Europe the species *Erysiphe alphitoides* is the most common cause. The caterpillars of this species defoliate the trees, and are hazardous to human health; their bodies are covered with poisonous hairs which can cause rashes and respiratory problems. Toxicity The leaves and acorns of the oak tree are poisonous to cattle, horses, sheep, and goats in large amounts due to the toxin tannic acid, and cause kidney damage and gastroenteritis. Symptoms of poisoning include lack of appetite, depression, constipation, diarrhea which may contain blood, blood in urine, and colic. The exception to livestock and oak toxicity is the domestic pig, which may be fed entirely on acorns in the right conditions, and has traditionally been pastured in oak woodlands such as the Spanish dehesa and the English system of pannage for hundreds of years. Acorns are also edible to humans, after leaching of the tannins. Already an ancient Germanic symbol in the form of the Donar Oak, for instance, certainly since the early nineteenth century, it stands for the nation of Germany and oak branches are thus

displayed on some German coins, both of the former Deutsche Mark and the current Euro currency. The name of the county comes from the city of Derry , which originally in Irish was known as Doire meaning oak. Iowa designated the oak as its official state tree in ; and the White Oak is the state tree of Connecticut , Illinois and Maryland. The oak is a national symbol from the Basque Country , specially in the province of Biscay. The coat-of-arms of the municipality Eigersund , Norway features an oak leaf. Oak leaves are traditionally an important part of German Army regalia. It is also known as the Iron Eagle. They also symbolize rank in the United States Armed Forces. A gold oak leaf indicates an O-4 Major or Lt. Commander , whereas a silver oak leaf indicates an O-5 Lt. Arrangements of oak leaves, acorns and sprigs indicate different branches of the United States Navy Staff corps officers. A Swiss Family Robinson experience is on its way here. Metroparks Toledo is building a privately funded treehouse village inside a new part of Oak Openings Preserve Metropark. The project aims to provide one-of-a-kind overnight camping experiences. Located just south of State Rt. Park commissioners are having their latest board meeting there at 8: Weather permitting, the second half of that meeting will feature an unusual twist: That treehouse alone is expected to accommodate nearly 50 future campers at a time. A year from now, Metroparks Toledo will be renting out a six-person treehouse, a four-person treehouse, a pair of two-person treehouses, and three tent-hammock platforms for camping up in the trees. The overlook tower is part of the series of treehouses going up at Oak Openings Preserve Metropark. The common treehouse will also be available for rental to large groups, such as scouting and educational groups. It is expected to be used for public programs about 20 percent of the time, Mr. Most of the treehouses are being built in silver maples, with locally harvested black locust trees "a sturdy hardwood" providing extra support. One treehouse is being designed with a ramp to ride bikes down from the trees onto a newly finished, mile mountain bike trail. The design was inspired by the Animal Planet television series, Treehouse Masters. Nelson Treehouse and Supply, the designer behind the show, gave Metroparks Toledo employees construction tips. No other park system in the country is believed to have a treehouse village inspired and designed by Treehouse Masters, Mr. Drones were used to survey the forest for the best location. Arborists on the ground used that drone-collected data to pick out the best trees. One of the most important features, he said, is a custom-made, three-part heavy metal bracket that Nelson Treehouse designed to hold treehouse platforms in place when trees sway in the wind, Mr. The treehouses and related structures are being built completely by Metroparks Toledo employees and volunteers. Those with ability impairments will be able to use the village, Mr. The park district steered clear of that because the treehouse village is a niche project. It is reserving tax money for more traditional park maintenance and operations. The foundation, a new version of one that existed years ago, is initially being led by an eight-member, volunteer board of directors chaired by Joe Napoli, president of the Toledo Mud Hens, Toledo Walleye, and Hensville.
