He was elected to the State Assembly in , and continued in one or the other branch of the legislature till From the latter year until , when he declined further service, he was a representative in Congress. In , he was president of the State Board of Internal Improvement. In , in the financial crisis, he served another term in the legislature, but refused all subsequent political honors. Allan was a fine specimen of a self-made man. Removing to Kentucky when a mere lad, he for many years worked at his trade, that of a wheelwright; and when the hours of toil were over, spent the evening in patient study, that he might give himself that education to which no friend had assisted him. After a time he became a teacher in the public schools, and while yet a young man began the successful practice of law, proving that his self-instruction had been patient and faithful. His official course was ever marked with prudence, faithfulness, and a considerable degree of conservatism; the latter quality was of especial value to the councils of a new state surrounded by communities disposed to innovation and rash political experiments. His general state of health being at a low ebb, he was unable to throw off the effects of the grip which developed into tuberculosis and ended his life. They stopped a short time in Cleveland, Ohio, and again in Paris Kentucky, when the family moved here and located permanently. He engaged in carriage making and dealt in that line of business until he retired a few years later. His comrades always spoke in high terms of his conduct as a soldier and his command participated in some of the bloodiest battles of that great conflict. Attersall was always much interested in municipal affairs and for a number of years served as councilman, and was later elected Mayor, a position he was forced to resign on account of ill

health. His most enduring monument is the Winchester Fire Department, of which he was chief for a long time and which he brought to such a state of proficiency that is everywhere regarded as the best volunteer organization in the State. The deceased was a prominent Mason and Odd Fellow and at one time was in line for the Grand Mastership of the latter order, but his modesty caused him to step aside and not grasp the honors coveted by so many. In religious belief he was an Episcopalian and the services will be conducted by Archdeacon F. Chandler and the remains will be buried in the Winchester Cemetery. Arrangements for the funeral have not been fixed, awaiting the arrival of his son George, from Texas, who will get here today.

Martin served as mayor protem when Attersall became ill and could not preside over council meetings. On April 3, , Attersall sent this letter of resignation to the city council: Owing to ill health, I have decided upon the advice of my physician, that I ought not in justice to myself or the city, longer retain the position of Mayor. Reese, Lee Todd, H. Martin, Doc Pigg, J. McCullum and Sid Dinell accepted the resignation and appointed J. Hughes to fill the unexpired term of Attersall. Attersall, of this city, has received a request from Mayor John Skain, of Lexington, asking him to announce to the citizens of Winchester that the tuberculosis exhibit is being held at the Y. Mayor Attersall has had this request put in all the Winchester papers and is doing all he can to induce citizens to attend. Attersall, resigned as Mayor of Winchester on account of ill health, and Councilman J. Hughes was to be elected Mayor to fill out the unexpired term of Mayor Attersall and duly sworn in as such. The City Council was called to order tonight by Clerk S. Tracy, Mayor Attersall being absent on account of illness. Martin was elected Mayor pro tem. The minutes of the former meeting were read and adopted. A motion was carried that the city purchase feet of fire hose. The Fire Committee were instructed to build a reel house in North Winchester.
